Matthew begins his gospel account of the life and teaching of Jesus by telling us Jesus is the son of David, the Son of Abraham. Matthew then goes on to list over 40 other names and generations from whom Jesus has come.

What a list. You've got your patriarchs Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Judah; the generations abiding the sojourn in Egypt and the desert wanderings; the days of the Canaan conquest; and the wild west times of early Israel recorded in the book of Judges and Ruth.

Next come the Israelite kings, David being mentioned first (and we are to remember God's promise to David that someone from his line will always be on the throne). Then you have the wisest foolish guy (or most foolish

wise guy?) who ever lived, King Solomon. This is followed by their sons and grandsons and great-grandsons until the Babylonians come and destroy the land of Judah (recorded in the books of Kings and Chronicles).

We know less about the next section, the generations that passed during the "silent" years of Israel. This period lasted about 400 years and there was no prophetic word between Malachi, the last prophet/book in the Old Testament, and John the Baptist's prophetic preaching recorded at the beginning of the New Testament.

You'll note a few things about the lineage of Jesus according to Matthew. (continued next page)

(continued from first page) Matthew wants to communicate a sense of completion and fulfillment of God's promises, hence the three groups of fourteen generations.

Matthew really wants you to know Jesus is Messiah, bookending the genealogy with that claim.

Matthew wants you to know this Messiah is for everyone, especially you.

We see this in the inclusion of four women outsiders that were grafted into the story of God and lineage of Jesus. We can see it in the histories of those we do know something about. They weren't perfect heroes, but pilgrims journeying, stumbling, and struggling as they sought to follow God (or sometimes not). We see it in the grace God gave to these men and women over and over again.

Liars, adulterers, murderers, drunkards, prostitutes, idolaters, cowards, thieves, and more. Artists, kings and queens, farmers, craftsman, warriors, shepherds, husbands, wives, widows and orphans, and more. The good, the bad, the really bad, and the ugly.

As Matthew begins his gospel account he wants us to know the Messiah Jesus joins the story of the people of Abraham; is a rightful heir to the throne of David; and is for you, me, and anyone who calls on the name of the Lord to be saved. From a myriad of backgrounds and a myriad of times the Messiah has come. His reign is come and welcomes those of faith to live in and bring it all the more.

This Jesus, the son of David, the son of Abraham, the Son of God, is whom we adore and worship through Advent, through Christmas, through life. He is for you. He is for all.

Let us worship the newborn king.

Team Rahab was one of the first stops on the circuit, and our Stockton neighbors all learned of how Rahab can help in times of crisis.



Courtyard Plans

The Council has adjusted our plans in keeping with the original scope of the project and staying within the funds raised by the congregation. We should be signing contracts in the next couple weeks and hope to see the project begin breaking ground in the near future (dependent upon contractor's schedule, of course). Children's Ministry

Thank you for your faithful prayers for God's leading in our search for a DCE. Over the past 13 months the call committee has prayed, met, contacted DCEs, and interviewed a number of candidates, even offering a call to someone in the early spring of 2022. (She declined the call.)

But as time has passed, it has become clear that because of the dramatic rise in cost of living in such short a time period, St. Andrews is unable to reach salary guidelines to hire a DCE and meet guidelines for current staff. Eliminating current staff members is not being considered at this time, thus the Council and staff's next step will be looking at which elements of a DCE's role are important for the life of our church and then probably hiring congregational members to do those things part-time. We believe St. Andrews still has very generous givers; we've just gotten outpaced by skyrocketing costs.

How can you help? Be praying for workers for the harvest. We've got wonderful opportunities to connect to the families of our preschool. Each of you have connections to people in our community that are opportunities to share the Gospel. And feel free to volunteer and help out when we are doing ministry for families and children. St. Andrews is going to continue to be a light to this community for this and following generations.
