March 2024



March 2024 will mark the end of Lent, and on the final day of this month we'll celebrate Easter. This, in my mind, is almost as fitting as having Easter land on April 1, the start of a new month (and yes, April Fools' Day). There is something poetic about starting such a joyous celebration on the final day of a month that is dominated by the more somber time of Lent.

Every Christian family and congregation has their own Easter traditions. Perhaps you have some special dinner planned for Sunday evening; I know I do! St. Andrews always has the sunrise service (together with two other services later in the morning). There is something special about proclaiming God's glory in the risen Jesus with the first signs of light in the brisk, cold air of our courtyard.

Other congregations have different customs and practices, one of these being the Saturday Easter Vigil which is celebrated much like we do our

final Christmas Eve service. God's people gather around 11pm and welcome Easter morning the very minute the clock strikes 12. And just like at an early morning Easter sunrise service, there is an eagerness and anticipation to shout glory to God for our risen Lord and Savior.

(continued from first page) 1 Corinthians 15:20 says, "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep, for as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive." St. Paul then puts an exclamation point on Christ's power made perfect in the resurrection with this blessed statement: "The last enemy to be destroyed is death."

This is what we celebrate both on Easter and even on Holy Saturday, the day between Good Friday and Easter Sunday. A day when, as 1 Peter 3:19 says, that Jesus proclaimed His victory over sin, death, and the devil to those in hell. This action by our Lord has always been understood as the first Gospel proclamation of the risen Jesus to the universe: That even though He died, death could not hold Him. Even though the devil thought he had Jesus beat, nothing could be further from the truth. For by dying, Jesus conquered death for all people.

With each day this month, we step closer and closer to the proclamation of Easter—that Jesus is risen from the dead, for you. For by His death and resurrection, our sins are washed away. The old has passed away, and in Christ, the new has come.

Yet now, some 30 days away, we still find ourselves in Lent, pausing to meditate on Jesus' Word and works throughout His ministry on earth. Pausing to hear His "I am" statements. And drawing closer to His final few words on the cross.

Beloved Christian, know that just as we wait for Easter on March 31, 2024, we are still waiting for the more perfect Easter. For as God's Word promises, Christ is coming soon: "Listen, I tell you a mystery: We will not all sleep, but we will all be changed—in an instant, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed." On that day, the alleluias will be loud and long, even as they are silent in our services now during Lent. In the meantime, take heart and look forward to the promise we have in Jesus: eternal life with Him.


Rahab Comfort Dog

Team to Thailand

The Thailand team with Cathy Pauley, Jamie Eisenbeisz, Tatum Deuel, and Monte Posey spent 11 days in northern Thailand sharing God's love and His Word with many Hill-tribe people. The Hill-tribe we shared with are mainly Karen and Hmong, who fled from Burma in the late 1960s because of the threat of persecution. A lot of the older people are first-generation Thailand refugees, but the majority of those we visited were born in Thailand.

When these Hill-tribe people fled to Thailand, they built houses that are very hidden from all roads. At night, you cannot see the homes from the road in most cases. Most of the villages in the area we stayed have Christian families and in some cases a Christian church, but the majority of the villagers are either Buddhist or ancestor worshipers.





Our team had the privilege of sharing about God, His creation, and His love to hundreds of students. Every school or village we visited included side visits to villagers in need of prayers. Our hosts, Siami (Americanized name) and Sawahtree (Christian shepherd to many of the villages) know these families and their needs so we knew how to pray for each of them.

The Christian churches are Baptist, so baptism is usually performed at age of consent. We met a mom and her son in his 20s who was badly injured before "age of consent" and is still totally bedridden. His mom allowed Monte to baptize him, because she understood the importance of baptism that he normally would have had as a teen.

We traveled to 12 villages, taught in five schools, and visited five churches. One of the churches we visited was rebuilt by Christian soldiers and police after some

angry Buddhist men burned down the original church (and yes they were tried, convicted, and served five years in jail). We attended and spoke at three church services and led evening devotions on eight nights with the students who lived at Musekee, where we also stayed.

Senior Pastor Call Process

Updates from Pastor Ron Youngdale

"Tell me what's more important than being present for children and listening to them. I'll wait" (Maxime Lagacé, a professional hockey player). In my last (and first) Fishhook article I quoted an old adage: "Children should be seen and not heard!" That inspired me to find the above quote regarding children. I think it's interesting that this month's quote kind of contradicts last month's quote. So once again I can say, "Yikes!"

Having been asked to be a consultant for you in preparation for calling a senior pastor, I think my job is as much—or more—about listening as it is talking. I want to hear what the congregation, church leaders, and staff have to say about the needs and wants of St. Andrews Lutheran Church. Please do not hesitate to contact me by email or phone (both are listed below). My ultimate goal is to assist you in becoming better at what you do, sharing the love of Jesus with one another and the community.

We have completed the first step in the journey to calling a senior pastor by studying and discussing "Know Your Community," a report about who the 364,102 people are in our neighborhood and what they prefer (beliefs, lifestyles, even pets). We appreciated your observations and questions and will have more time to discuss that on March 10 (more info below).

The second main resource, "Know Your Church," will provide an opportunity for every person in our congregation to give their anonymous perceptions of the ministries at St. Andrews. The survey will be available online or on paper.

On **March 10 from 9:45-10:30am** we will have an "open house" to do several things: (1) provide a handout summary of comments and observations made during the "Know Your Community" presentations; (2) discuss the comments people made at those two presentations; (3) add your input about information garnered from the report; (4) get information about the "Know Your Church" survey and share instructions on how to take it. That survey will be available to take until April 10, and we'll present on those results on April 28.

TENTATIVELY, we are hoping to have an all-congregation potluck and brainstorming meeting about the implications of the above two reports on May 19. That will prepare everyone for the "Pastor Search Survey." Specific details will be given later.
