The Bible was written approximately between the years 2000 BC and 100 AD. Its 66 books were written by about 35 named authors and two or three dozen unnamed authors. (Who wrote Hebrews, Chronicles, and all those psalms?) It contains 1,189 chapters and—depending on the translation—31,103 verses and 807,361 words. In the King James Version, the middle verses are Psalm 103:1-2, and the middle chapter is Psalm 117. The most popular verse is John 3:16.



I once read a story about a prisoner locked in his cell for a lifetime with nothing to read but the Bible. After his death, people read notes he'd scratched on the walls and saw nothing but trivial information such as I listed in the previous paragraph. The prisoner had counted how many times certain words appeared in books, how many total verses there were, how many times specific names were mentioned, etc. He had recorded a lot of information on the walls of his cell, but not one word about any transformation he experienced through the Word of God.

What happens when you read the Bible? Do you like knowing about people, places, and things? Do you like learning context and connections? Do you geek out over the use of specific word choices in the original Hebrew and Greek? I love all of the above, but I've learned that simply learning more and more information is not the end purpose of an encounter with God's Word, but rather being transformed in heart, mind, and soul. (continued from first page) Much of Scripture speaks to the need of our hearts to be changed by God:

The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately sick; who can understand it? — Jeremiah 17:9

Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect. — Romans 12:2

All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work. — 2 Timothy 3:16-17

For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart. — Hebrews 4:12

It is clear God's Word is meant to do something in us. Transform us. Change us. Get us off one path and lead us on to another. As we go "Thru the Bible" in this season of Lent we are not just learning more information about eight cool chapters of the Bible. We are learning how to be transformed by God's Word and how to replicate that with others.

We encourage you to go through each week's chapter in the study guide and ask its simple questions with your family, small group, or others you've invited to read with you. If you want to experience transformation, you'll pay close attention to the questions that prod you to consider what you will do or how you want to change because of your encounter in God's Word. Then be brave enough to talk the next week about how that effort went. Pray for, challenge, and encourage each other. Ask the Holy Spirit to work with and around you. You'll be surprised what God will do with this approach to Scripture. I know I have been.

Isaiah recorded it best:


"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, declares the LORD. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

"For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven and do not return there but water the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it."

Serving Stockton and Beyond

Rahab Comfort Dog

Rahab's Bible verse is Joshua 2:11: "When we heard of it, our hearts melted in fear and everyone's courage failed because of you, for the Lord your God is God in heaven above and on the earth below."

It has happened once again: Another mass shooting, more lives lost, more loved ones in mourning...and darkness settles in. However, light always invades darkness, and God's love shines brilliantly through with the promise of hope, love, and the beginning of healing.

Within three hours of the breaking news of the Monterey Park shooting, Lutheran Church Charities started calling Top Dogs with orders to prepare to deploy. Shortly after I received the call, I notified Team Rahab and within hours, our team said, "Here I am Lord, send me." Michael and Ann Marie Rehbein arrived with Rahab Monday afternoon. In total, five dogs from NorCal and Las Vegas deployed for five days. Pastor Dan and Bobby Moore relieved the Rehbeins on Wednesday.

The Comfort Dog teams spent time at the memorial site, City Hall, Fire, Police, County Coroner, schools and countless other areas. The Comfort Dogs were in the news all week and as people learned the dogs were there, more and more requests were made for visits, and more and more messages came in via the dogs' social media pages. One comment on a dog's Facebook page stated, "Thank you so much for going there. I know it will help all of them as they grieve. But it helps all of us. The violence in our world breaks my heart. But knowing there are people (and dogs) who care, really does help."

A week after we returned home, a school principal wrote us, "I have to tell you, I hear about the Comfort Dogs from our students almost daily. Yesterday, one of the first graders asked me when Rahab was going to come back. They definitely had an impact on us!"

As written in USA Today: "Mourners navigating the darkness shrouding California's close-knit Monterey Park have discovered a source of comfort in the form of cuddly, four-legged friends. After Saturday's mass shooting at Star Ballroom Dance Studio that claimed 11 lives, Lutheran Church Charities sent five trained golden retrievers from its K-9 Comfort Dog Ministry—Lois, Rahab, Micah, Reuben and Salome—to offer compassion for a community torn apart. The dogs traveled from Lutheran churches in Las Vegas as well as Elk Grove, Yuba City and Stockton, California. The LCC's comfort dogs' response to these tragedies and others since 2008 have helped ease the burden of grief by simply being present."

It is hard to express what our human team experiences when called into action, so I asked they provide me with a few of their thoughts, which you can read on these pages. As I wrap up this article, I will end with how I started: Light always invades darkness, and God's love shines brilliantly!

Ann Marie... It was amazing to watch how God used Rahab to draw people to us in each new situation over the three days we were there. God's love and peace flowed through us allowing us to just be present with them, giving them a chance to relax and express whatever they were feeling at that time. I can't explain except to say that it is a sacred call to be allowed into someone's pain, entrusted to listen with loving care in a crisis such as this. It is a holy privilege to be used in this way.





Pastor Dan... I am always amazed how Rahab is such a bridge builder and door opener. Our ministry team is able to help and support so many people we wouldn't normally be able to reach because Rahab and other LCC Comfort Dogs are able to open the door to reach first responders, community leaders, mourners, children, and more. Rahab connected with the Police Chief of Monterey Park, the shifts of the fire and police that responded to the tragedy, the coroners who worked the scene, and many other grieving community members along the way. I love being able to connect with people in these times alongside Rahab, knowing Jesus wants to be with these people and give them hope, peace, and encouragement. Strife and cynicism may be growing in our culture, but people still respond to love and hope.



Michael... When we received the news of the shooting in Monterey Park and that Rahab was going to be needed there, I was not surprised. Our team has been working together for these past two years and more to be ready to serve whenever and wherever there is a need. Ann Marie and I were able to drive down to Monterey Park on Monday morning. We did not even know where we were going to be staying or what other teams were going to be with us. As we were in the car driving to Southern California, we received text messages about which hotel we would be staying in and which other LCC teams were coming. By late afternoon, five comfort dog teams were heading to Monterey Park to work together to bring the presence, care, and compassion of Christ to the community.

While many people took comfort in petting the dogs and talking about their feelings, the experience of one woman was very meaningful. She was a librarian who worked with the senior citizens of Monterey Park. As Rahab lay across her feet, the librarian talked. She said that she did not know any of the victims personally and so she thought she was OK emotionally. But then as she talked about her friends who had lost loved ones to the shooting, she began to cry. She had not realized that she, too, was hurting deeply. She sat with Rahab for at least 20 minutes. She apologized for her tears, which she had not expected to shed. We let her know that it was OK. This is why we were there.
