Now, I know we are entering into the summer, and not Advent, but as we do so, something has been weighing on me as of late. Hopefully come the

end of this year, St. Andrews won't be left quite in the dark about the future that Christ has in store for us here.

But, even if that hope is not fulfilled, that is beside the point. For it is not a mere man who leads us at St. Andrews. It is not a senior pastor in whom we put our hope and ultimate trust. (continued from first page) But it is Christ who leads us. Our trust is placed in Him and in Him alone to provide for our future—and chiefly, to forgive us all our sins. He is the one who provides for all our needs, physical, emotional, and spiritual.

As of late, I feel that we have forgotten this. Both myself individually, and as a congregation. This is something that every Christian deals with, daily. St. James wisely tells us, "For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it" (2:10). In short, when we break Commandments 2-10, we are breaking the first as well. What I'm trying to say is that we all struggle with our faith. We all commit idolatry, whether we do so by coveting another person's possession, looking at others with lust, speaking lies, telling gossip, or despising going to church on Sunday.

The song I mentioned earlier tells us this:

When a voice cries in the wilderness and no one is there to hear it, Does the message that it carries to us still need to be feared?

And does the man that brings the message need to be made out of gold Or can he look like he is a maniac and still have the Good News told?

And if the sick and poor are dying in the streets in which they lie, Can the man whose sandals John the Baptist was not fit to untie Really save all of the nations on a road that is smoothed out By running water down their foreheads and pointing to his side, Saying, "There comes a man mightier than I"?

> Behold the Lamb of God Who takes away your sin. He came when the world was dark and dim. God showed His grace through Him. He shows His grace through Him.*

This is what I have been mulling over during this time of transition, for often we let our own doubts and fears choke out the blessed truth we have in Jesus. He has promised us EVERYTHING: protection, peace, forgiveness, hope, and salvation, all on account of Him. Yes, God's methods seem unorthodox, and sometimes downright wrong when we compare His works and timeline to the world's. When God hangs nailed to a cross, we'd rather have a powerful, conquering king. When God grants us forgiveness and life in our baptisms, we want to have something more. Something that is shiny and glorious, something that fills our bodies with good emotions. When Jesus gives Himself to us, His Body and Blood, we look at Him and see only bread and wine. When God gives us everything we need, we look Him in the face and tell Him, "I want something else."

But thanks be to God! For God continues to provide for us. He continues to forgive. And He continues to lead. Our Lord told His disciples in John 16: "However, when the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all truth. For he will not speak on His own, but he will speak what he hears, and he will declare to you what is to come. He will glorify me by taking from what is mine and disclosing it to you. Everything that belongs to the Father is mine. That is why I said that the Spirit will take from what is mine and disclose it to you."

Everything the Father has is given to us in Christ, by the Spirit. God is guiding us in our next chapter here at St. Andrews, and He does so through our Lord, Jesus Christ, who died and rose for sinners. He is the One who leads, guides, comforts, and cares for us at St. Andrews. And I am excited to see what He has in store for us during the summer, fall, and winter of 2024. God's peace to you; and may our eyes always be fixed on Christ, the Author and Perfecter of our faith! Amen.

H2H will break for the summer.


High School Volunteers!


Getting Creative

Ways to Give at St. Andrews

St. Andrews has a wonderful history of being generous in its giving and responding to each other's needs when the time arises. We are grateful to all of you who give to St. Andrews and pray with St. Paul that we would "excel all the more in this act of grace."

Here are a variety of ways to give to St. Andrews:

- 1. By check or cash during worship on Sundays. Some prefer this as it helps incorporate giving into their act of worship.
- 2. Recurring or one-time gifts through our website (stalc.churchcenter.com/giving), app, or text-to-give (instructions at standrewsstockton.org/text-to-give). Some prefer the convenience of this option and are grateful they don't have to worry about forgetting to give after they sign up for recurring gifts. It is also often possible to set up donations directly through your personal bank account.
- 3. Required Minimum Distribution giving. You can give your RMDs straight to St. Andrews. Many of our retired people appreciate the tax benefits they get from this process.
- 4. You could also do this kind of giving with other investment accounts, stock investments, charitable trusts, etc. Talk with your financial advisor about how to set this up.
