As we inch closer to Easter, the Alleluias will begin to ring out and we will be reminded of Jesus' resurrection once again. Many church theologians don't reserve celebration of the resurrection to just one Sunday a year, though. Worship on Sunday mornings has often been called "little Easters" because we give thanks and praise to God for the sacrifice of His Son on the cross, and for the promise that His resurrection gives us. He promises that our bodies will also be resurrected, and we see that foreshadowed in Jesus' own resurrection (His body still bore the holes where the nails and spear pierced Him) and in the raising of Lazarus.

In John 11:1-44 we read that Jesus' friend Lazarus is dying, but Jesus delays a visit to him. When He finally arrives, Lazarus has already passed away. Our Lord then meets Martha, the grieving sister. Their conversation points us to the *final resurrection* from sin and pain. Jesus tells Martha, "You brother will rise again. I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall He live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die." Martha's response? "Yes, Lord; I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, who is coming into the world."

What then follows is a *temporary resurrection*, with Jesus loudly commanding death to leave Lazarus, and for His friend to "Come out!" of the tomb. **(continued next page)**

(continued from first page) God's Word accomplishes what it sets out to do, so Lazarus is raised, and the people rejoice!

But the rejoicing is temporary. The Pharisees respond by seeking to kill both Jesus and Lazarus, because "many of the Jews were going away and believing in Jesus" on Lazarus' account (John 12:9-11). And Lazarus would eventually die again.

What does this have to do with Easter—and furthermore, with our lives? Not only does the story of Lazarus point us to the resurrection of our Lord and our own final resurrections as well, but it shows us that the Christian life is a difficult one...yet it is founded in the promises of Jesus.

Many see Easter as the spiritual high of the year, which in some sense is correct. But remember what was said earlier? Every Sunday is a "little Easter." In that sense, as we move towards Holy Week and see palm branches being waved, the Upper Room, the Garden of Gethsemane, Pilate's judgment seat; as we hear the demands of the mob and see our Lord hanging on a tree; and then finally as we see the empty tomb and our eyes behold the risen Jesus, something else must be said: Monday comes. We suffer difficulties, sin, illness, death.

So in our rejoicing and in our suffering, let us live rooted in Jesus, clinging to His promise of that Great Day when we will be raised from the death of sin and see our Risen Lord face to face. May you take heart this Easter Sunday that the resurrection is yours. And may you continue in that faith the Monday after Easter, and the next day, and the next. Amen.

Many of our high school youth are going to be attending our summer mission trip with Idaho










Church Family Updates

Called to Glory



Elmore Urban Ernst went to be with Jesus on March 2 at the age of 95. Urban was the last surviving founding member of St. Andrews Lutheran Church and he was dedicated to the congregation for his whole life. A very generous man, Urban served St. Andrews with both his time and his finances, supporting many campus beautification projects and getting his hands dirty during church work "parties." He served on several boards and as an elder over the years, and even when he could no longer live independently, he came to our traditional worship service almost every Sunday. (His daughters, especially, were very faithful in bringing him!)

Urban will be honored at a celebration of life on **Saturday, April 1 at 1:00pm** at St. Andrews. We're including his obituary so you can learn more about this special man!

Lifelong Stockton resident Elmore Urban Ernst passed away peacefully, with family and caregivers by his side, in his home on March 2nd at age 95. Born March 5th, 1927 to

parents Bertha and Elmore Ernst, Urban grew up in Stockton along with his older sister Margaret. Upon graduation from UC Berkeley in 1950, he took over his father's architecture business, which became Ernst & Lloyd Architects. Over a 60 year long career, he developed a thriving practice, and became best known for designing schools. His work can be found all throughout the San Joaquin Valley.

He met the love of his life, Margaret "Margo" Gerke, at a UC Berkeley Lutheran alumni event. They wed in 1959 and raised three daughters in their Stockton home that he designed. Urban's dedication to his family, faith, and community shone daily. He was a regular attendee and supporter of St. Andrews Lutheran Church, a longtime member of Kiwanis and the Haggin Museum, sponsor of several guest artists for the Stockton Symphony, and a quiet supporter of many local charities. Urban loved good food, good wine, skiing, fishing, riverboat cruises, and PBS. His family fondly remembers learning to ski on the Tahoe slopes under his kind supervision, his delightful chuckle upon catching salmon or trout on fishing trips, his gifts of hand-cracked walnuts, and the boxes of fresh tangerines and oranges he shared from his garden every winter.

He is survived by his sister Margaret Ford, daughters Hilary, Carla, and Kristina, son-in-law Steven, grandchildren Sara and Max, two great grandchildren, and many nieces and nephews. In lieu of flowers, donations can be made in Urban's name to the Stockton Symphony, Haggin Museum or St. Andrews Lutheran Church.

Campus Construction
