Why I am excited about the Forgiving Challenge? Or maybe, why am I even doing it?

As a pastor you might think that I know a lot about forgiveness. Afterall, my job is to tell people about Jesus and the forgiveness that we have in Him. But it was really only after I began studying to be a pastor, all the way back as a freshman in college, that I began to understand the for-

giveness that Jesus has for me. Growing up, my family never said the words, "I forgive you." In fact, those words were foreign to me. They were never spoken, and because of that, even though we went to church and I knew Jesus, moments of forgiveness were few and far between.

And you might ask yourself, "Why? Why was forgiveness so seldom seen in the household of a soon-to-be pastor?" Well, my family never prayed together. We never read the Bible. But as I said, we did go to church. We heard God's Word proclaimed and we received the Sacrament of Jesus' body and blood. And so, we had faith, but it wasn't mature. It wasn't cultivated. It was barely even spoken about. My family didn't focus on the forgiveness of Jesus very much.

My family has come a long way since then, but this is why I'm excited about the Forgiving Challenge. As the intro to the Challenge puts it: "It may sound surprising, but the primary goal of this book is not to learn how to forgive others...this is primarily a book about receiving God's forgiveness for yourself."

Forgiveness doesn't start with trying harder to be more forgiving, or trying your hardest to be a better Christian. Forgiving, as Scripture says, starts with Christ. For once God brings us His forgiveness in the waters of baptism, in the preaching of His Word, and afterwards in His body and blood, it is only then that we will have the ability to forgive others. And so, I'm eager to start the Forgiving Challenge because I'm excited to look deeper at Jesus; to hear His forgiveness for my sins; and in turn to go and forgive myself, and then others as well.

This Month: All-Church Forgiving Challenge


The last two years have been very challenging. Many of us feel disconnected from friends and family, even at church. **Join us for 40 days of connection and forgiveness, starting March 6th.**

Rahab Comfort Dog

Rahab's Bible verse is Joshua 2:11: "When we heard of it, our hearts melted in fear and everyone's courage failed because of you, for the Lord you God is God in heaven above and on the earth below."

Rahab has been in the community bringing comfort and love to many people. In late December, military veterans Mike Rehbein, Cathy Pauley, Bobby Moore, and Jeff Kramer went to the Alameda Coast Guard training facility and visited coast guardsmen who were not going home for Christmas break.



On January 21st, Elk Grove Police Officer Ty Lenehan was killed on the way to work by a drunk driver. Top Dog Deb Rider, along with Miriam Deuel and Teams Reuben, Micah, and Gomer, visited the Lenehan family and police force in Elk Grove on January 24th to provided peace and comfort. Deb Rider and Sue Gruber took Rahab to Officer Lenehan's memorial service on February 1st, accompanied by the other comfort dog teams. "Blessed are the peacemakers for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9).



Rahab had fun on January 21st at the Stockton Directions Medical Clinic, which hosted a diaper dash, collecting 31,000 diapers! Pastor Dan and Cathy Pauley joined Miriam Deuel at the event greeting donators and volunteers. Rahab was promoted on KYCC from 3-6 p.m. that afternoon.

Pastor Dan, Pastor Brian, and Rahab participated in a prayer walk on January 26th at Delta College in conjunction with the University of the Pacific InterVarsity team.

Tragically, on January 31st, Stockton Fire Captain Max Fortuna (Station #2) was shot and killed while responding to a dumpster fire. February 5th, Team Rahab provided an LCC Crosses for Losses (a cross and heart on a stand) for Fire Station #2 and a heart for Captain Fortuna's family. Deb Rider, Sue Gruber, Nancy Harrison-Werner, Janis Sheen, and Cathy Pauley delivered Crosses for Losses to the funeral home where a two-person fire-fighter detail stood vigil at Captain Fortuna's casket. Rahab also brought comfort to the firefighters who were taking shifts as honor guards. February 6th, Deb Rider, Amy Lapointe, and Rahab delivered dinner to Station #9, in honor of Captain Fortuna. "Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13).



Team Rahab continues to visit nursing homes and memory loss facilities to share the mercy, compassion, presence, and proclamation of Jesus Christ to those in need.

Comfort Dog Rahab and team never go anywhere unless invited. There is never a financial charge to those we serve.

Hosting Homeless Families Through Family Promise



What is this?

"Families come to us in crisis; we help them rebuild their lives with new skills and ongoing support." Family Promise (FP) is a ministry that helps local families address the root causes of family homelessness.

How does it work?

Families who have recently become homeless can apply to FP and go through a vetting process. Families accepted into the program receive holistic assistance in trying to regain stability through emergency shelter and meals, job and finance training, and transportation.

Why is St. Andrews partnering with Family Promise?

Our mission statement is "Inspiring our community to live out the hope found in Christ." We are called to act in faith, knowing we're loved and forgiven, and share God's compassion with others. This is a fantastic opportunity to do just that.

What exactly is St. Andrews doing?

At the beginning of 2019, we committed to being one of San Joaquin County's "host congregations" for Family Promise's ministry. Now, after a slow organizational start-up—made even slower by the pandemic—FP is finally looking at beginning to host families starting in late March of 2022.

Here at St. Andrews, we will house and feed about four families for during the weeks of **May 22-28**, **July 31-August 6**, **and September 11-17**. Our duties will include providing dinner and breakfast, socializing in the evening with the families, and having two people stay overnight each night.

At 7:00am each day, the families will be transported to the Family Promise day facility where they'll shower and have classes. They'll return to St. Andrews around 5:30pm, and the cycle repeats for one week (Sunday evening to Sunday morning of the following week).

How can I help during hosting week?

- Bring one or more meals!
- Plan some crafts or games and play with the kids for a couple hours one evening!
- Eat dinner with the families and share God's love!
- Spend a night at St. Andrews!

Minor Prophets (in the library)


