On another note, when asked about what he is hoping to accomplish this year, Mr. Smith responded with a quite interesting answer. Being suddenly flung into a new learning environment via remote learning, a lot of us failed to maintain good grades, and the staff realizes this. With more time to thoroughly survey, plan, etc., Mr. Smith is adamant on achieving the same exact learning environment we once had before this pandemic. What he is hoping to accomplish is a sense of a normal learning environment, so that us students can comprehend the information set before us and learn to our true potential and succeed. When asked to give out encouragement, Mr. Smith stated that we as a school will get through these tough times as one, as long as we truly try our best. He stated that he is confident that the students and staff will ultimately do the right thing, so that we can enter a realm of normality together.

While it may not seem like it at times, the people who teach and command us hold a great feeling of compassion for all of us. And while things may not be normal right now, it will not be like this forever.



Welcome back to Margareta High School fellow students, staff, and administrators. On Friday September 4th, 2020, Mr. Kurt sent a message to the Margareta community recapping and explaining the actions and outcomes of the first week of school. In addition to his message recapping our first week of school, it also provided ideas of the future including our new schedule to remain hybrid for the first quarter of the 2020-2021 school year. "Regarding the board approving my recommendation to remain hybrid through the first 9 week grading period, I feel very strongly that this is the right learning model at this time. Erie County went from Red to Orange along with Sandusky County being Orange. The best learning occurs with interaction between good instruction and other opportunities for peer learning too," said Mr. Kurt in his reaction to the board of education voting 5-0 to remain hybrid.

Now, many parents and students may be asking what about the future school year, what if we return to a level 3 health emergency. Mr. Kurt said this in response, "Our district feels strongly about providing as many opportunities as possible for our students. At the same time in dealing with the COVID virus we must keep safety at the forefront. I am regularly communicating with our local health department, and other area school districts. Providing opportunities while keeping safety is a main emphasis."

Many viewers of our national and local news have seen that as cases fall they can also rise and the question of if Erie county returns to a level 3 looms closer. Mr. Kurt responds to the question with, "We will continue to monitor our county level and follow the guidelines that are posted on our website."

Finally, Superintendent Kurt has goals in these terrifying, but confusing times. "The goal for this year is to have a productive academic year during these unprecedented times, and provide as many opportunities for our students as we can safely conduct." In conclusion, Mr. Kurt is thankful and excited that we can continue our school year with at least some in person learning




Coach Yantz's hope for the remainder of the season is that the athletes continue to improve even with the pandemic presenting new challenges for the team.
