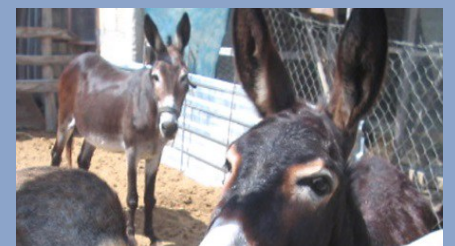

CTP leader Erhürman presents cabinet to President Akıncı

the Prime Ministry during which CTP leader Tufan Erhürman will take over duties from UBP leader Hüseyin Özgürgün at 14.00 today.

Another handover ceremony will take place today at 15.00 at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and at the Ministry of Education at 15.30.

Turkish Cypriot side withdraws map



The Turkish Cypriot side has taken back the map which had been presented at the Conference on Cyprus as part of the negotiations on the issue of territory.

The map, which was originally presented to the UN, was withdrawn at the request of President Mustafa Akıncı.

Both the Turkish Cypriot and the Greek Cypriot sides had prepared maps within the framework of the Conference on Cyprus as part of talks on the issue of territory. The UN had locked the maps away at UN Headquarters in Geneva.

After a declaration by the Greek Cypriot side that the Conference on Cyprus had ended in failure, the Greek Cypriots announced that they had withdrawn all proposals made during the conference.

In response, President Mustafa Akıncı informed the UN of his wish to withdraw the Turkish Cypriots' map which was locked up in a safe in UN Headquarters in Geneva, and requested its return. Following his request, Head of the Office of the Special Advisor to the UN Secretary-General Sergiy Illarionov personally delivered the map to President Akıncı last December.

“Mr. Illarionov picked up the map from Geneva and delivered it personally to President Mustafa Akıncı in December in the presence of the negotiating team. So, there are currently no proposals on territorial adjustments on the table,” said Spokesperson Barış Burcu.

Burcu also recalled the fact that the negotiations are based on the principle that nothing is agreed until everything is agreed.

TRNC Ministry of Foreign Affairs statement

The United Nations Security Council (UNSC) unanimously adopted Resolution 2398 (2018) on 30 January 2018, extending the mandate of the UN Peacekeeping Force in Cyprus (UNFICYP) until 31 July 2018.

It is not only factually incorrect but also unacceptable by the Turkish Cypriot side that the Resolution refers to the “Republic and Government of Cyprus”; that the approval of only the Greek Cypriot side was sought in order to extend UNFICYP’s mandate; and that the UN did not even consult with the other partner on the Island, namely the Turkish Cypriot side, throughout this process.

It is a clear contradiction that the UN, which claims to stand at an equal distance to both sides, has only sought the approval of one of the sides. Unless the UNSC abandons this biased and contradictory approach and accepts the political equality of the two sides on the Island, it will not be possible for the efforts to find a just and viable settlement to the Cyprus issue to bear fruit.

The Resolution has expressed full support towards the implementation of the recommendations made in the report on the strategic review of UNFICYP, which was published in November 2017. Regarding the said Report, we would like to reiterate our view that what is required is a thorough review of the UNFICYP mandate rather than simply over-viewing its operations. Thus, it is imperative that the UN signs a Status of Forces Agreement which lays the groundwork for the relationship between the UN and the Turkish Cypriot side and that, in this vein,

it seeks the consent of the Turkish Cypriot side as well on all matters concerning the Island.

Concerning the negotiations, although it is recorded that the Conference on Cyprus which took place in June-July 2017 did not result in a comprehensive settlement, the sides are nevertheless urged to “renew their commitment to such a settlement”, namely a bicomunal, bizonal federal settlement. However, along with the collapse of the Cyprus Conference – which constituted the last phase of the 50-year-long negotiation process – the possibility of reaching a settlement under the said parameters has also been eliminated.

It became clear once again in Crans-Montana that the Greek Cypriot side does not wish to share the Island with the Turkish Cypriots and that this mentality will not change. Moreover, the Greek Cypriot side’s holistic rejection of the active and effective guarantee of Turkey – the continuation of which the Turkish Cypriots demand as a precaution against the recurrence of the painful experiences of the past – is another important factor which prevents us reaching a viable settlement in Cyprus.



It is both futile and a waste of time to expect a different outcome by repeating a process which has been proved to be failure for the past 50 years. A negotiation process based on the same substance and method is tantamount to the perpetuation of the inhuman isolation and embargoes which continue to be imposed on the Turkish Cypriots. This is unacceptable. The fact that the UN refrains from making an assessment of these realities ensures the continuation of the status quo, which the UN itself has deemed unacceptable in its reports.

Similar to the previous Resolutions, the present Resolution calls on the implementation of remaining military confidence-building measures. Once again, the Resolution has omitted the fact that Confidence-Building Measures

could not be implemented for a long time due to Greek Cypriot resistance to take the necessary steps towards this end. Moreover, although it is recorded that there have been some proposals and positive initiatives regarding demining in the Buffer Zone, the Resolution fails to refer to the fact that these positive steps have been taken by the Turkish Cypriot side. This omission is yet another indication that utmost attention is paid to opt for wordings in the Resolution which would cause minimal discomfort to the Greek Cypriot side.

Finally, we deem it necessary to emphasize once again that the UN-facilitated negotiations which have taken place with the professed goal of “putting an end to the status quo” have become the very factor serving to maintain it. If the true desire is to obtain a different outcome from the solution process and to make the island a beacon of security and stability in the region, it is important to refrain from repeating the mistakes of the past and to start considering potential alternatives.

Formation of TRNC Government passed to CTP Leader Erhürman

National Unity Party (UBP) leader and Prime Minister Hüseyin Özgürgün yesterday handed back the duty of forming a government to President Mustafa Akıncı after being unable to form a workable majority. Following Özgürgün's decision, President Mustafa Akıncı received the leader of the Republican Turkish Party (CTP) Tufan Erhürman and handed him the task of forming a new government.

Noting that a four-way coalition by the CTP, People's Party (HP), Democratic Party (DP), and Communal Democracy Party (TDP) can be expected due to ongoing talks that have been carried out by these parties, President Akıncı requested

the formation of a new government as soon as possible in order to address the many problems that require urgent solutions in the country.

President Akıncı also advised the coalition partners to work in solidarity rather than compete with one another.

CTP leader Tufan Erhürman stated that he and his coalition partners aimed to establish an equalitarian, libertarian and democratic government which serves society as a whole, and provides the necessary services deserved by the Turkish Cypriot people, underpinned by the rule of law.

The UN Security-Council has renewed the mandate of the United Nations Peacekeeping Force in Cyprus (UNFICYP) for six months.

The UN Security-Council voted in yesterday's meeting to extend UNFICYP's mandate, which was due to expire at the end of this month (January).

The Security-Council unanimously

extended the mission of the UN Peacekeeping Force in Cyprus until 31 July 2018.

UNFICYP is one of the longest-running UN Peacekeeping missions, which has operated in the island since 1964. Its mission is extended every six months by the Security-Council.

From Kyrenia Animal Rescue...

The Annual registration for 2018 is now due. The registration should be made with your local Belediyesi.

You will be required to show proof of your dogs microchip registration (certificate/receipt) and will be asked to pay 17TL for male dogs or neutered female dogs and 55TL for an un-neutered female.

If your dog is over 6 months old and does not have a microchip then you

should visit your Veterinary clinic immediately and ask to have your dog implanted with a microchip and the registration form for the Government Veterinary Department completed.

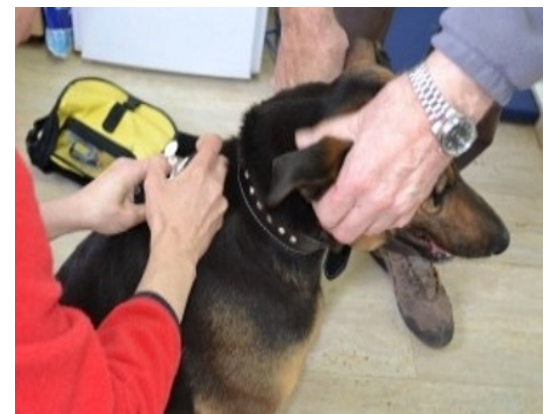
It is the law that all dogs have a microchip as a means of identification. This is very valuable if your dog strays, is involved in an incident or if there is any dispute with regards to ownership. Also any dog travelling out of the country will firstly require a microchip before any other of the export regulations can continue. Street dogs collected for neutering by the

local authorities, as well as being tagged, are also being given a microchip for identification purposes.

Holistic and General Education in North Cyprus

As we look at the education this island has to offer the next generation, most of us with children and grandchildren are well aware of the great demands placed upon school pupils than ever before, from relentless assessments to excessive homework. Here in North Cyprus, we have local schools who offer a sound Turkish education, (although largely taught in large class sizes) to some independent alternatives that may offer either a constant turn around in staff, inconsistency or little knowledge of how to work with teenagers.

Holistic education is definitely under-represented here.

One particular independent school seems to be moving in the right direction, combining and attracting both native born, well educated, native staff that remain in posts for years, with a British education which is recognised worldwide. The continuity the staff provides, in turn creates a happy, nurturing atmosphere for all ages. This medium sized school is taking strides towards excellence as it remains successful due to its small class sizes, in which a day to day working knowledge of each child’s ability can take place. Whether this changes over time, remains to be seen.

There are also specialist schools on the island, which provide additional one to one tuition for children who require a more tailor-made approach. Those individuals who need to be challenged and are

constrained by the pace that their classroom has set, or indeed those who need time to fully engage in an academic concept and absorb it fully before moving on.

Holistic education nurtures these individuals. It celebrates the individuality of a child and engages them fully. Holistic education teaches them to love learning and see it as a fun and life-long endeavour. It isn’t simply represented by a certificate, but something tangible, useable and maintainable.

Kyrenia Academy in Bellapais is the only actively holistic centre for such learning, in North Cyprus. It was established to

nurture all children, without defining or restricting them or the way they learn.

Are we Good or Bad?

There cannot be two views on this issue. We all are good and we all are bad. This is what we have got from nature. So for the whole of our lives we continuously struggle to go for good and to avoid what's bad.

But first of all we must know, what is good and what is bad. I will not share here the definitions of these two words, because there is no need at all for that, since we all know what is good and what is bad. But the fact is that the definition of good and bad differs from person to person.

In fact good is what our parents had told us, and bad too. Our parents are the first ones who make us understand what is good and what is bad. For example in the good old days our parents used to say, "do not play with those boys". This used to mean that those boys were bad or in other words, were not good. This is how we all learned to distinguish good from bad. Step by step we all started learning. Then came a time when we all started learning from others too, apart from our parents alone.

We started learning from our friends, teachers, and from other people around us. But that's not all. We started learning from Television, Radio, Newspapers, magazines, etc etc. All of these in one way or another tried to show how to differentiate good from bad. We keep on learning both bad and good.

In the next stage we learned from the laws, rules and regulations. In fact these are for those who still have not yet learned to distinguish good from

the bad, and that's the last chance of learning for us. But it's not just learning only, it's the application of all that we have learned, in our day-to-day lives, which is important.

But the problem is that whatever we learned from our parents, friends, teachers, etc etc, only tell us what THEY ALL think as good or bad. They may differ from each other, although in general they all teach us the same, but clash when their preferences in more than one sphere may differ. That's one reason why our own understanding of good and bad start getting mixed up, when we take decisions of our own. This is where the laws, rules and regulations forcibly make us draw clear lines between good and bad.

However, the social structure and culture of areas differ from place to place.

Though the definitions of good and bad remain the same, their application differs from one society to another, from place to place and from country to country. Some cultures strictly

forbid something whereas the same has been considered as acceptable somewhere else. It is the social practices that allow flexibility in the definitions. The laws, rules and regulations also work the same way. They differ from country to country, from state to state.

But there are still some basics which are universal in nature. Honesty, for example is a good deed everywhere, however if we work out a statistical survey of different societies and countries, we will find that in some countries a big proportion of people are honest, whereas it's not the same in some other country.

It is the extent of tolerance of something bad in a particular society or culture, or appreciation and acknowledgement of something good, that forms the overall social and cultural behaviour, but the individuals remain to take their own decisions, about going for something good or bad.

The bare fact however is that we all are both good and bad at the same time. No one can claim that he/she is completely good. That is impossible. We all love to do something which is not good. We all loved to steal the cookies from the kitchen, even when our mother had strictly forbidden us.

We all loved to be naughty. In fact we all had been naughty.

The desire and areas of activities differ

as we advance in our lives. Some of us do more good than bad, whereas some end up doing more bad than good. In fact it is the society, cultural norms and the laws of the areas that ultimately give their decision, and declare someone as good or bad.

The world is filled with instances where someone officially declared as bad guy does more good than many others. At the same time we find people who have been looked upon as good guys by the society, are in fact involved in activities which are considered to be bad. Most of us, even when doing something bad, usually make ourselves believe that whatever we do is not bad.

My question in the end however is, apart from what others think about us, what do we think about ourselves. This is the question that the whole society should ask itself. This is the question that we all must ask to ourselves, repeatedly. Are we good or bad? Our own personal assessment is what matters the most and makes the real difference.

Kyrenia Animal Rescue - Pet Travel - A Cautionary Tale

Over the last couple of months KAR (Kyrenia Animal Rescue) Pet Travel had been asked to help with the relocation of a cat (M) and dog (L) to the UK. Nothing unusual in that you may think as it is something we are doing day in and day out.

Sadly, however, this relocation did not go to plan.

The pets had originated from Russia and had several vet books and vet records. Some were in English, some in Russian and one in yet another language. Some vaccinations had been done in Russia, some in another Eastern bloc Country and others in TRNC (Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus). So it was quite difficult to trace back and check that everything was in order and recorded correctly - as the records were not all in the same format and many were not in English. The all important Rabies Serology Test Certificate was issued by a laboratory in Russia.

The owner had had some help (from an agency we understand) in Russia to prepare her pets for entry to TRNC, a couple of years ago. Since being in the TRNC she had kept up to date with their rabies vaccinations.

As a matter of course, I had checked that the Russian Lab was one of the EU approved labs acceptable for pet travel into EU and it was. We worked through the books linking the dates from the information given and it seemed that everything was in order.

Their travel dates were set and M was travelling on a Tuesday, with L following on the Wednesday, (as we cannot send cats and dogs together). Their owner had already left for the UK and would be collecting them from Heathrow.

M arrived at Heathrow on the Wednesday and began her UK

clearing process. Late in the afternoon, I received a phone call to say that there was a problem with M's paperwork and there was a concern that the same issue would apply to L - could we stop L from flying. However, it was too late - she was almost at Istanbul on her journey to UK.

We were not told what the issue was at that stage, just that it was a very serious issue! As you can imagine we were horrified - what had happened? Had we not checked something correctly? Had we missed some information out of the paperwork? Had we not counted the days correctly? What ? We scrutinized the copies over and over and could not see anything amiss.

Then came the explanation call ---- it was NOT an error on our partbut it was SERIOUS and M was being denied UK entry. The Rabies Serology Test was a fraudulent one and had not been issued by the Russian Lab at all. **The test certificate was ILLEGAL.**

Many phone calls and emails went on late into the night between us, London, UK agents and the distraught owner. There was no other way for M to remain in the UK, but to remain in quarantine for a period up to 4 months - she would need to begin the whole process again, overseen by the UK authorities (who would also

be carrying out further investigations into the fraud).

Sadly, L would also have to go into quarantine on arrival in the UK, as she too had a similar certificate and, once checked with the lab in Russia, it too was deemed **ILLEGAL**.

It is so upsetting for us to have a relocation end in such a way - it is very stressful for everyone (and more so for the pets) concerned. It has turned out to be a **VERY expensive relocation** for the owner and she will be apart from her pets (although she can visit them) for up to 4 months. She has tried to establish how it happened and we are led to believe that it was connected in some way to the agency that initially helped her in Russia - but we do not know that for a fact.

We have spoken at length to the UK authorities to see if there was some way in which we could have known - but the certificates were so well forged that we would not have known. What they have explained is that there are certain Countries, and certain types of animal relocations, that receive extended scrutiny as they have been linked with previous issues of trying to avoid the rules and regulations that apply to pet travel. The consequence of trying to beat the system is very, very, serious

It was not a Happy day for KAR Pet Travel but it does serve to remind us that despite all of the checks that we put in place - sometimes it can still go horribly wrong.

"The baby has to be taken care of" so that The Soulist will remain in Alsancak for the next few years. "Rock on" and "Much more than this" Alper Cengiz.

Its year of construction is not known although it was built during the Ottoman period and after restoration it was opened officially as the Eaved House Centre of Culture and Arts on 23 December 1996.

The building is L-shaped and surrounds an inner courtyard. The lower floor displays Lusignan architecture, whereas the upper floor displays the Ottoman architectural

style and was developed as a house during the Ottoman period upon the remains of a medieval building.

7th and 8th February

Zoom: The children are given images of their trip to the Alagadi beach and are asked to put them in order according to when and what they did. This activity needs communication skills and awareness of their previous trip to make it a memory for a lifetime...

Kyrenia Castle

Photo Hunt: The children are given 10 pre-taken pictures of details of Kyrenia Castle. They are separated into two groups with an adult team leader. The children are given the chance to look around the castle to find where the pictures belong in a given period of time. The team leader

TRNC students complete their first semester exams

On 30th January, Elementary, Primary, Junior and High School students completed their first exams of the year 2017-2018 and will now take a half-term vacation and start lessons again on 16th February.

According to the information given by the Ministry of Education and Culture, there are 113 primary schools with 20,000 students, 3,549 in 11 special

schools, a total of 23,549 students being educated.

There are 32 General Directorate of Higher Education facilities with 20,312 students, 12 schools are affiliated to Vocational Technical Education Office and 8 private schools, also 3,416 Junior and High School students, giving a total of 23,728 students who are continuing education.

The total number of Primary, Secondary and High School students in the TRNC is 47,277.

A total of 5,298 teachers are employed in the country as a whole and 1,196 in private schools.

The summer vacation will start in the first week in June and the new academic year 2018-2019 will commence on 17th September 2018.

College Entrance Examination (KGS) will be held on 9th June and Bülent Ecevit Anatolian High School (BEAL) and 20 July Science High School Placement Examinations will take place on 23rd June.

Students completing the 8th grade will be admitted to the Vocational High School programs between 21st and 25th June.

Unscrambling breakfast in Cyprus

Personal notes from a foreign wife.

Most world travelers would agree that taste preferences and rituals concerning food and eating are influenced by our cultural background. Cypriot cuisine is no exception to this concept, with its own peculiar food combinations and mealtime habits. Visitors to the island need to approach their time in Cyprus with an open mind if they want to learn about traditional menus and eating practices.

Take breakfast for instance. When I was newly married in Perth, Western Australia, to my Cypriot husband, I wanted to impress his sister and her daughter who had come from Sydney, New South Wales, for the wedding. For breakfast I prepared what to my own Canadian family would be called a Sunday special; tenderly cooked fluffy scrambled eggs piled high on hot buttered toast. After placing a plate in front of everyone, there followed a moment of awkward silence and the explanation "We don't usually eat food like this".

My husband jumped to the rescue and quickly filled the table with plates of sliced cucumber, tomato wedges, black olives, cheese and chunks of crusty bread in a colourful presentation. Even though I had all those foods in the kitchen it had not occurred to me that someone would prefer them to my scrambled eggs. My indoctrination into Cypriot food preferences had begun.

Strangely enough, that Mediterranean breakfast menu was exactly repeated on my very first day in Cyprus on our first visit. It was in June and we had flown in on a very early flight, arriving in the village where my husband's parents lived about 9 o'clock in the morning. His mother and father were in the fields as it was harvest time and a neighbour, with true Cypriot hospitality, took us in while she sent word to my in-laws of our arrival. She made us welcome with a breakfast spread of (you guessed it) cucumbers, tomatoes, olives, cheese and bread. I was going to see a lot of this, I thought.



One of the hardest concepts for me to get used to was that bowls of last night's soup were acceptable breakfast fare. To me the idea almost smacks of punishment as my mother always said "If you don't eat your dinner you'll get it for breakfast!" I would watch curiously as my husband broke bread into a steaming bowl of lentil and rice soup, or the yogurt and wheat soup called tarhana, lacing it all with juice from half a lemon. Cypriots can be identified by the way they liberally use lemon juice on their food; on meat, chicken and fish as well as on raw and boiled vegetables, and even fried eggs.

Olive oil is also essential in the kitchen and Cypriots have their own special "black" oil. Made by boiling green olives before pressing, the resulting dark green oil has a stronger taste, almost musty. Highly valued by many, it is an acquired taste and is excellent used in salads and over boiled vegetables in combination with the inevitable tangy lemon juice.

Summer breakfasts in Cyprus are full of fruit of every variety. The sweet, moist flavours mix with salty cheeses and seem to provide what the body craves at the beginning of another hot day. Slices of cold watermelon, cantaloupe, green and purple figs and grapes of all kinds adorn the table in the bounty of their season.

From March, after the lambs are weaned, to about late July there is an abundance of sheep's milk and village women make fresh hellim cheese. This squeaky cheese, which boasts as being the only cheese that can be fried without losing its shape, is stored in salted whey in large jars. A soft ricotta-type cheese, called nor, is produced by boiling the whey. This is pressed into basket moulds to drain and, if salted and dried, can be grated on noodle dishes, but left fresh it is another breakfast favourite. Some salt it slightly or it can be eaten with sugar or pekmez, carob syrup.

A start to the day wouldn't be Cypriot without olives on the table. Black olives are preserved in October in handfuls of rock salt in large containers such as a wooden barrel or large pottery jar, or kúp. According to my husband, black olives in Cyprus are traditionally never served in olive oil but are dry looking and firm to bite. Çakistez are green olives, cracked by hitting with a stone and cured quickly by soaking in water which is changed daily. In about 5 days the bitter taste is gone and they become edible, particularly seasoned with olive oil, lemon juice, crushed garlic and pounded coriander seeds.

Bread at every meal is essential and is never buttered. A large round crusty village loaf is something any Cypriot would die for, and you think they will when they grab it to their chest and start to slice off thick pieces with a big knife. Black olives and hellim can be baked in bread, becoming zeytinli and helimli, respectively and are best enjoyed hot out of the oven on baking day.

Local honey is wonderful, varying in taste depending on where the hives are kept. While some like the lemony taste of honey made by the bees kept near the citrus orchards, I prefer the delicious nectar of the mountain based hives and the bees that visit the many wild flowering shrubs and trees. As far as making jams and marmalades goes, I feel that many Cypriots haven't mastered the knack. I think it is because they try to make it the way they make the traditional spoon sweets, which have firm pieces of fruit in lots of thick syrup. Another more traditional spread for bread is made by mixing pekmez (carob molasses) with tahin (sesame seed paste),

sort of like sweet peanut butter.

As for the breakfast cup, I remember an English friend disappointingly describing the weak tea served by her husband's Cypriot relatives as "hot water that a tea bag ran through". When we first arrived in Cyprus, instant coffee was never served black but came made with all milk and two spoons of sugar, or else with a big dollop of sweetened condensed milk. Now, however, Cypriots have become accustomed to varied European tastes and sugar and milk are now served separately at restaurants for clients to make their own choice. What makes me smile is the way Cypriots leave the spoon in the cup while they drink; not the kind of etiquette I was brought up with. Dipping biscuits or bread in one's cup is also well tolerated, even into the small cups of Turkish coffee. I think this habit dates to when most bread on baking day was dried and crisped in the oven overnight to preserve it for the families' supply for a week or two. While a hard chunk could be easily stuffed into a pocket for munching on while walking or in the fields, at the table these dried crisp breads were dipped in water or crumbled in soup to be softened and eaten. My father-in-law had a favourite metal



jug that he used for softening his bread and was annoyed once when I, newly arrived and unaware of this practice, used it to mix up some soap with sponge for washing the dishes.

Cypriots love to eat eggs in winter in abundance but claim not to tolerate the smell of eggs in the hot weather. They don't know about scrambled eggs (obviously) but eat them boiled, fried or as an omelet, or mixed with fried vegetables (such as potatoes, mushrooms or artichokes) as a quick meal. I have come to the conclusion that many Cypriots don't know how to fry a decent egg. My women friends sometimes show me painful splatter burns on their forearms or

face as a result of trying to control the frying of a bubbling spitting egg in copious amounts of oil. Shortly after arriving in Cyprus we were visited by a party of relatives, man, wife and kids. As they had come a long way, I prepared a quick meal for them, chips, salad, fried hellim and eggs for everyone. My female guest was openly fascinated at the gentle way I cooked the eggs, with a pat of butter, not oil, and with the lid on, resulting in firm whites and soft yolks (perfect for the inevitable dipping). Needless to say, they were a great success and have actually been mentioned at family gatherings as something truly amazing. Mentally I lick my finger and notch one up on the invisible score board. My scrambled eggs may not be appreciated but now I feel redeemed.

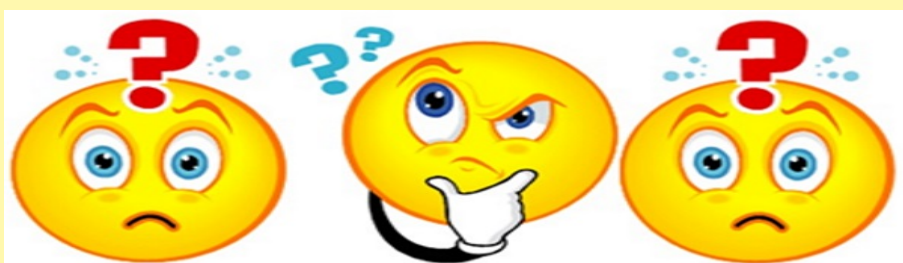

Remembering Ava Gardner 1922 to 1990

25th January 2018 was the 28th anniversary of the death of AVA GARDNER, an American film actress, who had sensationalised the film world not just by her beauty but also by her talent of acting in the mid twentieth century. Her acting career spanned a long period of time.

Born to poor parents, on 24th December 1922, in a small community outside North Carolina, she spent a pretty quiet period until the age of 18, when her brother-in-law introduced her to modelling in New York.

Then onwards it's a long period of hard work and struggle for young Ava.

At the age of 24 she was established as a gorgeous actress in "The Killers", where she played a gun moll who betrays her lover. "One Touch of Venus" in 1948, "The Great Sinner" in 1949 and "Pandora and the Flying Dutchman" in 1951, were her most important films of that period. In total she starred in 60 movies during her professional acting career which spanned from 1942 to 1981.

She did have two early brief marriages, to Mickey Rooney and Artie Shaw. Each marriage ended in separation after less than a year and finally in divorce. Subsequently she married Frank Sinatra in 1951. It was a highly publicized marriage of that era, but unfortunately ended in 1957.

In 1958 she left MGM and started working as an independent



She played in couple of Television plays too, but was not so much interested in that sphere.

Later on she moved to London. On 25th January 1990 she died of chronic lung disease and the lingering effects of a couple of strokes.

She was 67 when died.

She was buried beside her parents in North Carolina.

actress. She appeared in a number of movies including "55 Days at Peking" (1963), "Seven Days in May" (1964), "Mayerling" (1969), "The Life and Times of Judge Roy Bean" (1972), "The Blue Bird" (1976).

For a large part of her acting career she was in competition with Sophia Loren, Elizabeth Taylor, Marilyn Monroe, Brigitte Bardot, but she did make a mark for herself in the field of acting and beauty.

Esentepe Bruised, Battered but Victorious

AKOVA VURDU TCB 1 ESENTEPE KKSK 3

Saturday January 27, 2018 : K-Pet League 1 : Akova Eray Vudali Stadi

On a glorious, sunny January afternoon, the compact Eray Vudali Stadi was packed for this first ever visit of Esentepe to Akova for a League match.

The match did not disappoint, we are privileged to live in this beautiful island, the same with football, some matches are easily forgotten, this match it was a privileged to be there.

Esentepe were backs to wall for most of the match, defending in numbers, throwing their bodies on the line on numerous occasions, shots were charged down or when the defensive wall was breached they found Esentepe Goalkeeper Kemal Molla in top form.

Injured in a heavy challenge early on, the goalkeeper bravely dealt with everything that was thrown at him. Kemal handling of crosses either high or low was immaculate.

It was not all one way traffic, Esentepe had their chances, breaking quickly using the pace of Ahmet on the right. Ahmet had an outstanding game on the right, scoring twice and could easily have had a hat trick, missing two clear chances.

Esentepe threatened first in the 10th minute when a Muhammed free kick from around 25 yards, was brilliantly turned over the bar



by Akova's keeper Dervis.

Esentepe took the lead in the 15th minute when Captain BAŞAK cleverly flicked home a Mahmut corner from the left. **0-1**

The lead did not last long with Akova equalising in the 28th minute and probably for the only time in the match, poor defending from Esentepe. A Çemil free kick from the left was met by burly defender SÜLEYMAN who headed home unchallenged. **1-1.**

Akova were denied the lead shortly after, from another Çemil corner. Kemal diving to his right to brilliantly push away an Irfan header.

Esentepe took advantage of this, regaining the lead in the 25th minute, when a superb through ball from Mahmut found AHMET running into the area and he finished expertly with a low shot from an acute angle. **HALF TIME SCORE : 1-2.**

It was all Akova in the second half, their efforts either finding the safe hands of Kemal or shooting over the bar.

Irfan was narrowly wide with a shooting chance that went inches wide, with Kemal at full stretch. Minutes later Osman had a ferocious shot beaten away by Kemal.

Esentepe Coach Davut Kansu, made a tactical change in the 65th minute bringing on experienced defender Nersin to reinforce the defence, in place of the hardworking Yakup in midfield.

With Akova pushing forward this left gaps at the back in their defence and Esentepe had 2 glorious chances to increase their lead. Firstly in the 71st minute Başak brilliantly headed onto Ahmet but with only the goalkeeper to beat he tamely shot at Dervis. A minute later Esentepe's new signing Ilkay, on

as a substitute, crossed from the left, where an unmarked Başak headed straight at Dervis.

Akova were throwing everything at Esentepe including the kitchen sink, but the defence held firm. With 6 minutes of injury time being played, Esentepe broke quickly with a 3 on 1 situation, Hüseyin put in from the left a perfect low cross to AHMET to score again with a low shot from an acute angle. **FULL TIME SCORE : 1-3**
