Both the 1996 and 2023 pictures were taken standing at Woodward and Adelaide looking in a northeasterly direction. It's impossible to stand exactly where the 1996 picture was taken because you would probably be standing in the middle of someone's living room. Today condominiums occupy the site. Directly across the street is Little Caesars Arena. Before there were condos on the site the LaSalle Hotel stood there. When the hotel opened in 1926 it was called the Savoy. It was an opulent destination for lodgers. Less than three years later (for reasons unclear) the name was changed to the LaSalle. In 1930, one of the most violent murders in prohibition era America happened there. (Article on page 7). That same year a double murder occurred there, and a woman jumped, or was pushed, off of the roof. Soon after, daily rates began, which attracted transients. The hotel closed in 1984 and was demolished in 1996.

The State of Pro Sports in Detroit

The Future is Bright for the Lions, Tigers & Wings, Pistons Need Help



LIONS-Only a total meltdown can ruin the great start of the Lions. At press time the Lions record stands at 9-4 with the tough Denver Broncos on the horizon. I do not want to be a naysayer but the Lions are not playing their best football. That is a problem because this is the critical part of the season. After the Broncos they go on the road to play the Vikings, next the Cowboys, then they finish the season at home against the Vikings. They could easily go 0-4 and miss the playoffs. To ensure that does not happen, the offensive line must toughen up and Jared Goff must regain his early season sharpness. The defense has to play violently and allow an average of 17 points (or less) the rest of the season. We hope they finish 13-4. In reality they will split the last four games and finish 11-6 and eke into the playoffs.



RED WINGS-It's going to be a good spring in Detroit. After making the playoffs for twenty-five straight seasons the team has missed the playoffs the past seven. That gloomy streak will end this season. General Manager Steve Yzerman added needed scoring in the off season and it's paying off. The energetic Daniel Sprong seems to be at the right place at the right time. He was acquired to score goals and he is doing just that. Additionally, he is not a liability on defense. The Sprong acquisition was done to make up for the loss of Dominik Kulbalić who was traded to Ottawa to acquire star forward, and metro Detroit native, Alex Debrincat. Scoring 40 goals is not out of the question for Debrincat and he is on pace to score 40, or more. Adding Patrick Kane is a plus too. Sure, he is 35 years old and recently had hip surgery, but so what. This is future Hall of Famer Patrick Kane! He still has something left in the tank. Let's not forget the additions of Klim Kostin, J.T. Compher, Shane Gostisbehere, Christian Fischer, and Justin Holl. Although Holl and Kostin are on injured reserve they'll be alright before playoff time. Just as Captain Dylan Larkin will be fine before the playoffs begin. Larkin was viciously crosschecked on his back while simultaneously being crunched in the face by two Ottawa Senators. David Perron was suspended for coming to Larkin's defense. That incident should be a hint to Yzerman. **MORE TOUGHNESS IS NEEDED!** Scoring is good, but teams are going to beat you up during the playoffs. That's why it is imperative the Red Wings acquire at least two "Stu Grimson" tough guy types before the playoffs start.



TIGERS-I am about do something a sportswriter never does. Retract a statement. In our Sept. / Oct. '23 issue, The Monthly Standard (TMS) wrote: "The best player move of 2023 was made by the player himself when Eduardo Rodriguez rejected the Tigers trade to the L.A. Dodgers." TMS was wrong! The player the Tigers wanted will probably be an All-Star one day. It's obvious. I am impressed with Scott Harris. He's young but he is knowledgeable. Bringing in Jeff Greenberg as his General Manager was a great move too. Harris and Greenberg have reinvigorated the Tigers with a burst of energy that should last a long time. It's going to be a fun summer. The fall will be better, because the Tigers will finish in first place in 2024 and return to the playoffs. The Tigers finished in second place last year and had a winning record on the road. The experience gained by their young core of talented players is invaluable. Look for big years from: Tyler Holton, Alex Lange, Kerry Carpenter, Spencer Torkelson, and Riley Greene. Look for Matt Manning to come back strong from his injury. Look for Javier Baez to return to All-Star form too. The new acquisitions are going to put the team over the top. Outfielder Mark Canha can hit for power and is a good RBI man. We also have reliever Andrew Chafin back. A steady lefthander is needed out of the bullpen and they have him in Chafin. The biggest off-season move (so far) is the acquisition of pitcher Kenta Maeda from division rival Minnesota. Maeda will now post victories for the Tigers causing the teams to flip-flop in the standings with the Tigers winding up on top. Tigers President Scott Harris is ensuring a pleasurable experience at the ballpark and while watching at home. This off season the Tigers secured the services of the best play by play announcer in the game, Jason Benetti. **PLAY BALL!**

From the 1910's to the 1930's The Purple Gang Ruled Detroit



If you think Detroit is a tough town now it pales in comparison to the city during the heyday of the Purple Gang. The gang is said to have begun sometime in the 1910's decade. I contend it was probably earlier than that. The unquestioned leader of the Purple Gang was Abe Bernstein. He was born in 1891. I am sure he and other neighborhood toughs caused havoc during their teenage years, circa 1905 or so. It's safe to say the gang was firmly established by 1916. These guys were arch criminals. They engaged in murder, kidnapping, extortion, arson, robbery, bootlegging, and more! The lawlessness that prevailed in Detroit from 1916 thru 1933 was influenced by the Purple Gang. In that time span approximately 50 police officers were killed by gunfire in Detroit. By comparison in the 17 years from 2006 to 2023 (thankfully) only 5 DPD officers have died from gunfire. That's a HUGE difference. The city was truly more violent 100 years ago. Let's take a look at the deaths of three Detroit Police Department officers from that bygone era.



Edward M. McLaughlin

On November 13, 1916 he was shot several times with his own revolver in the head, chest, and back. His empty revolver was laid on top of him.



Det. Sergeant Emmanuel Roggers

On July 24, 1917 he was shot 12 times by members of the Purple Gang. Roggers, who was investigating them, was ambushed on Lafayette near Orleans.



Reed Howard

On March 25, 1932, Detroit's first black officer killed in the line of duty was working undercover when he was shot by the owner of a Purple Gang controlled blind pig.

Another notable police incident involving the Purple Gang was the murder of of Patrolman Vivian Welsh. He was a dirty cop. He tried to extort the extortionists. His hubris came to an end when he was ambushed and riddled with bullets by the Purple's on February 1, 1927. Al Capone knew the booze coming across the Detroit River from Canada supplied the USA. Capone wanted that money. Abe Bernstein, along with his brothers, Joe, Ray, and Izzy told Capone "whatever comes across that river is ours." Knowing a war with the Purples was a losing battle. Capone went back to Chicago. The Purples introduced the Tommy Gun to Detroit during the Milaflores massacre. They also controlled politicians. Details on the next page. They Even Controlled the Mayor

Believe it or not, in the 1920's the Ku Klux Klan openly endorsed mayoral candidates in Detroit. In 1925, the candidate favored by the KKK was Charles E. Bowles. He lost that election. Two years later he lost again. (Mayoral terms were two years back then). In the interim, he became a Records Court Judge. In the election of 1929, he finally won. Bowles, from Yale Michigan, defeated John C. Lodge in the primary, and John W. Smith in the general election. Churches within the city supported Bowles because he was the "dry" candidate. (Which means he supported prohibition). Bowles took office on January 14, 1930, and the booze immediately began to flow in Detroit. Many people referred to the city as "wide open" because gambling dens, speakeasies, and whorehouses were here in profusion. Additionally, Bowles appointed Joseph Gillespie as commissioner of Public Works. This move was controversial because Gillespie was unceremoniously removed as the police commissioner years earlier. Vice was running rampant in Detroit under Gillespie. History was repeating itself. Harold H. Emmons was the police commissioner under Bowles, but he was rendered impotent. Emmons could not stand idle anymore. When Bowles and Gillespie went on a trip to Louisville to attend the Kentucky Derby Emmons decided to act. He quickly cracked down on crime. The Detroit Police arrested 276 people. Upon his return from Kentucky Bowles was infuriated. He fired Emmons and replaced him with his flunky Thomas C. Wilcox. It seemed to many that Bowles showed favoritism to gangsters. An editorial in the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette added fuel to that opinion when they wrote:

Gerald E. (Jerry) Buckley

The failure of the government to address the vice issue is hypocrisy at best and collusion at worst.

Recall

Radio announcer Jerry Buckley was a man of the people. The popular Buckley was Detroit's first celebrity media personality. He worked at WMBC. (Which evolved into WJLB). Buckley advocated for the aged and the unemployed, and his efforts were successful. Many unemployed workers owed their future employment to Buckley's crusade. Not long after Bowles was elected Buckley began criticizing his administration. Buckley was the first to suggest recalling Bowles. As corruption in the city became more and more evident, Buckley's recall efforts intensified. He told his radio audience that "Gillespie was the real Mayor of Detroit and that Bowles was following his instructions." In 1930, the month of July was violent in Detroit. There were 11 murders in 19 days. All unsolved. Meanwhile, Buckley's recall efforts were successful. The recall election was scheduled for July 22, 1930. Buckley, of course, instructed his listeners to vote against Bowles. They listened. At approximately 11:30 pm Buckley gave his listeners the results. Bowles was recalled by a vote of 120,863 to 89,907. About 2 hours later Buckley would be dead.

Murder

At 1:40 am on July 23, 1930, (the same day the Detroit Riot started 37 years later) Buckley was sitting in the lobby of the LaSalle Hotel on Woodward. Three men walked in the door. Two of the men walked up to Buckley and shot him, point blank, 11 times. He died immediately. Bowles was suspected, but there was no direct evidence against him. Buckley's brother, Paul, a former assistant prosecutor, said the murder "was likely committed by the former Mayor's underworld connections."

BACK IN THE DAY

When Run-DMC Found Out Detroit is Like No Other City

The New York City Fresh Festival was the world's first major rap tour (kicked off in 1984), which included Kurtis Blow, Grandmaster Flash, The Fat Boys, Whodini, Run-DMC and others. I had the opportunity to be one of the advance promoters during its 3-year run, responsible for 20 of the over 60 cities annually.

Since I was pretty tight with Detroit radio legend, The Electrifying Mojo, working as his opening act at his big parties for a few years, he would have me call in to the station and give updates as the Fresh Fest tour traveled across the U.S. Mojo was mainly interested in what tunes these groups were performing at the shows. All the artists loved and respected Detroit, so I would always talk to them about what songs were hot in "The D."

One day I had a conversation with Run-DMC about when they came to Detroit, they have to perform "Can You Rock It Like This." Because of Mojo, that record was super hot in Detroit. It was so Detroit! Very up tempo. (135 beats per minute) This was in 1985. As we got closer to the Detroit date, I kept reminding them that this tune was hot as hell in Detroit. They said; "they had never did this song on the tour." They probably thought it just something I wanted.

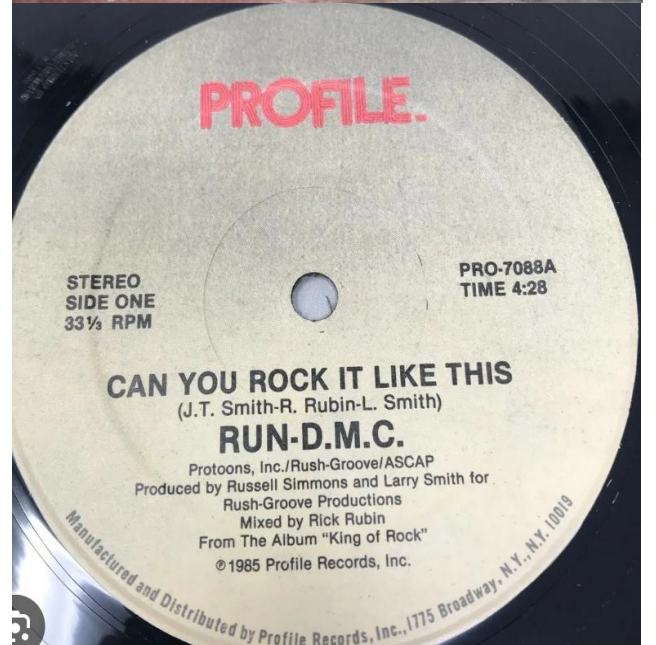
I was like, *I'll give y'all some proof.* I asked them if they heard of The Electrifying Mojo, and they said, "of course we know Mojo, he's the man." I said *let's get him on the phone.* So there was Run-DMC having a conversation with Mojo, and by the time they hung up, Run-DMC was trying to figure out where they were going to put that song in their set.

I'm not sure where they placed that song, but when they cranked it out, Joe Louis Arena exploded! The energy level was beyond maximum. It was something out of a Hollywood movie. Run-DMC talked about that experience for a long time. Run constantly said: "Man, Detroit was live, and they knew every word."

Thanks Mojo for making it happen.

'The St. Valentine's Day Massacre'

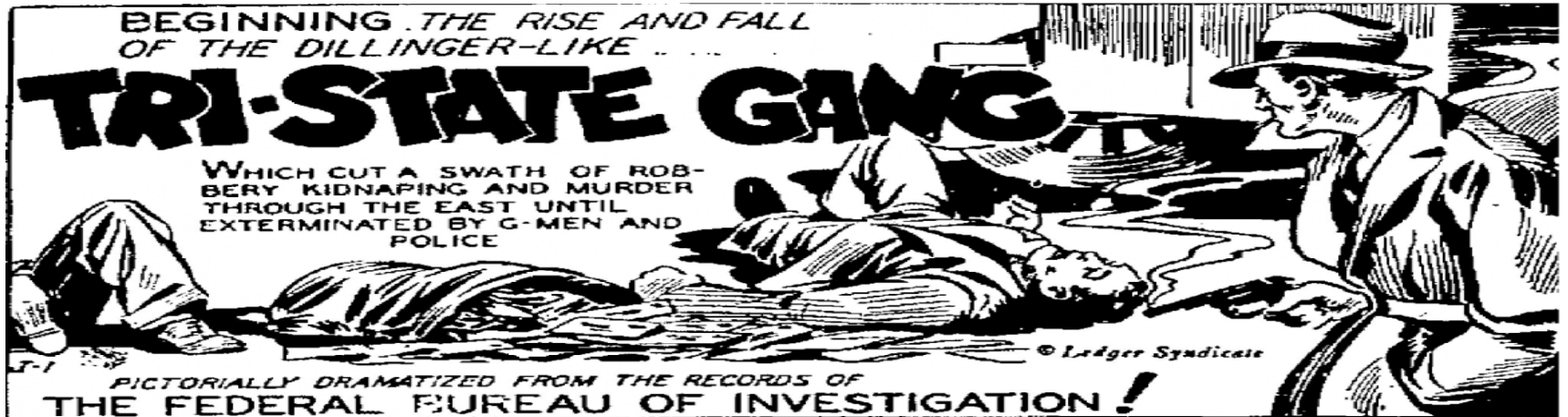

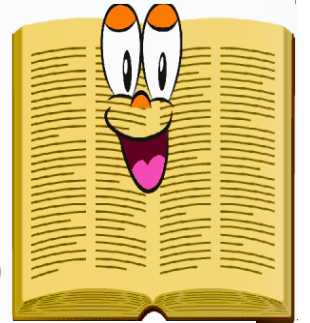

4. INTEREST REDUCTION STIPULATED PAYMENT AGREEMENT:

If eligible, this plan reduces your interest rate from 18% to 6%.
