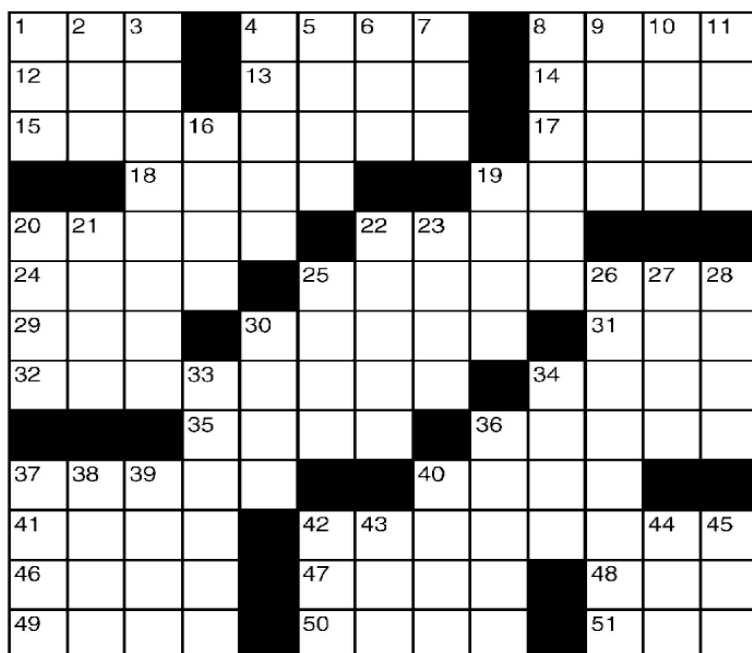

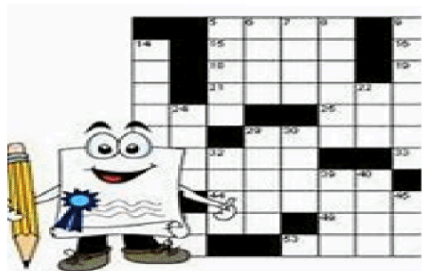

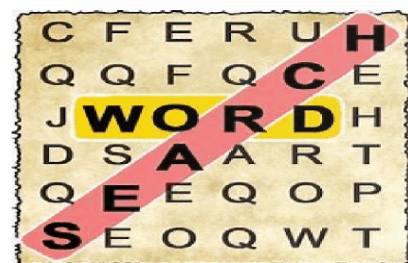

Wayne County Treasurer Eric R. Sabree Successfully Hosts 8th Annual Veterans Resource Fair

Another major change are the buildings in the immediate foreground on the left. The older pic shows Detroit's Federal Building. Demolished in 1931. The 2024 pic shows the current United States Courthouse that replaced it.

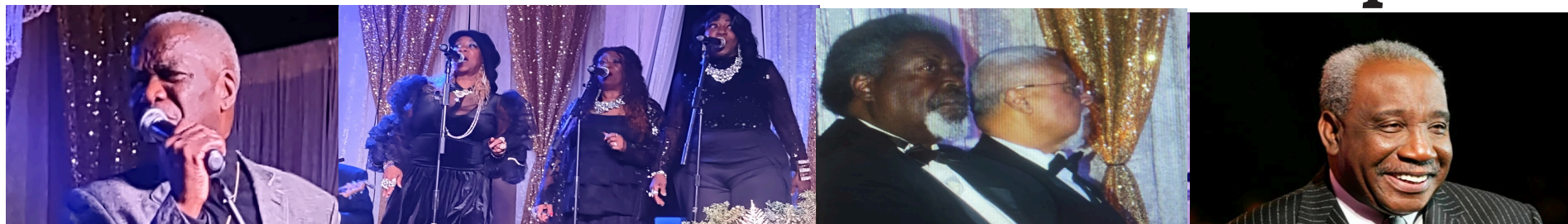

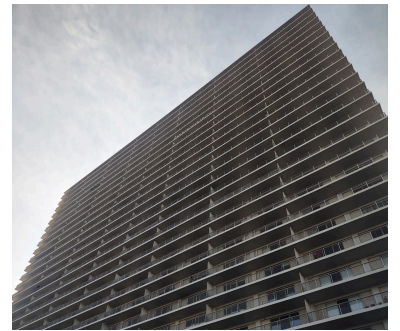

RESIDENTS ARE COMPLAINING AT THE JEFFERSONIAN APARTMENTS



This article hits The Monthly Standard (TMS) hard. This publication has a soft spot for the Jeffersonian Apartments. This writer lived there from 1996-2009 and loved every second of it. The building has thick walls for extra privacy. Each unit has its own furnace and central air. The spectacular views from their spacious balconies are the best in the city. Back in the day, residents received many amenities. There used to be a doorman AND on site security that examined every vehicle upon entrance. (And exit). Both were on site 24 hours a day. The extra layer of security made residents feel safe and secure. That was over fifteen years ago. Back then, the Jeffersonian was the epitome of safety. Today, the Jeffersonian has a car theft problem and had a murder in one of the hallways in the past year. Yes, it's safe to say the Jeffersonian has lost its luster.

Standing at 9000 East Jefferson, the Jeffersonian Apartment Building still retains its aesthetic and architectural beauty. As of late, reports have surfaced that tells a story of neglect, discomfort, and a profound breach of basic living standards. Unfortunately, there's more disarray. Additional reports have surfaced of garbage accumulating on several floors, creating an unhealthy and unsightly environment. Overflowing trash bags can attract pests and surely generates foul odors.

For residents, this is not just an inconvenience; it's a serious health concern that demands immediate attention. Adding to the growing list of grievances, (according to an online video from a resident) the elevators in the Jeffersonian are inoperable. This means residents must trek up countless flights of stairs, often with groceries or other necessities in tow. This is particularly challenging for elderly tenants or those with mobility concerns. What should be a simple journey turns into an exhausting ordeal that hampers the quality of life of many residents.

To further exacerbate the situation, the building is currently experiencing severe water issues. Residents are confronting the disturbing reality of water backing up in sinks and bathtubs, creating unsanitary conditions that are simply unacceptable. The absence of water, a fundamental human right, compounds the crisis. Simple everyday pleasures such as; washing hands, bathing, or brushing your teeth should never be a burden. Especially when you are paying over \$1000 a month for rent.

Living in the Jeffersonian should be a privilege, yet for many, it feels more like a punishment. It's critical for the property management to respond to these complaints with urgency, reestablish standards of cleanliness, fix essential services, and restore dignity to the lives of their tenants. Only through accountability and action can we hope for a turnaround at the Jeffersonian Apartment Building. 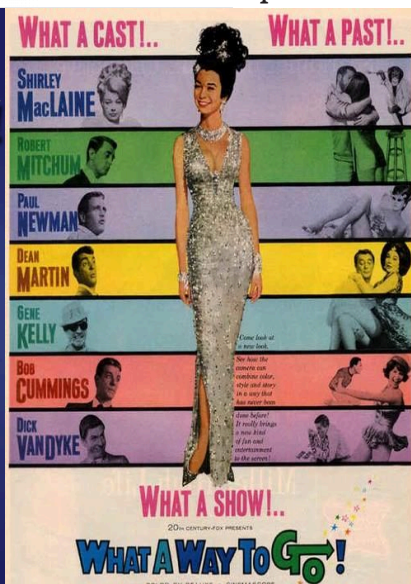

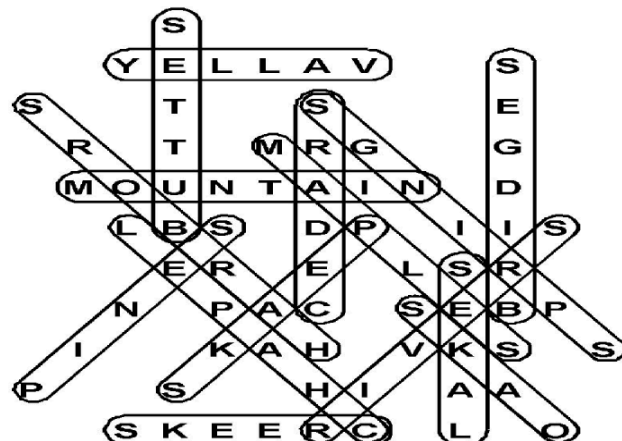

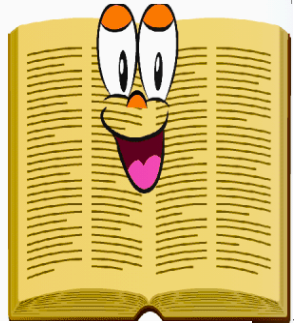

If you need to make a payment it's easy to pay online by visiting pta.waynecounty.com. Or, if you need to visit our Downtown Office you can make an appointment by logging on to treasurer.waynecounty.com.

What if you need a payment plan? There are many payment plans available to fit YOU! Contact the Wayne County Treasurer's Office to inquire about one of the beneficial plans listed below.

1. STIPULATED PAYMENT AGREEMENT:

Puts you on a schedule to avoid foreclosure. (As long as you maintain your payments).

2. DISTRESSED OWNER OCCUPANT EXTENSION:

For those suffering financial hardship. (Must prove hardship, occupancy, and ownership).

3. PAY AS YOU STAY AGREEMENT:

Apply for Poverty Tax Exemption in your city. (If approved, county will reduce your payments).

4. INTEREST REDUCTION STIPULATED PAYMENT AGREEMENT:

If eligible, this plan reduces your interest rate from 18% to 6%.

AN APPOINTMENT IS REQUIRED TO VISIT THE WAYNE COUNTY TREASURER'S OFFICE.
