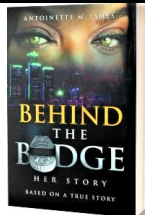

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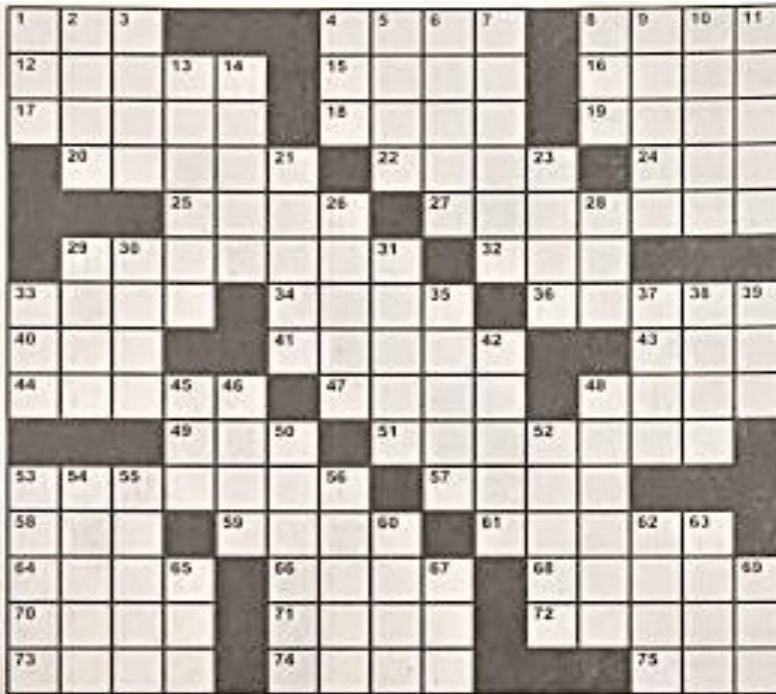

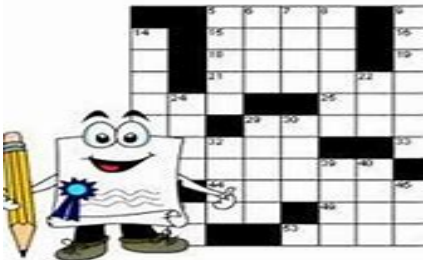

A MOMENT IN HISTORY WITH THE DETROIT HISTORICAL SOCIETY: DETROIT TIGERS FIRST OPENING DAY

In Detroit, spring means baseball and Opening Day for our Tigers. Professional baseball in Detroit actually dates to 1881, with the Detroit Wolverines franchise which disbanded in 1888. In 1894, the Detroit baseball franchise we recognize today was officially founded and reorganized under the Western League. In 1894 – 1895 they played at Boulevard Park (also called League Park) located on East Lafayette Street near Belle Isle. But in 1895, the team owner decided to build a new field on the corner of Michigan and Trumbull in Corktown – this would become the permanent home of the Tigers until 1999. On April 13, 1896, the first pitch was thrown at the new park – officially dedicated just a few days prior. This Opening Day was important not only because the new location would be home to Detroit’s baseball team for the next 104 seasons, but also because it was the moment that our Tigers got their name! When the Detroit team took the field in its new park for the first time, its familiar cream-colored uniforms with “Detroit” in maroon block letters across the front were nowhere to be found. Over the winter the Detroit Free Press reported the team would wear “white uniforms with black trimmings for home games. Instead of the word Detroit on the shirt front there will be a German letter “D” on one side.” This new uniform debuted on Opening Day 1896 but another change to the uniform in 1896 had even larger ramifications— giving the team its recognizable name! Newspapers of the time referred to Detroit’s baseball team simply as the Detroit's, the Creams (for their uniforms), the Wolverines, and even the Giants on a few occasions. For the 1896 season, Manager George Stallings, hoping to change the team’s luck, swapped solid black socks for black with yellowish-brown stripes. This change prompted newspapers to start calling the team the Detroit Tigers, and the name stuck! Despite some tweaks over the years, the uniform (and team name) has remained largely unchanged in the 127 years since. 1896 was a landmark year for the club: its first game at Michigan and Trumbull; adopting the Old English (or German) D; and receiving their team name – certainly the start of something new. That first opening day had all the trappings of the current version; music, large crowds, playing hooky from work and school, local politicians throwing out the first pitch etc. But Opening Day 1896 was not only the birth of a new season, but it was also the birth of the modern Detroit Tigers.

Did you know? The Detroit Tigers are the only American League baseball team to have only one home city and one name in their history! You can brush up on facts like that, and other Detroit sports history at the Detroit Historical Museum! 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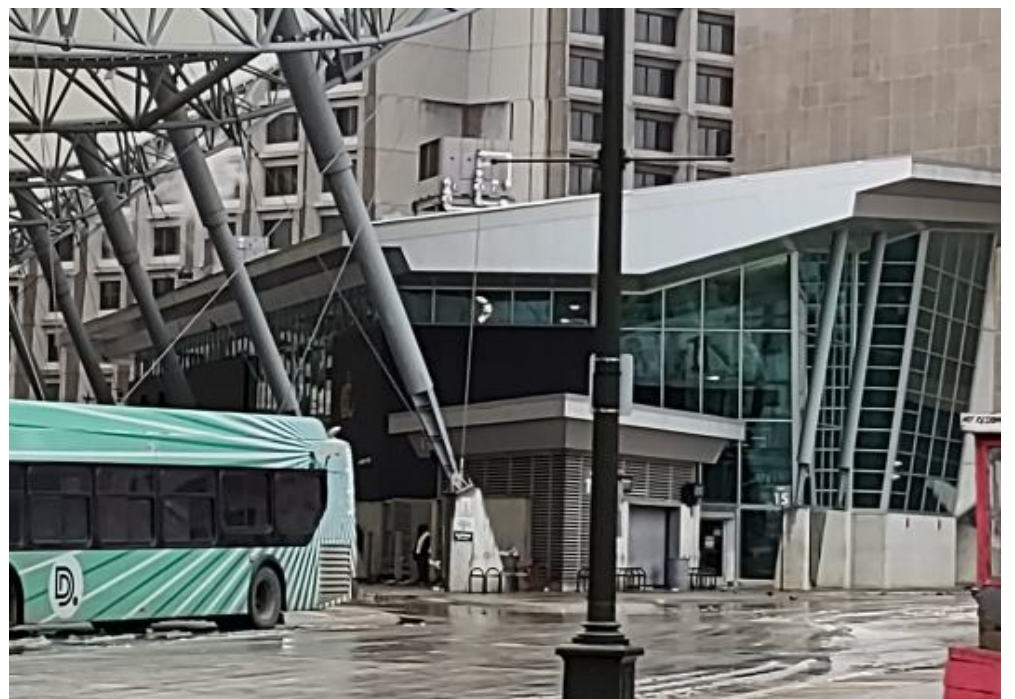

There are many Detroit originals. The automobile, Motown, and Techno. There's another on the list that many forget. Or, never knew about in the first place. Detroit is the home of the Sports Bar. It all started in 1949. That's when Mel Butsicaris and his two sons Jimmy and Johnny, opened a lounge in the Lindell Hotel on Cass at Bagley. About 10 years later, New York Yankee second baseman, and legendary drinker, Billy Martin, suggested they add sports themed items to their decor. About a year later, the Lindell Hotel was demolished, and their father left the business. The Butsicaris brothers moved a block south to the corner of Cass and Michigan Avenue. In the early 1960's, a local sportswriter named Doc Greene, told the Butsicaris brothers to add AC (short for Athletic Club) to the title. They did, and the legend began. The Lindell Bar became Lindell AC. Many celebrities hung out there when they came to Detroit. Milton Berle, Jayne Mansfield, and the wrestler Dick the Bruiser to name a few. That's in addition to our local sports stars. Business fell off drastically when Tiger Stadium closed in 1999. The bar closed in 2001. The Rosa Parks Bus Terminal (pictured above) stands on the site today. Look in the background, the United States Federal Building can be seen in both photographs.

EX DETROIT POLICE OFFICER ALLEDGES CORRUPTION & MORE IN HER NEW BOOK

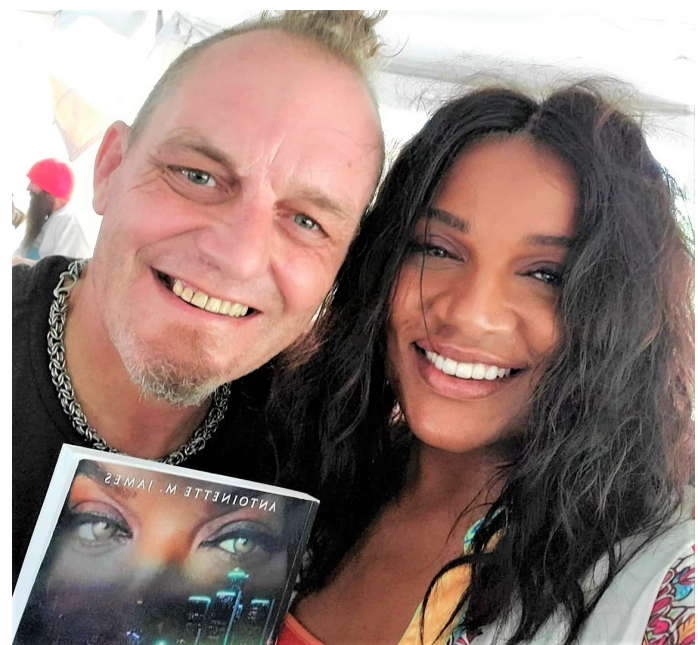
Antoinette James is a survivor. She is also direct and to the point. Her revealing book *Behind the Badge* proves it. Antoinette James holds nothing back. She allows readers into her world, and it's a world you have to read about. James worked as a decoy prostitute for the Detroit Police Department. If you ever wondered how a sting operation operates, read this book, and you will wonder no more. It's not easy to be a Detroit police officer, especially if you're a woman. James tells us she was a victim of police misconduct and sexual assault. When speaking about claims against her fellow officers James says: "I was losing it, scared everyday because I did not know what would happen next. I did go forward. I did tell people and I did talk to high-level people about this, but the matter was never pursued criminally." Antoinette James has endured much, but she has seen much more. Before she was a Detroit Police Officer she worked for the Wayne County Medical Examiner as an Autopsy Technician. Antoinette began working for the morgue in 1998. James takes you with her into the autopsy room as she describes the procedure in graphic detail. Out of the dozens of people she autopsied a couple stood out. Like the story about a person she describes as "a famous local radio personality" who was wearing a dress, a blonde wig, eyeliner, high heels, and a bra with water balloons in both cups. There was another story about a young man who was shot and died in one of Detroit's many vacant lots. The final outcome of both men is much too gruesome to detail in this publication. To find out you have to buy the book. When you do buy it, you will not regret it. That's for sure. Fast forward to 2002, Antoinette was a rookie police officer. She was shocked on her first day on the job when her partner harassed and handcuffed a black man simply for "walking in the street." This article is merely a drop in the bucket. When you READ THE BOOK you'll see what I mean. Your eyes will be glued to the pages. A few may say it's literally unbelievable. The Monthly Standard says the book is a very entertaining read. Antoinette James says her story is absolute, and she's sticking to it. The major question is this: What do YOU say? 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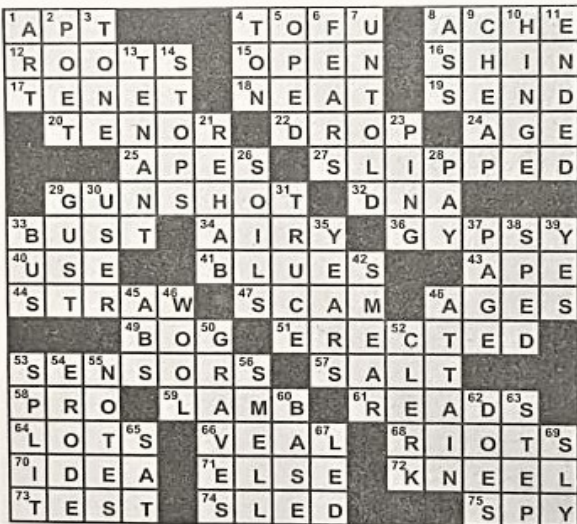


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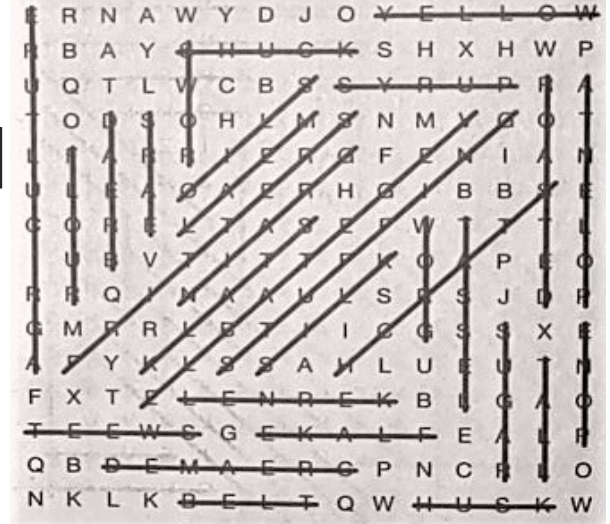
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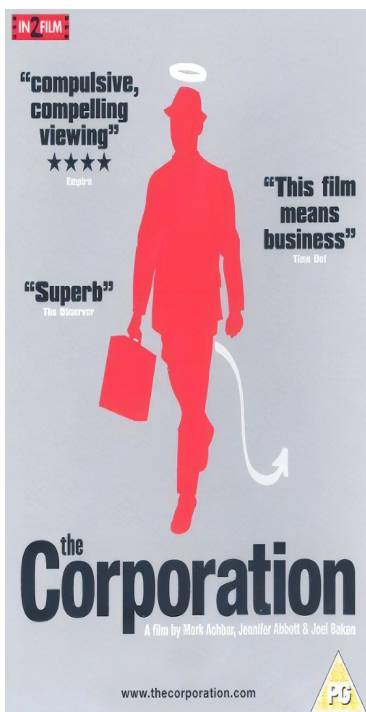
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MOVIE OF THE MONTH
