Originally planned to be an upgraded playground for the Grammar School, this project evolved to be a state-of-the-art embellished recreation area, an education center, and a multifunctional pavilion.

Through what can only be described as divine provision from God, the resources for this project have been supplied through an enormously gracious private donor and multiple fundraisers. The Boosterthon in 2020 kickstarted both the excitement and fundraising, substantially surpassing the original goal. In the spirit of the recent summer Olympics, the schoolwide Olympic Fun Run fundraiser also bolstered the monetary target. Both the Grammar School and Upper School were unified in the



Rowdy Rafters



Hobbit Day







