Every year, Roswell, New Mexico holds a 4-on-4 Charity Flag Football Tournament, bringing in thousands of people from all over the country to participate. It is a great opportunity to gather groups together to play what they love, football! The three day event is held Memorial Day weekend from Friday, May 24th to Sunday, May 26th located at Cielo Grande Recreation Area.

Teams consist of 7 players and enter by age divisions, youth: 8 and under, 10 and under, 11-12, 13-14, 15-16, 17-18 and adults: 19-24, 25-29, 30-34, 35-39, 40 and up. For a regular team entry fee, the price varies from \$350-360 per team. Awards will be given to the winning teams; 1st place will win Hike It & Spike It T-shirts with trophy footballs, 2nd place will win Hike It & Spike It long sleeve T-shirts with a sponsor plaque, and 3rd place will Hike It & Spike It T-shirts with a sponsor plaque. It was simply great, because when the slightest breeze came through, the sweet succulent smell or fruit filled the air. Not only was the smell breathtaking, the taste of the fruit grown on the island were incredibly sweet; it can not even compare to the fruit here. Along with freshly grown fruit, there are shrimp and fish trucks everywhere which consisted of sweet shrimp and fresh, tender, fried fish. We ended our day with fire and hula dancing at a luau.

Continuing our trip, we started our day at the resort's buffet. What amazed me most was the rainbow bread that was provided. After eating an insane amount of food here, we decided it would be a good idea to have a day at the beach. This is when I got the sunburn of my life, and sadly, after spending \$27.53 on sunscreen, I still managed to forget to it on my back! Despite the sun, the water was warm and the waves were soft with character. When snorkeling, the sight was completely beautiful, the water was subtly pleasant on my skin, and the fish were so curious to see why they were being observed.
