





Recipes

ICE CREAM IN A BAG

2 Cups of Whole Milk
1/2 cup of Sugar
1 Tablespoon Vanilla Extract
10 Cups Ice
8 Tablespoons Rock Salt

For the base ice cream: Stir the milk, sugar and vanilla together in a medium bowl. Pour 1/2 cup of the mixture into a sandwich-size resealable plastic bag. Make vanilla ice cream or add in your desired flavors to make mint chocolate chip, chocolate or strawberry ice cream. Tightly seal the bag. Put that bag into another sandwich-size resealable plastic bag and tightly seal. Repeat with the remaining batter and desired flavors.

Place the ice and the salt into a 4-quart food storage container with a lid. Put the filled bags into the container and secure the lid. Shake the container until the mixture is frozen and resembles ice cream, about 5 minutes. Remove the bags with the ice cream in it from the outer bag and snip a large piece off one corner of each bag. Pipe the ice cream into small bowls.

KIDDIE CRUNCH MIX

1 Cup Plain Animal Crackers
1 Cup Teddy Graham Crackers
1 Cup of Mini Pretzels
1 Cup Salted Nuts
1 Cup M&M's
1 Cup of Chocolate Covered Raisins.

In a bowl, combine all ingredients. Store in an airtight container.

PBJ ON A STICK

2 Peanut Butter & Jelly Sandwiches
4 Wooden Skewers
1 Cup Seedless Graped
1 Small Banana Sliced

Cut sandwiches into 1-in. squares. Alternately thread grapes, sandwich squares and banana slices onto each skewer. Serve immediately.

WHAT IS BULLYING???

TYPES OF BULLYING

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time. Both kids who are bullied and who bully others may have serious and lasting problems.

In order to be considered bullying, the behavior must be aggressive and include:

- An Imbalance of Power: Kids who bully use their power—such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or popularity—to control or harm others. Power imbalances can change over time and in different situations, even if they involve the same people.
- Repetition: Bullying behaviors happen more than once or have the potential to happen more than once.

• Verbal bullying is saying or writing mean things. Verbal bullying includes:

- * Teasing
- * Name-calling
- * Taunting
- * Threatening to cause harm

• Social bullying, sometimes referred to as relational bullying, involves hurting someone's reputation or relationships. Social bullying includes:

- * Leaving someone out on purpose
- * Telling other children not to be friends with someone
- * Embarrassing someone in public

• Physical bullying involves hurting a person's body or possessions. Physical bullying includes:

- * Hitting/kicking/pinching
- * Spitting
- * Tripping/pushing
- * Taking or breaking someone's things
- * Making mean or rude hand gestures

After completing submarine school, he reported to USS Oklahoma City, a nuclear powered fast attack submarine where he served from September 2001 to March 2006 , conducting 2 overseas deployments and earning multiple awards, including leading his navigation team to consecutive red and green “N” awards for being the best navigation team in the squadron. Upon completion of his sea tour he was hand selected to serve as submarine exercise area coordinator for the Atlantic fleet where he coordinated and managed water space from The coast of Maine all the way to the Bahamas, with zero navigational incidents. After 3 years in that role, Bryan left the Navy and returned home to Hubbertville to raise his family. Bryan attended Bevill State Community College and the University of Alabama. Bryan is now an electrical and instrumentation front line leader for International Paper.
