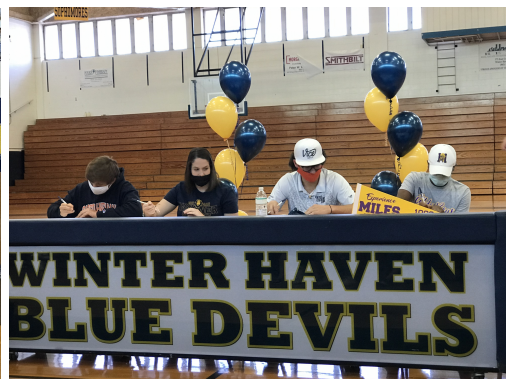

An Editorial : Which Streaming Service Shines?

Ever since Netflix became the first television streaming service back in 2007, more streaming services have joined them. For cord cutters and television watchers, it can be very difficult to decide which streaming service to choose. On one hand, there are streaming services that have been running for years, which many still use today. On the other, there are very recent ones who many have been anticipating for their content. With such a wide variety of streaming options, Netflix comes out as one of the most popular options to date.

Netflix offers three payment plans to choose from: Basic, Standard, and Premium. Basic starts off at \$9, while Standard is set at \$14 and Premium costs \$18. With each plan the video quality, resolution and amount of people who can watch at the same time increases. It also does not have ads; however, its library does change consistently with new shows being added while old shows disappearing. For shows, episode updates are very slow. Payment plans may also increase due to the company wanting to invest more in feature projects. Although it doesn't have live tv, the unlimited number of movies, shows and genres helps to make up for the lack of it.

Hulu has four different payment plans. The first plan only \$6 a month or \$60 annually. There is also the option with no ads at \$12. The third plan is Hulu Plus Live TV at \$66 monthly and lastly, Hulu with no ads Plus Live TV at \$71. Hulu has a very low-priced starting plan that allows add-ons and is great at updating new episodes. However, that only applies for new shows because old shows can be seen with missing seasons. Additionally, ads can be very annoying, and a person has to pay more to remove them. Compared to other services, Hulu has a very small collection of shows and movies, but it does have the option of live tv.

Prime Video costs \$9 by itself. However, with Amazon Prime perks; it can costs up to \$13 monthly or \$119 annually. Amazon offers a free trial beforehand and does offer a payment plan for students. Customers can watch over thousands of free videos and may rent or buy movies or tv episodes if wanted. They can also subscribe to over 100 premium channels. If one were to buy the Amazon Prime plan, there are countless other benefits included. Amazon Prime has free shipping on packages, offers Prime Music, and prime photos. This plan works best for people who shop online excessively or use the other benefits Amazon has.

Disney Plus cost \$7 monthly or \$70 on its own, but it also offers two other bundles. The \$13 bundle consists of Disney Plus, ESPN, and Hulu, ad supported. The other bundle, which costs \$19, has all three, but Hulu does not have any ads. Disney Plus does not only have just Disney shows and classics but offers other channels like Pixar, Marvel, Star Wars, National Geographic and 20th Century Fox. The service itself can be buggy and slow. Also, not all films are available due to Disney having to wait for licenses with other streaming services to expire before they can use their own content again.

HBO Max starts at \$15 monthly and does have another option, a \$70 six-month plan. With HBO Max, customers have access to newly released movies, allowing them to stay at home instead of going to the movie theaters. HBO Max does not have any commercials or ads. However, it is a stand alone service and is not included with HBO. Compared to other services, its pricing may be high, but others have stated it is worthwhile for the content they are offering.

Out of the six streaming services, the best one to choose would be Netflix. Netflix has been a dominating streaming service company for many years and is still popular. It has no ads and while it may be slow on updating, it's great for others who love to binge other shows while waiting. Netflix is also available in many places and offers a variety of shows and movies from other countries and not just ones in English or just in America. Overall, for those who need a streaming service to start with, Netflix would be the best one due to its decent price and how many shows and movies it has to offer.

Floridians Gets Vaccinated

2020 was a devastating year for most of the USA. With the Pandemic leading to 24.3 million cases and over 500,000 deaths, it is safe to say that Covid-19 changed the United States permanently. However, there are now approved Coronavirus vaccines being distributed and with them, a glimmer of hope for the world.

According to states.aarp.org, Florida is now administering COVID-19 vaccines to adults 65 and older, health care workers, K-12 teachers over the age of 50, and long-term care residents and staff. Vaccines have been shipped to all of the state's 67 county health departments. The state's goal was to vaccinate most people in its top priority group by February. The vaccine would then become available to more people, likely including essential workers like teachers and police officers.

Currently, Florida is limiting doses to full-time and part-time residents. People can't travel to Florida just to get a vaccine. Some vaccination sites are asking for proof of identity or eligibility. Officials recommend that one bring a driver's license or other state-issued ID that shows one's name, age, and state residency, and health insurance card. One will not be charged, but the vaccine provider may bill one's insurer a fee for administering the vaccine.

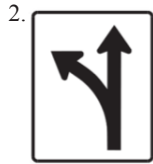

Why are car crashes so common?

As technology advances and distractions on the road increase, so do vehicle fatalities. The number of collisions have grown over the years and will continue to climb. According to the ASIRT (Association for Safe International Road Travel) nearly 1.35 million people die in car crashes each year, 38,000 of whom are Americans. 20 to 50 million people who are involved in crashes each year suffer non-fatal yet lasting injuries.

Driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol is often one of the reasons most fatal car crashes occur. Florida drivers, who are pulled over and do not pass the BAC (breathalyzer test) may receive a fine from \$500 to \$1,000. If a passenger under the age of 18 is present in the car, then fines are bumped up \$1,000 to \$2,000. Drinking underage is also considered a second degree misdemeanor, so the offender may be fined up to \$500 and either will serve time in jail or have probation. Nearly 28% of car crash fatalities are caused by drunk driving. There are many alternative options to driving while intoxicated such as ordering an Uber or riding a bus.

Even while sober one must constantly be attentive to the road and surroundings. Texting while driving can be even more destructive than driving while intoxicated. Only three seconds is needed for a car crash to occur. According to teensdrivingsource.org, multitasking or using a phone behind the wheel can reduce the amount of brain activity which is associated with driving. It is difficult for our brains to multitask, let alone do so safely and effectively. An officer may simply pull over drivers for suspecting them to be texting while driving. When pulled over due to texting and driving, a fine may be handed out costing up to \$30 for first time offenders and \$60 for second time offenders.

Driver fatigue or a tired driver may be also likely to cause a car crash. Between school, sports, and work there is hardly enough time for teens to get enough sleep. Sleep deprived drivers may be unable to react quickly enough to an obstacle on the road. They are unable to swerve around or stop before hitting something or someone. A recent CDC a survey found that 37% of workers get less than the recommended seven hours of sleep.

Whether in a rush to get to school or work or simply frustrated with other drivers on the road, drivers tend to speed. In America the average speeding ticket costs \$150. Speeding increases the stopping distance, meaning it takes longer to stop the vehicle in an emergency. The car is put at a higher risk of a rollover when speeding, and there is greater potential of losing control on the road. Along with speeding, it is also dangerous to go extremely below the speed limit. The fine for going below the speed limit is \$60.

Car crashes occur every day, and it is important to limit one's distractions to avoid car crashes. Factors such as drug and alcohol use, texting while driving, drivers fatigue, and road rage all play a serious role in one of society's largest fatalities. Students should be aware of surroundings and try to limit the amount of crashes that happen each year.

Don't Drive Around the Online Test

As teenagers grow up, an important aspect of their lives is learning how to drive. In order to have a driver's license, teenagers have to first obtain a learner's permit then wait one full year. After waiting, they take their driving test at the Department of Motor Vehicles.

To get a learner's permit, a person has to pass the drug and alcohol course and the learner's permit test. Earlier, a learner would only have to pass a written test, but within recent years, both courses, the drug and alcohol and permit test, have been certified to be taken online.

A person must sign up and make an online account for websites such as First Time Driver, Lowest Price Traffic School and more. If the participant is underaged, a licensed driver's ID is required. The participant will also need to pay a fee once she or he has made an account.

For people to pass the online test, they must earn an 80% or higher by answering 40 questions correctly out of 50. Failing the test three times in a row will require the tester to come in person to the DMV and take the written test instead.

Along with these online courses, there come many concerns.

Teens can easily cheat on the online test, which endangers both them and those on the road with them. Test takers can use another window to search up answers and scroll through the thousands of Google pages, or they can call a friend to help them with the questions.

With teenagers cheating, this means they may not understand the dangers or the basic rules of driving, possibly causing an increase in accidents and reckless driving

Also, with schools not being able to provide in-person driver's education due to budget cuts, it isn't guaranteed that teenagers will know traffic laws as well as they should when taking the exam. Before driver ed courses were cut, those who took the class would also be given a discount on car insurance.

According to Ticket School, online tests have a few advantages due to being more convenient and accessible since online tests can be taken in the homes of the tester.

Having a permit and being certified to start learning how to drive may be a great achievement to many soon-to-be drivers, but it is still important to go over the guidebook and learn traffic laws to help both the upcoming drivers and other drivers around them.



WHHS Teen Hit by Vehicle

On Thursday January 7, a 16 year old girl was hit at 6:50 am on her way to the bus stop. The crash occurred on Avenue G NW near 22nd street.

She was hit by an 18 year old boy on his way to work. After the accident, he stayed at the scene and tended to the girl while waiting for authorities to arrive.

The girl was airlifted to a hospital and suffered minor cuts and a brain bleed, which were both treated. She is expected to make a full recovery. No other students were harmed in the accident; however, many students on the bus witnessed it. As the students arrived at school, crisis counselors were available. Some of the students who witnessed it did not come to school that day, according to Mrs. Williams.

“I wish people would abide by the guidelines and watch for buses,” said Mrs. William. “I would hope students were more observant of their surroundings when crossing the road.”

The 18 year old who was behind the wheel told the authorities he did not see her while driving westbound approaching the bus. It was still dark out during the time of the crash, and his windshield was fogged up; however, the bus was stopped and had working lights.

As more social media platforms grow, so does the possibility of normal people getting famous. Nowadays, it’s easier to start up a YouTube channel or Instagram page than to search for an acting audition. In a study conducted by market research company Morning Consult in 2019, 54% of young Americans would become influencers if given the chance to become one, and 86% said they would post sponsored content on one of their personal pages if given money.

There are different tiers of social media influencers, as there are celebrities with A-list and B-list.

According to the Influencer Marketing Hub, there are five different types of influencers:

Nano-influencers: 1,000–10,000 followers

Micro-influencers: 10,000–50,000 followers

Mid-tier influencers: 50,000–500,000 followers

Macro-influencers: 500,000–1,000,000 followers

Mega-influencers: 1,000,000+ followers

Depending on the app being used, one post on Instagram as a nano-influencers could get 10-100 dollars, while on TikTok could get 5-25 dollars, and one on YouTube could get double that of Instagram.

The top five social media platform for influencers are Instagram (82%), YouTube (41%), TikTok (23%), Twitter (23%), and Facebook (5%), all according to the 2020 Influencer Marketing Outlook report.

These are all apps that teenagers tend to have. There are all types of different influencers. Some focus more on beauty, others focus on music, and some just make funny content.

They all have some form of edge that makes them relatable to different groups of people.



The definition of an influencer, according to the Merriam Webster Dictionary, is “one who exerts influence: a person who inspires or guides the actions of others.” Since these people have so much control that they tend to “influence” the trends and buying patterns of their audience, some believe that these people should be worthy of admiration. However, this is not always the case.

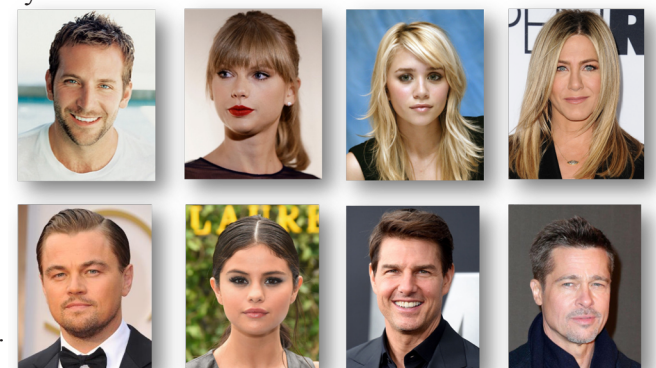

Boba Review

I reviewed four different local sites to get boba. For this review, I ordered one constant flavor, taro, and one bonus flavor from each of the four places. The factors that were taken into consideration to determine the best place were location, parking, taste, texture, price, varieties, atmosphere, customer service, and other options for food.

Baking Donuts Plus

The two flavors that I chose from here were taro and honeydew. The colors of the flavors were pastel and very vibrant, and I noticed right away that the cup was very tall, so one gets his/her money's worth of boba. Getting boba from here will cost about \$4.99; however, one downfall of going here is that there are only about ten different flavors to choose from. Nevertheless, the taste makes up for a limited selection of flavors. The drinks have a thick, creamy, milky texture, and the taste is the right amount of sweet to pair with a sugary treat. Not only does Baking Donuts Plus serve boba, but they serve a wide assortment of donuts to nibble on with a creamy cup of boba. The shop is a charming, quiet place that seems to have a lot of personality behind all the decor. The boba is not prepared in front of the customer; however, I was asked about what type of additions I desired. I decided to get the flavor popping pearls instead of the usual tapioca. This was followed by the next question of which flavor of popping pearls I wanted. This made the experience better because I was able to choose exactly what I wanted. The flavor popping pearls gave this drink even more flavor, and the pop of the pearls was very satisfying. One major downfall of going here is getting into and out of the parking area. It was quite a pain trying to find parking as well, but that may have been because I went during a busy time of the day. If one is not interested in going inside the shop, then there is a takeout window to get exactly what is needed quickly. Overall, I say this is a very reliable place to order boba, and the customer service was top quality.

Saigon Garden

Something to consider when coming here is that this is a restaurant, but I was able to walk right in and order some boba. I ordered the taro and banana, and I was able to wait at the bar as they made the drinks. There are plenty of seating inside and outside of the restaurant if one decided to dine here. The atmosphere was peaceful, quiet, and serene. One thing that makes this restaurant a top choice is that there are about nineteen different flavors to choose from, and the drinks were about \$4.99 each. One also has the option of having a milk or smoothie boba. I chose the milk option, and my boba was very bubbly and frothy, which made the thick texture enjoyable. The taro drink also has a brewed-type taste to it to add to the sweet flavor. One minor downfall of the drinks was that the amount of tapioca balls that was added to my drink was a bit overwhelming and took away from my enjoyment. The tapioca balls were also very thick and plugged up the straw while trying to drink the sweet boba. Another thing that I noticed about the drinks was that the colors were very faded and toned down, compared to Baking Donuts Plus's vivid colors. However, I was able to find parking easily, and the service was on par to the previous places. Overall, I enjoy that there are a wide variety of selections and that I can eat here if I wish.

First Oriental Market (Cho Tan Bihn)

One thing that I immediately took into consideration when arriving here was that this is a market, so one can grab some snacks or groceries when going to get boba. The two flavors that I chose were taro and passion fruit. The boba drinks differ very much here from Baking Donuts Plus. The taste was very natural and has a juice/tea consistency. This market has milky options, but there are also many fruity flavors. Instead of being milk-based, the fruit flavors have actual juice. What makes these flavors taste natural is that along with the tapioca balls, there are seeds, fruits, and jellies inside that heighten the taste. This drink was the cheapest out of four places at a cost of \$3.95. Something that I noted right away was that it took only five minutes to get both drinks. There are about fifteen different flavors to choose from, and the boba pearls and tapioca balls were already chosen for me. My boba was made right in front of me at a bar, and the aroma of the hot foods that they serve there was very tempting. Since organic flavors are used to create the drink, there are some unusual flavors served here, like red

bean (which was definitely not for me). One big downfall of going here is that this place was by far the most difficult of getting into and out of the parking lot. Since it is on a busy road, I had the hardest time leaving. Overall, this market was very solid, and I enjoy browsing for snacks before getting my boba. The tastes and textures are very natural, and the passion fruit juice feeds my sweet tooth.



Pho Tan

This location is another restaurant. I did have some trouble finding the restaurant at first because it is slightly hidden, but I was able to find parking easily. I was able to also walk right in and order the boba, which came out not long after ordering. I ordered the constant taro and pineapple. My drink came out in a visually appealing cup. The taste of this boba came as a surprise to me because it was delicious! It has the same consistency as a milkshake or ice cream. The drink chilled my tongue, so that the sugary taste lingered longer. Unlike the other locations, this slushie-like drink did not have ice, but this did not take away from my delight. The drinks had a creamy texture and an intense sweetness to it that was personally enjoyable to me and my sweet tooth. This is what I would consider a dessert drink. The boba from here was the most expensive with a price of \$5.45; however, it is worth the amount paid if one is looking for a sweet treat. The inside of the restaurant was very quiet and tranquil, and there was excellent service. There are about fourteen different flavors to choose from here with interesting flavors to pick from, such as jackfruit. The boba from here was definitely one of my favorites and differed much from the other locations. Overall, if one does not mind paying a little extra for a sweet drink, then this is the place to go. (The pineapple is a personal favorite of mine.)
