

Proctor intends on going into psychology but says that may change. "I only know for certain that I would like my profession to be one in healthcare."




Trident: How many times did you apply?

Senior Skip Day is a day seniors choose whether to come to school or not.


On this day, they do all sorts of things, from just sleeping in and relaxing at home, hanging out with friends, to even going to Disney World.

For many Florida students the idea of college relies heavily on hard work during their high school years in order to qualify for the Florida Bright Futures scholarship. The Bright Futures scholarship covers 75 to 100 percent of a student's college costs depending on what level of the scholarship they qualify for, but what would happen if this award is taken away from hardworking students?

A controversial Senate bill regarding limitations on the Bright Futures scholarship was recently passed despite many who oppose it. Senate Bill 86 will leave Bright Futures dependent on leftover money from the budget each year. By not having a consistent amount of

money to hand out each year in scholarships, families will be left unable to rely on Bright Futures as they have in the past.

The bill states that the scholarship will only be handed out to students going into majors which lead to jobs. Pursuit in knowledge majors as well as liberal arts majors will now not be eligible for the scholarship.

What will keep Florida students in Florida when many colleges out of the state could be a better financial fit? The bill could end up having an adverse effect and could lead to fewer students who stay in Florida to pursue education and employment.

Will limiting the amount of money given out as well as which majors one is allowed to go into be beneficial to Florida's schools and students? I say no. Politicians should not darken our "Bright Futures." By May first this proposed bill has not passed.






Perry won the district competition for both shot put and discus. For the region, she placed fourth in shot put and second in discus.
