The Cushing Junior High football team remains optimistic about their season.


Coach, Jason Davis, commented, "For our eighth graders, this is actually their third year to play junior high football due to our player shortage two years ago."

Poetry Contest Winner: Kaden Willis

Cushing eighth grader, Kaden Willis, placed second with his poem, "Only the Fast Ropers," in the Northeast Texas Poetry in Schools Contest last spring.

The contest is sponsored by the Rusk County Poetry Society. The tradition of Poetry in Schools began more than forty years ago when the Rusk County Poetry Society decided to celebrate National Poetry Month each April by honoring local student poets in Henderson, Texas, with a contest and awards ceremony.

Today, that celebration has grown to include hundreds of students and teachers in schools and home school groups across East Texas. Each year, the contest provides an opportunity for students currently enrolled in grades 7-12 to nurture academic growth through the literary arts. Classroom and language arts teachers are encouraged to submit original poems from their students to be judged by local poets and writers. All winning entries are published in the Northeast Texas Poetry in Schools Student Anthology.

The anthology is a presentation of the 2020 winning poems. Judges chose poems that best utilized the many aspects of poetry- imagery, sound, metaphors, and universal themes.


Theater Production: Lafayette No. 1 Oct. 17
