



Will Uniforms Return to Newman High?

From 1951 to 1962, Newman Catholic High mandated uniforms for some of their students. The girls wore short sleeve, white collared shirts (long sleeve for mass days) paired with dark green gabardine skirts and vests. The boys did not have uniforms but were not allowed to wear jeans. After 1962, uniforms were discarded but jeans were still not allowed. In 2004, a formal dress code was set in place and has been followed ever since. A current Newman student asked our principal, Mrs. McManus about how a dress code is set in place and how it is created, this is what she has to say:

*About every ten years, the request comes to the Newman Catholic School System to move to students wearing uniforms. The current dress code (minus a few tweaks as fashion changes) was developed by the administration in the early 2000's. I believe the intent was to give something to both sides (uniforms vs. non-uniforms). The current dress code has standards that would match required uniform policy such as; collared shirts, appropriate dress/skirt length, small logos, khakis, no leggings as primary wear, etc. The dress code does allow for some individuality multiple colors of khaki instead of khakis rather than navy only. Patterned, striped, solid shirts rather than a white polo shirt only. Patterned, striped, or solid sweaters rather than a solid navy sweater only. Patterned, striped, or solid skirts or dresses of an appropriate length rather than just a navy jumper or pleated navy skirt only. The current dress code keeps fashion in a neutral 'middle ground' while still allowing appropriate self-expression. I am sure the dress code vs. uniforms will come up again.... which would **YOU** prefer?*

A survey was taken before this question was answered and the debate and discussion had already begun in the halls and in classrooms. At the time of the survey, the question had still not been brought To this

point, the idea had still not been brought to the ears of our principal. What exactly were students saying?

Junior Alexa Huff, writes about already popular and yet ever growing opinions of Newman High School students: Newman students were given a survey on whether or not they would prefer uniforms, regular dress code, or if they felt indifferent.

Some students leaned more to one side, and some down the middle. Although people may feel that one answer is the correct one, there are some pros and cons to either decision.

School uniforms help students who are less fortunate feel more "in the loop" with their peers. Kids in every school struggle with trying to fit in, and not being able to afford all the same things that other kids have. Along with that, it can save parents and students a lot of time. Not having to worry about what to wear, whether or not it's in dress code, and how much time they have to get ready for school. Uniforms also help private schools look a little more, well, uniform. Having students dressed in appropriate attire, and similar to their peers, helps represent the school. Uniforms have also been proven to increase student's productivity and focus. Kids are less focused on their own clothes, or the clothes of the kids around them, and more on what is being taught directly to them.

On the other hand, there is a certain freedom


that does not come with a school uniform. Dressing how a student wants to, while still in dress code, gives students the freedom to express themselves.

The way people dress, style their hair, and accessories, are all ways that students can show their individuality. If you look around at the people around you, not everyone is dressed the same or has the same sense of style. Uniforms can take away a student's individuality and cause them to not only look the same as their peers, but to feel the same. Studies on uniforms have also shown a jump in student resentment for school itself, and the authority within it.


Although both sides have their own fair share of pros and cons that could sway a student's opinion to either side, it seems that the results of the survey show that more Newman students would prefer wearing uniforms to school, than following the current dress code.


The uniforms vs. dress code survey was handed out on March 2nd (see charts), and as of the final count of March 5th, 55 of next year's Newman High students prefer uniforms, 40 prefer dress code, 16 do not have a preference, and 19 would prefer no dress code or one that matches Wausau's public school system. While the students are only one factor of changing mandates for following school years, administration will be hard-pressed to ignore what may possibly become a big change in upcoming school years.

Uniforms vs. Dress Code




Uniforms vs. Dress Code

Fr. Joe's Faith Column

Every month we ask Newman students to submit their questions about the Catholic Faith. Fr. Joe will read through these questions and will answer some of the questions that he thinks are important.

How often should we go to confession?

Whenever we commit a mortal sin, or even if we just feel bogged down by venial sins, it's a good idea to get to confession. At the same time, I think it's important to establish some kind of rhythm or regularity to both confession and the Eucharist (Mass). This looks different for each person, but for myself, I like going on about a monthly basis. If I have big stuff to bring up it's a good chance for it, but even if I don't have anything terribly large to confess, it's still a good way to keep inviting Christ's mercy into our hearts. It's a bold claim, but I think regular confession is perhaps the most underutilized tool we have to help us follow Christ.

What made you become a priest?

When I first thought about becoming a priest, it was mostly another option I could do with my life. I was already familiar with the Church and with Church-y things, so it seemed a bit natural to consider it. Later on, when I got serious about the possibility, I was chiefly moved by two things: first, an excellent role-model priest that lived his priesthood well; and second, because I saw work worth doing that needed to be done.

Is it good to be Lutheran in a Christian School?

It's good to be Christian in a Christian school (and anywhere else for that matter). One trap we can fall into is a certain competitiveness between different denominations of Christianity (Catholicism, Lutheranism/Protestantism, Evangelicalism, etc.), while the reality is that the divisions we see among Christians are a sign of our own brokenness. Rather than wanting us to compete, God is always working to bring his people back together. So yes, it's good to be Lutheran in a Christian School just like it's good to be Catholic in a Christian school.


The important thing is always listening to the Holy Spirit.

Are the holidays that celebrate life events of Jesus on the exact day that they happened?

For the most part, they are probably not, although they occurred around roughly the same time. Let's take Christmas for example. Christians started celebrating Christmas on December 25 during the reign on Emperor Constantine (the year 336). We can't say exactly what the reason was for December 25. A few theories are that are that March 25 (nine months before) was already celebrated as the feast of the Annunciation (Gabriel announcing Jesus to Mary). Another was that it was the date for the celebration of the feast of the sun, and Christians took that date over. A third theory was that it was the winter solstice, bringing light during the darkest day of the year. We did know that Jesus was born in the winter, so we attached our remembering and celebrating of Jesus' birthday to a winter day and set aside a meaningful occasion that would be consistent from year to year.

Mr. Kevin McCutcheon graduated from Newman Catholic High School in 1976. During his time at Newman, Mr. McCutcheon became student council president, a A student, and was later accepted to play football as a "walk on" at the University of Georgia. After graduation, he married his high school sweetheart, Chris (Kuehlman) McCutcheon.

The early 70's marked the last months of the Vietnam conflict, and Mr. McCutcheon chose to join the marines and spend 32 years of his life serving our country. He says that many people, both at home and at school, felt that making the choice to join such a "dysfunctional military" in the mid 1970's was a "stupid decision." Mr. McCutcheon's military service allowed both he and his wife to travel all over the world and create lasting experiences and memories.

He says that Newman Catholic provided a foundation for their faith and good standing with the Lord. After Mr. McCutcheon retired, he worked as a consultant for a defense consulting firm as the European Account Director for Defense in Stuttgart, Germany. He retired from that position in 2013 and moved to Hickory, North Carolina. Since then, he has been donating his time at the Marine Corp Aviation Association, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, Marine Corp League, American Wine Society, and various church activities.



BOOK REVIEW: THE FAULT IN OUR STARS

Book Review: *The Fault in Our Stars*

The *Fault in our Stars* is one of the many books that Mrs. Solum has included in her "Book Bingo" activity. I have read this particular story way too many times, re-reading it since middle school. It contains 25 chapters, each one not being very long in length. For the average person, it would most likely take around four hours to read. In 2014, a movie was made for this book, which I also enjoyed. I would say that this movie was really well done. I might even say that it is almost as good as the book.

This story is a romance novel, telling the story of Hazel Grace Lancaster. Hazel is a teenage girl who suffers more than most. Prior to the first chapter, she was diagnosed with thyroid cancer. Due to this, she is also struggling with her mental health, causing her mother to send her to therapy with other teens with cancer. There she meets Augustus Waters, also nicknamed Gus, who she eventually falls in love with. However, Augustus has osteosarcoma (bone cancer), and he also lost a leg due to the disease and was believed to be cured. I have also noticed that people are drawn to emotional stories, and without some conflict, the story is not interesting. I do recommend this book, especially for those who enjoy teen romance. Readers should just be prepared for an emotional conclusion.
