Earthquake, Sonic Boom and Geomagnetic Storms

On Monday, April 29th at 10:15 pm EST, the residents of Hampstead, Surf City and Holly Ridge felt the Earth shake. Reports started coming in within minutes of the event where people stated hearing a loud boom or odd vibration sound, followed by ground moving beneath their feet, homes being jolted as though they had been hit by a vehicle and insects suddenly getting very quiet and dogs acting strange. These statements were repeated on social media. Many people familiar with the military operations in the area thought it felt different. So, could it have been an earthquake? No official report has been released with the detection of ground movement by the US Geological

Society, but could a tremor still have happened? The answer is yes. Steve Pfaff, director of the National Weather Service in Wilmington, North Carolina provided us with a few options that may have caused the sensation of the ground shaking on Monday, April 29th.

In our phone interview, Mr. Pfaff stated that the first step after an event like this is to rule out causes. Was it a weather event? Based on his research, there were no weather events in the area that contributed to this. Could it have been a military operation off the coast? Possible, but in most cases the planes that would cause such a "jolt" would leave behind a cloud on radar caused by Chaff. What is a chaff cloud? It is best described as radar reflective materials.

such as aluminum strips or glass fibers. No chaff cloud was detected. Could it have been a meteor entering our atmosphere? Possible but to date no substantiating reports have come in. Could it have been an underwater landslide? This is a possible event but would need to be supported by visual comparison of underwater area maps. Could it have been an underwater cave collapse? Again, this is a possibility but currently there is no supporting information.

Similar events have been reported in the area, mostly during the fall to spring seasons. October 2014, April 2016 and January 2020 were dates that Mr. Pfaff could recall.

Do major earthquakes happen in our area? Not too far south, Charleston,

South Carolina suffered from a major earthquake in 1886. A witness to that event stated that he heard a series of loud booms for over four hours before that catastrophic event.

In the last few weeks, New Jersey and New York City residents have experienced an earthquake that registered a 4.8 on the Richter scale and up to 60 aftershocks. Like the coastal area of North Carolina, these events are not considered typical by the residents.

Topsail Gun Gal: A Lost or Stolen Firearm


- 1. Once you have searched and assured yourself it is no longer in your possession, contact the local authorities and file a lost/missing firearm report. Give as much information as possible, model, make, serial number, and attachments (laser/flashlight, unique color). If you suspect someone has taken it, give that information as well.
- 2. After filing the report, contact the local pawn shops (I recommend up to 50-60 miles from your home) immediately and provide them with the information and what law enforcement agency took your report.
- 3. Contact local gun shops. Firearms can be sold to or traded in at a gun shop. In either case, photo ID's are required (same with a pawn shop).
- 4. Visit local gun shows. If a firearm was stolen, in most cases the thief wants to get rid of it. Bring a flyer with the information. Be pro-active.
- 5. Stay in contact with your local law enforcement agency.
- 6. If you own firearms, take the time and photograph them, including serial number and the box (the end of most boxes provides make, model and serial number) and email the photos to yourself and store them. In the event of a lost or stolen firearm, you have the information available from any computer.

Also, this is a good time to inspect your firearms for rust or other issues.

- 7. Avoid bragging to people about how many firearms you have or showing photos on social media that include your gun safe. Thieves are everywhere.
- 8. If you keep a firearm in your glovebox (or safe in your vehicle) check on it periodically.
- 9. When having home renovations and repairs done, make sure your firearms are secured and out of reach. After hurricanes or storm damage repairs, we get a lot of calls about missing firearms.
- 10. Owning a firearm is a big responsibility. If you need a gun lock or gun safe, visit your local gun shop.

If you are going out of town for an extended period of time, contact your local gun shop and see about dropping off your firearms for a mainenance cleaning/inspection and pick them up when you return. Let the shop know your plans.

Remember knowledge is power and protecting your firearm from theft and keeping it out of the hands of someone who should not have access is your responsibility. Putting a firearm in a safe or locking it only takes a matter of seconds but may save a life and give you peace of mind.





Charlie





Soundside Meadow Day School Delivers Enrichment for Preschoolers

Renee Richard and Joanna Alexander are two best friends who share the same dream. While organizing play dates and thematic events and celebrations with their preschool-aged children, Joanna and Renee discussed the reality of opening their own preschool in their home community of Hampstead.

Renee, a certified teacher in early childhood, primary elementary, and special education since 2006, and Joanna, with a business degree and experience working in the non-profit/medical sector with the developmentally delayed decided that by combining forces, they could provide our area with a resource for the youngest members of our community.

July 2023 talks became October's reality, as they discovered a quaint location nestled within Hampstead Village. They named the day school Soundside Meadow Day School: a homage to their coastal upbringings and inland residences, combined with their vision of music and movement intertwined within a serene and peaceful, inviting environment.

"We had a soft opening in March," Renee said. "Thirteen children from ages 12 months to 5 years old enrolled in the beginning and immediately grew to 30 plus enrolled in the Fall 2024 session, with tens more on several waitlists.

Joanna said they anticipated growth but not at this dramatic rate, a pleasant surprise as they work fervently to hire qualified individuals to join their growing staff! "What we pride ourselves on is a small, home-like setting in a private school environment," said Joanna.

"We are a very individualized, child-centered, traditional, yet, play-based preschool," said Renee. "We use a curriculum that is used by many early childhood centers in the nation and supplement with music, movement, and sensory play."

"We strive to know your child on an individualized basis. We will provide and give you support in all areas. Joanna proclaims.

"This is not a one-size-fits-all environment. We will meet the needs of your child in whatever way we can!" added Renee.

The women said the school offers both morning sessions and afternoon sessions. They also are providing an opportunity for summer preschool camp sessions in June, July, and August. Each week will have a different theme to explore, including Fun with Food, Down on the Farm, Stars and Strips, Olympics, and more)

"We love Hampstead and we love the sense of community we find here," said Renee. "It's important to us to share the sense of community here at our school."

Empowered People Keep Both Feet Planted Firmly on the Ground

Several years ago, as I was returning home from a speaking engagement, I decided to stop in a town about two hours from home to stretch my legs. At that time the best place in the world for me to stretch my legs was Stein Mart Department store, so that is where I chose to stop. It was late on Sunday afternoon so there were few customers in the store. As I moseyed around, I noticed to my left a display of scarves, and one on the second row caught my eye. I thought it might match the colors of the pants that I was wearing. I stopped and lifted my knee to the scarf to see if I was right.

Before I go on, I want you to picture the scarf display. The scarves were hung on plastic rings and the rings were placed on metal arms that stuck out from the display. The metal arms were curled up at their ends so the plastic rings wouldn't fall off. I lifted my knee in the air, draped the scarf over it and found much to my sadness that the two would not go together. As I lowered my leg, my pant leg caught on one of the metal arms of the display. I lifted my knee to dislodge the pant leg but to no avail. I lifted it once again, but it was still caught and would not detach.

So. there I was, STUCK. I looked around and there was no one in sight to

help me. WHAT AM I GOING TO DO? WHERE IS HELP WHEN YOU NEED IT? DO I YELL OUT FOR HELP? ONLY I COULD MANAGE TO DO THIS!! I was thinking all of this while standing on one leg. I was 60 years old at the time and my balance was not what it used to be. Then I started beating myself up. WHY DID I STOP HERE ANYWAY? HOW CAN ANYONE BE SO DUMB? I SHOULD HAVE NEVER STOPPED GOING TO YOGA. WHY DIDN'T I PAY MORE ATTENTION? When I exhausted my arsenal of negative selftalk, I decided not to embarrass myself by yelling for help, but to simply bend over closer to the rack and pull my pants leg off the metal arm. As I bent over and grabbed the pant leg, I lost my balance and fell on my back in the middle of the store with my feet flying straight up in the air. I am sure that it was a sight to behold.

I was stunned for a minute. I could hear shoppers talking nearby, but still, no one came to my rescue. I pulled myself together, checked all of my bones, and slowly got up and quickly left the store. I was extremely lucky that my feet went up into the air because it dislodged the material from the metal arm of the display. If it had not, I would have pulled the entire rack of scarves on top of me. I was also lucky that I did not get hurt and that no one saw me. I did not have to go

through the humiliation that comes with falling in public. I can now laugh at myself over this, but not at the time.

I share this story because I know there are some of you out there who are precariously perched on one proverbial leg in some area of your life, and you feel stuck. I am sure that you have asked yourself the same questions that I asked, and I know you are most probably beating yourself up just like I did. You may be too embarrassed to ask for help or you do not know where to turn for help. I also know that unlike mine, your dilemma has probably been going on for quite some time. And finally, I know that if you do not fess up to someone and allow them to give you help and guidance, you too will lose your balance and fall. When you fall, you may get hurt. You may hurt others. You may suffer the humiliation of public embarrassment. Asking for help may be difficult, but hopefully, it will give you the strength and confidence to do whatever needs to be done appropriately.

Some areas that people find themselves perched precariously are:

- Ethical issues at work
- Overextended financially
- An eroding marriage
- Poor job performance
- Addictive behavior (alcohol, drugs,

credit spending, sex, relationships)

- Parental Issues
- Having an affair
- Physical or emotionally abusive behavior
- Inability to say "No" and overextending your time or emotional self
- Health issues that you are ignoring
- Weight issues that may be leading to health issues

Some questions to ask yourself that might be helpful:

How long have you known on some level that you are perched on the edge of a major problem or maybe smack in the middle of one?

To whom have you admitted the problem?

Who would be helpful if you admitted the problem?


What has kept you from taking action steps to solve the problem?

"We want our customers to feel comfortable when our company visits their home or office," said David.

After more than 34 years of business, David said he and his father never forgot the lessons learned from Larry.

"My grandfather was a good person," David said. "He believed in charging fair prices and he tried to make sure the customer was taken care of in a timely

manner. He believed in doing good work"

Bryant has retired from Pleasant Air. David is at the helm with his wife, Marisa, who is the office manager. David said he is blessed that his wife is a co-worker as well. The couple has four children and hopes one day they will learn the family business at Pleasant Air.

Meanwhile, the Crawfords focus on serving the community. They believe in supporting community activities, such as donating to the schools, the Kiwanis Club's Halloween event, and law enforcement flag football, just to name a few. Last year they participated in a Christmas giveaway with a radio station in which they provided a system to a breast cancer patient.

"We've seen a lot of changes in Hampstead over the years," David said. "But we continue to serve our neighbors' heating and air conditioning needs."




