Fiber Internet Arrives in Dove Creek

For months, trucks sporting the company logo "Fibertel" have been driving around Dolores County, leaving many wondering: who are they and why are they here? Fibertel is a company contracted by Emery Telcom to help bring next-generation fiber internet to Dove Creek. Emery Telcom started as a local internet exchange in rural Emery County, Utah. They have since expanded with a unique mission of providing fast fiber internet to other rural communities that are either underserved, or not served at all. They recently brought fiber down to Monticello and Blanding, which had few to no services, to help them connect to the outside world in 2021. However, Emery Telcom quickly realized that Dove Creek had very similar needs, and in 2019 asked for and received a grant to bring fiber

to Dove Creek as well. For Emery Telcom, the Dove Creek project hasn't been so easy. As a company based out of Utah, Emery Telcom found that the Utah and Colorado state regulations have some big differences. Navigating bureaucracy caused the company's building progress to slow as they jumped through government hoops. Just as things were looking up for Dove Creek, the fiber network installation progress took another hit from the all too familiar COVID 19. Now, we are halfway through 2023, and with government regulations and COVID out of the way, Emery Telcom has all but completed the Dove Creek build in record working time. For Dove Creek this means that residents can begin to sign up for the fiber internet in July, and have it delivered right to their homes starting mid-August. DOLORES COUNTY BOCC June Updates FEDERAL FOREST FUNDS & CO CONSERVATION TRUST LOTTERY \$

Federal Forest Funds/Title II and III Funds Resolution# 06-23-01 Dolores County School District Representatives Ty Gray and Roxie Guynes were present to sign Resolution #06-23-01 designating the distribution of Federal Forest Funds received from the USFS Tier III. The BOCC discussed percentages of distribution and agreed to do a 60/40 split; 60% to Road and Bridge Road Fund, in the amount of \$229,232.86 and 40% to Dolores County School District, in the amount of \$152,824.90.

Also, The Conservation Trust Lottery Board shared their recommendations regarding the distribution of \$7,500.00 of available lottery funds. Four requests were received. The funds were distributed as follows: Xi Delta Tau Sorority received \$3,500.00 for the purchase of Playground Equipment for the Cahone Park. At the time of the Lottery Board meeting the request was to purchase playground equipment. At the date of final approval from the BOCC the Cahone Park had received playground equipment from the DC Elementary School. (see page 3) The funds will go towards rebuilding the donated equipment. The Dolores County Fair Board received \$2,000.00 for the purchase of a split ac/heat unit for their kitchen or

sand for their playground. The Dolores County Pioneer Center received \$1,000.00 for the purchase of soil and bedding plants to go in the whiskey barrel planters they purchased with lottery funds from 2022. The Colorado Laureate Delta Beta Sorority received \$1,000.00 for continued improvements to the Dove Creek Community Center and Weber Park. (published from supplied minutes)

SCENIC BYWAYS Two of the state's southwestern byways will be getting some much-needed enhancements after receiving a \$640,250 grant from the Federal Highway Administration's National Scenic Byways Program.

Several improvements are planned for the Alpine Loop Byway, connecting Lake City, Ouray, and Silverton, and the Silver Thread Byway, between Blue Mesa Reservoir and South Fork, including:

• An open-air picnic pavilion (Silver Thread)

• Eleven toilets (seven double ADA vault toilets; three composting vault toilets; one single ADA vault toilet) (Alpine Loop/Silver Thread)

• Safety pullouts on Engineer Pass and Cinnamon Pass (Alpine)

• Additional safety pullouts between Eureka and Animas Forks (Alpine)

• Installation of an open-deck Dark Skies observatory and interpretive site on Slumgullion Pass in the decommissioned Slumgullion Campground (Silver Thread)

The grant application was a collaborative effort between four counties, four municipalities, two ranger districts, one Bureau of Land Management field office, and several nonprofit organizations.

"Our region is experiencing a steady increase of tourism in this scenic and historic region," said Hinsdale County Commissioner Kristie Borchers. "We are pleased to accept this grant award for vital upgrades to infrastructure."

Both also are designated as Colorado Electric Byways, requiring each route to have sufficient charging infrastructure in place for electric vehicles to complete the entire length of the byway. Fourteen of the state's byways are designated Electric Byways.



FHWA awarded \$21.8 million to 33 byways in 29 states, including five Tribal lands. These are the first National Scenic Byways Program grants awarded since 2012.

Thirteen of Colorado's 26 byways, including Alpine Loop and Silver Thread, are designated as America's Byways®, meaning they are nationally recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Transportation for their outstanding scenic and historic attributes. Colorado has the most nationally designated byways in the U.S. The collection also includes 10 National Forest Scenic Byways and two Bureau of Land Management Back Country Byways. Learn more about these scenic and historic road trips that preserve the state's culture, history and natural wonder by visiting: ColoradoByways.org

CDOT established the Scenic and Historic Byways program in 1989. In addition to supporting the state's 26 byways, the program includes two All-American Roads, 10 National Forest Scenic Byways, and two Bureau of Land Management Backcountry Byways. The statewide system is comprised of nearly 2,600 miles of roadway through 48 of Colorado's 64 counties.







Fourteeners



Mount Wilson is the highest summit of the San Miguel Mountains range of the Rocky Mountains of North America. The prominent 14,252-foot (4,344 m) fourteener is located in the Lizard Head Wilderness of San Juan National Forest, north east of the Town of Rico in Dolores County, it is ranked 16 of the 53 peaks.

Colorado is known for it's breathtaking (literally) Fourteener hiking challenges. Hardy people from all over the world, come to the Rockies to face the challenges of climbing the 14,000 foot peaks. Back in March, CO state senators rejected a proposal to update a recreational use law under proposed SB21-103. The base of the concern is a potential for private land owners to be vulnerable to lawsuits from people who get themselves hurt on the land.

Private land owners have allowed recreationalists free access to the lands in and around the CO peaks, as trails cross between public and private lands.

More and more, the blame game of liability versus responsibility appears to be taking over the culture of America. This is yet one more example of bringing that concern into the legal process. The old 'McDonald's coffee case' lawsuit (1994 Liebeck v. McDonald's Restaurants) has become an earmark of when historically and anecdotally speaking, a common practice of bringing lawsuits and pointing the blame where many may feel, common sense dictates a level of personal

responsibility should prevail instead. Get a hot coffee - it will be hot and could burn. Get hurt on a hike passing through private land, would it be the land owner's fault and not the hiker?

This scenario is not finished with the vote at the end of this year's legislation session. It is reported that roughly five of the 58 14K peaks will remain closed on the private land access, due to these liability concerns. A group has created the Fix CRUS Coalition with many large organizations participating, to seek a revision to the Colorado Recreational Use Statute in Colorado.

An alliance of nonprofits will be raising the issue again next year, looking for a revision to the Colorado Recreational Use Statute (CRUS). Included in the Fix CRUS Coalition is the Colorado Fourteeners Initiative, the Colorado Mountain Club, the Boulder Climbing Community, the Access Fund, The Nature Conservancy, the Trust for Public Land, the American Alpine Club, the Outdoor Alliance, People for Bikes and American Whitewater.

The way the current law reads states that landowners are liable for "willful or malicious failure to warn against a known dangerous condition." There was an Air Force Academy case where land owners were found liable due to failure to post warnings on a washed out trail, and a cyclist was severely injured when they crashed due to the wash out. The change is being considered between the words willful and wanton, or willful and malicious. It's going to take a lot of lawyers and legalese to push through any change. The divide between concerns over property rights, public access, and land conservation and economic impacts to surrounding communities all play a part in this continuing high stake saga.

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CPW and SWA

Colorado Parks and Wildlife manages about 350 State Wildlife Areas. SWAs are paid for primarily by sportspersons and managed for the benefit of wildlife. These areas may also offer wildlife-related recreation and potentially opportunities for other forms of recreation when not in conflict with wildlife or wildlife recreation.

In December 2019, the Area Wildlife Managers, in consultation with CPW staff managing the SWAs, began analyzing what negative impacts were occurring and coming up with ideas and solutions to these problems.

To help manage increasing recreation at SWAs, CPW began requiring either a valid hunting or fishing license, or an SWA access pass, for anyone 16 or older accessing most SWAs.

You can refer to the regulation changes document to view all of the changes (beginning on page 6) and learn more about how the changes affect SWAs near you (property specific provisions begin on page 13).

While the general provision changes include new restrictions, some restrictions may not

apply to all SWAs (e.g., allowing camping at certain properties).

These new regulatory changes will go into effect on August 1, but Lamb said CPW wildlife officers would be implementing an education campaign for the first year to ensure everyone is aware of how new regulations may be affecting their favorite SWA before handing out citations for any violations of new regulations.



MORE AREA RESORTS Resort development in San Juan County UT continues to move forward, most recently there was a unanimous rezone application approval for a 72 acre project called Balance Rock Resort in Spanish Valley northwest of Ken's Lake reservoir (south of Moab). The project is slated to add 217 residential units, including 99 single family lots, 42 duplexes, 34 condos, and a lodge that can service 130 rooms. Additionally there are plans for a clubhouse playground and open space on the three identified parcels. The County planning committee had suggested approval as residential flex zoning; the potential for new tax revenue appeared to be an influencing reason for the approval.

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FUEL YOUR ROCKET STOVE

Food and Prep Tips By Kendra Cook

Hot summer nights you'll find backyard chefs cooking outside on grills of all types. But have you seen or used a **"Rocket Stove"**? It's a name for a variety of heating and cooking configurations that work off the basic principle to supply a minimal burning source for maximum combustion and heat.

Originally designed to minimize smoke and deforestation across the world, it's found its way to be a trend for people wanting to use alternative cooking and heating methods.

The shape is an "L" or J" style, think of it like a big boot - where the horizontal chamber at the bottom is where you insert small wood, like sticks and wood scraps, the fire creates a vortex that goes up the vertical chimney section, where you can create a grate platform separated on top for placement of a cooking vessel.

This contraption creates less waste, less smoke, and provides a concentrated heat source. It also keeps the fire and potential debris within the unit helping to prevent

unwanted sparks that can create unwanted fires. There are plenty of models available to purchase, or a whole bunch of youtube videos online to demonstrate how you can cheaply and quickly make one at home. Campers and preppers alike, are familiar with the rocket stove for mobile use as well.

This unit in the photo, is made with firebricks, which help insulate and withstand the heat. A scrap metal grate is used to elevate the fire source for easy ash clean up and air circulation. At the top, an old gas stove burner ring provides a stable resting spot for the pan. Learn to make a Rocket Stove and watch your outdoor fast cooking really take off.

Summer Rattlesnake Awareness

CPW provides background and tips to deal with potentially deadly wild animals: "Rattlesnakes have an elaborate defensive strategy, seeking to avoid the need for a venomous bite if possible. Most of the time, rattlesnakes will not strike at people unless they feel threatened or are deliberately provoked. While attacks on people are rare and usually not fatal for a healthy adult, bites are very painful and should always be taken seriously. Bites can have an increased effect on children and pets due to their smaller size."

Rattlesnakes are not built for speed, and will hold their ground when threatened. They coil up and make the rattle noise when feeling threatened, slowly moving away is highly suggested.

Rattlers are most frequently seen in the spring and fall, as they come out to warm up on rocks and pavement. The best way to avoid a bite is to avoid snakes. CPW suggests awareness and avoidance are key - watch for the reptiles, be careful where you step, protecting your feet and ankles by wearing sturdy leather boots when out in wild terrain, can also be good protection. If you do encounter one, freeze in place, calmly assess the situation and slowly create distance as they can strike at a long range. Pets and small children are a big concern, due to their smaller size. If bitten, call a poison center for instructions and head to the nearest hospital (800-222-1222) immediately remove any jewelry or tight fitting clothing as you can expect swelling. Avoid excess movement. Do not cut or try to extract venom, do not use ice, heat or a tourniquet, and do not try to capture or kill the snake.
