HIGH SPEED INTERNET

Super fast internet is becoming a type of 'utility'; needed for a majority of households to replace the telephone wired lines, the satellite or cable, and or a communication tool for both distant learning and home office business. In Dove Creek, there several options currently available: AT&T and Verizon cell phone service, using a phone as a hot spot. ZumaCom L.O.S. internet with a view to the Bean tower on the west of town. Farmer's side Telecommunications, with L.O.S. to the courthouse tower. CenturyTel, with DSL lines to businesses and homes. And now Elon Musk's Starlink units, small satellites in low Earth orbit. Then there is fiber optics. Through a federally backed program, to reach rural areas with high speed Internet through a fiber line; Enter Emery.

Emery Telcom CEO Jared Anderson provided an update back on June 21st with the Dolores County Commissioners. At that time, they were waiting for the permits from CDOT in order to have Empire Electric make ready line work on the poles in June. The install in Dove Creek itself was awarded to Fibertel. First phase of the Dove Creek install was to begin in two months, such that September was the estimated



start date, with fiber service lit 'this fall'. There was a 10 x 16 building ordered to be setup on a small lot they purchased across from the Family Dollar property.

Emery system is also a certified telephone provider so those interested in land line service can bundle with the wifi services. After that, Phase 2 encompasses the Egnar area, and Phase 3 extends down to points south of town. All installations need to be completed by 2025 to comply with the USDA grant. In the summer, the project was currently six months behind the original schedule due to permitting delays.

The most recent request for an update in mid October, stated "The fiber build from Monticello to the State Utah/Colorado line complete. We were able to bury the route on the Utah side in partnership with UDOT. As you know, we have had significant delays on the Colorado side in attempting to work with CDOT to continue the buried fiber route. They are demanding that we pay for their infrastructure in exchange for a right-of-way permit. **CONTINUED PAGE 2**





The Dolores County Sheriff department works on many community issues, including working with the vast BLM and Forest Service land authorities, as those acres make up nearly 62% of our county.

Undersheriff Matt Purkat addressed the County Commissioners about pursuing a grey and black marijuana grant - specific for enforcement and prosecution or both. As most illegal grows are on federal lands both forests and blm, the Sheriff's office is looking to implement fly overs of the vast lands not able to be seen from roadside access, to better identify and be pro active on investigations, and spreading out the man power as much as we can, Purkat said at the meeting.

The Department is looking at \$15K plus certification to operate the drone - at \$300 per person, and digital training in house. The opportunity is to become more pro active and preventative towards attracting illegal activities, where people tend to take advantage of the seclusion opportunities for illegal grows.


Ronda Lancaster is working with the Sheriff's office on this grant proposal. The commissioners need to approve the action, and address training and incarceration expenses, and payments possibly needed for informants.

This would add hundreds of thousands of dollars to the project, which is unfeasible.

As a result, we will be building the route aerial from the State line to Dove Creek. The contract from the State line to Dove Creek has been awarded to our subcontractor FiberTel, and construction should begin in approximately 3-4 weeks. They will be constructing the fiber route along highway 491, and then building the distribution to the

homes identified in Dove Creek Reconnect 1."

Mr. Anderson continued, "We were also awarded USDA Reconnect 2 grant funds for a second-phase build to Lewis and Egnar. We were relying on supplementary funding from the Colorado State broadband program to assist with funding. Unfortunately, the Colorado Broadband board denied our request stating that they didn't want to contribute because we already had partial Federal funding. Lack of State contribution combined with difficulties resulting from inflationary increases in materials and labor have made this project difficult to justify. As a result, we are evaluating options with USDA and determining how to proceed. USDA recently announced supplemental funding due to this nationwide issue, but we are unsure whether or not it will be sufficient to keep this project on track. We will follow-up as soon as we have additional information from USDA regarding Reconnect 2 supplemental funding." Maps show the areas in the program coming in to Reconnect 1.

DOLLAR GENERAL BIG BOX DELAY

Curious as to what's happening with the new Dollar General store not yet being open? Initial grand opening was scheduled for mid July. The company hired on five local employees, who have worked within the store, as well as traveling to out of our area stores, in order to retain the job filling hours of employment. Initial delays in construction have been overcome; the store is ready, the parking lot ready, but the connection to ample power has yet to be accomplished.

Electricity was to be ready in early October, but the existing setup did not supply enough. The next step to access ample power was to run lines under the highway to connect to a pole on the south side of highway 491. In requesting updates on what is holding up progress, a first contact to Empire Electric provided the response from Shawna McLaughlin that the "EEA engineering team completed all the design work and released the project to the crews in August. The construction crews have inset the new power pole and completed as much work as possible, but are now waiting on the DG contractor to obtain the CDOT permit to cross under Hwy 491 with a bore for our underground conductor."

Request for CDOT to update they replied that they would "check on that", with no further response to date. Dollar General media relations replied "Thank you for reaching out. We are currently anticipating our Dove Creek location at 60634 Highway 491 to open in late fall 2022 as we complete construction. We are also working with employees during this time. We apologize for the inconvenience this may cause our customers and employees and look forward to welcoming customers to our store soon."

It appears that the CDOT permit is what is holding up further completion and opening. Meanwhile, the location is operating at minimal capacity through the use of gas powered generators. An official 'grand opening' date has yet to be released.

It is second rifle season as I write this. Hunters are out in mass, elk are moving out of the high country and the big bucks have gone into hiding (according to everyone with a buck tag). I've heard of a few locals who have gotten their first kill, a 330 class bull, or some other trophy they're proud of. I love to see that!

Unfortunately, I have also gotten reports of six animals shot and left in the field in the past three days; three bucks and three spike bulls. In four of these cases the animal had been there over a day and I have no information to point me to who might have let our wildlife go to waste.

In light of this, I want to take a minute to share some information regarding this type of wildlife crime. Most of these cases fall under Willful Destruction of Wildlife (Title 33-6-117 if you want to look it up in Colorado's state statutes), where a hunter intentionally abandons an animal they have killed. For big game, this is a class 5 felony! Yep, that scary word FELONY, where the guilty party has to go to court, loses their right to have guns, owes lots of money, etc. It's one of only two wildlife charges that is a felony, the other being Illegal Sale of Wildlife (IE illegal outfitting). In other cases, where the animal was not intentionally abandoned, but was still left in the field by accident, charges can include Waste of Game and/or Failure to Follow up on a shot. These are not felonies, but carry fines of up to \$200 and 10 to 15 license suspension points.

I highly encourage any hunter who accidentally shoots the wrong animal to call myself, another CPW officer, or the Dolores County Sheriff's Office. For self-reported mistaken kills, the ticket is almost always \$139.50 with 5 license suspension points. We have to seize the animal and donate it, but in most cases the hunter can keep their license and continue to hunt if they wish. I promise you, any wildlife officer in this area would much rather write that ticket than a felony summons.

I know that small town relationships and dynamics can make it difficult for people to

report crimes that they witness. For those who do not know me yet, I grew up in Meeker, CO, which is a small town in the Northwest part of the state (not quite as small as Dove Creek, but very similar culture), and I've been in tricky situations like that myself. That's why I want everyone to know about our Operation Game Thief (OGT) program. It allows reporting parties to remain completely anonymous, even from the wildlife officer if they want to.

You can share pictures, videos, GPS locations, etc., and all of the information will be passed to the wildlife officer who covers that district. The OGT staff do a great job. In my experience, I usually receive reports within 30 minutes of the reporting party calling or emailing, and sometimes even faster. If you need some extra persuasion (besides the good feeling of doing the right thing) if you report a wildlife crime through the OGT program and we are able to catch and convict the guilty party, you will be eligible for a monetary reward, or possibly a hunting license or preference point through our Turn In Poachers (TIPS) program.

As your local District Wildlife Manager, I am asking for your help to prevent and solve wildlife crimes. It's my job to protect the wildlife of Colorado for everyone, but my fellow wildlife officers and I cannot do that as

For many, the old type of TV news just isn't informative or relevant so much of the time. Check out the many ways that social media could be helpful.

You might be surprised!

well without your help. If you see or hear of a wildlife crime, or hunters trespassing, that you would like to report do not hesitate to call myself, Ryan Lane, Dove Creek Dispatch, or Operation Game Thief. 





Schools: Dove Creek 9th 10th grade PSAT scores rank #1 over regional schools

Good news coming from the Dove Creek Schools. High school testing on the PSAT shows Dove Creek students topping the regional ranking for both reading and math for the 9th and 10th grade classes.

The PSAT is a Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test taken during the early high school years, followed by the SAT. The SAT scores, a national standardized test, is often used by colleges and universities of higher education across the country, as part of the consideration for admittance.

The comparative "benchmarks" are established by the department of education as percentages. The testing is performed in the spring, and for the 9th grade, students increased their scoring in both math and evidence-based reading writing, 10th grade up in ERW, slightly down in math.

Shane Baughman, Dove Creek High School Principal, said that he feels retaining the teachers is a big help in increasing the student learning, which is reflected in the success of these testing scores.

Currently, the student registration total is 86 total enrollment 9th through 12th grades, and of those, there are 37 students taking some type of dual credit college courses. The school district pays for those classes, and credit applies towards the higher education in a Colorado college automatically. Many of these courses are basic college general education, so that a student entering into a higher educational program will have already completed a number of credits. Several students are also enrolled in CTE courses, for career technical educational classes such as welding or automotive work, that provide students class credits, while working towards certifications to be prepared to go directly into the workplace after high school.

The School District is dedicated to providing the best possible educational experience for the youth of Dove Creek. The scores also show that for 9th grade Reading and Writing and Mathematics, Dolores County RE No. 2 was 1st in local regional ranking, ahead of Bayfield, Archuleta, Manco and Dolores (and vice versa for math), Montezuma-Cortez and Ignacio. The 10th grade PSAT also resulted



in Dolores County RE No. 2 District as ranked 1st in both read and writing, and mathematics, ahead of Bayfield Dolores Mancos Archuleta, Iganacio and Montezuma Cortez for r/w, and ahead of Bayfield, Mancos, Archuleta, Dolores Ignacio and Montezuma-Cortez in that order for math.

Thanks to the hard work of the students and teachers alike, our regional reputation for education is enhancing, as we are above the Colorado state all district rankings, and topped the list of our regional districts PSATs 2022 9th and 10th grades,

The 7th Street Elementary school, has also been able to retain all of the staff, to continue to provide a solid base for children's education. The 2022 report showed the kids testing MAPS program above the 50% norm for most every category (3-5th grades reading was just shy with 47%, and grew significantly on the school year). The letter from Principal Charlotte Forst said "gaps are getting filled, and achievement is rising."


