Be Prepared. Great "Scout" motto, which many of us grew up with, especially if you live in a rural area like the four corners, so many know how to prepare for a range of situations, but how well prepared are you. There's a mental element too, having all the tools for self reliant food, water, protection and shelter is fantastic, you also have to be mentally prepared to remain calm and think clearly.

The more you read on how to be prepared, the more you will learn you can only survive and thrive so far on your own - the gathering of community to work together is of the utmost importance. How timely that this month is highlighted by the Thanksgiving Holiday - with an opportunity to gather together and put Team Humanity ahead of petty disputes or disagreements.

Don't Take the Bait! This is also critical to a locally based enriched and nourished society, not to react to triggers and the memes of the prevalent death cult. The general media is fanning the flames to anticipate craziness in the streets and civil war, but where will that get us, absolutely no where. The clashes the powers that be are predicting will occur, will only happen if we let them. Don't take the bait.

The warnings have gone out, those caught in big cities will have big problems if any of the scenarios brought forth may happen. There's the scare of 'natural' disasters, floods and deluges, ice and snow events, drought and wildfires, combine that with power outages, water outages or contamination, Internet outages and cyber attacks, biological disease or bioweapons, and even foreign invasive attacks on our own homeland. Articles are featuring warnings about Russian aggression being a major threat but not the only one. Read more on a program called "Safer Together" connecting military and civilians in EU countries.

What to have for Medical supplies? Over the counter medications that are generally good to have on hand, aspirin, various items you'll find in an emergency kit. Don't forget the sanitizing solutions, like isopropyl alcohol, hydrogen peroxide, colloidal silver, and bleach. One you may not be familiar with is Chlorine Dioxide, with a multitude of uses in emergency situations, research more about this at TheUniversalAntidote.com - NASA even proclaimed this a universal antidote in 1987. Another option is Safrax CLO-2 tablets. A sinus rinse called Xlear and grapefruit seed extract. Nascent Iodine is a good supplement. A source of nicotine - in the right dose and context, suggested 3mg in a cut of a patch, or lobelia in something like a foreign protein cleanse. Have good water filters. Oregano oil is great to kill food poisoning, and clove oil is good for emergency dental issues.

Go to Brighteon.io/applications download the app, free, this can be used if website URLs are taken down as it uses peer to peer traffic, or for local communications the use of handheld radios is a good idea, like the BaoFeng UV5R, and looking into getting your HAM basic license is easier than ever.

Don't end up with a front row seat to your own demise, the hour may be late, but instead of being a turkey this thanksgiving, be prepared and lend a hand to others.

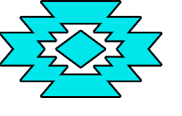

Great Day in the Woods...

Double Bobcat

There were bobcat tracks everywhere in the fresh snow. I had 5 cage traps set in the area. I thought I was guaranteed to have a bobcat caught. I could see the first set from the truck. The door was up. That was ok, I had 4 more chances to make a catch. I drove to the next one and parked my truck and climbed up on the hill. Nothing. That's ok I still have 3 more sets to check. I went back to the truck and saw cat tracks headed down towards the ravine where my 3rd trap was located. This trap I had called the black and white trap because everything I had caught in that cage up to this point was black and white. 3 skunks, a civet cat and a magpie. I took the longer slow way around to this trap.

It was snowy and the last thing you want to do when you're by yourself in the woods is fall, specifically when no one knows where you are and no one is coming to look for you. I made my way to the trap and I could see bobcat tracks coming and going in the trail. I turned the corner and I could see the door was open. The tracks walked right up to the front of the cage, walked away, came back, looked at the small piece of feather boa hanging in the back of the trap and left again. Maybe the cat didn't like the rainbow-colored fluffy bird looking piece of feather boa I had in the cage. Maybe the wind was wrong and it couldn't smell the lure in the back that was supposed to stir its curiosity. I didn't know what was wrong. The bobcats were here, I just had to convince them to crawl in a cage and investigate what was in there. There was still hope. I had to 2 more traps in the general vicinity to check. I climbed back up to the truck and went down the road to the next trap. It was close to the road and I could see it from the seat of my pickup. There was another set of cat tracks heading down the middle of the road in the fresh snow. I turned the corner and could see them veer off the road right towards my trap. I wasn't excited. I could see the door up. I walked over to the trap and it was the same thing. Right to the front of the cage, he had stuck his nose in sniffed around at the bait but wouldn't walk in the cage. I had another refusal. Why wouldn't they go in?

Trying not to throw or kick anything, I walked back to the truck. I had one more trap to check maybe it would be different. I headed back towards town. This trap was up a spur road. I parked my truck and walked up this road because it was a two track and I didn't want to tear up the road for future use. There were bobcat tracks up the road here too. I was hoping my luck would change. Those damned ol' cats just did a drive by. They walked right past the trap and never slowed down. I was dejected. On the way home I called on of my friends who had been trapping longer than I, and explained what was going on. He had some business in the area later in the week and

agreed to come look at my traps and see if he could give me some advice. He showed up and had a look at some of my sets. He made some suggestions and I made some changes. Fast forward a week after he had helped me out. I was sitting at the top of the road getting ready to check the same 5 traps. There was another fresh skiff of snow. Being in the woods is always better after a fresh snow. You can tell how many animals and what kind are in the area when you can see the tracks they've made. They also tend to move right after the storm breaks. After hiding out during the bad weather they like to get out and stretch their legs. I checked the first 4 traps and had caught nothing. I went to the last trap where I was walking up the road. There were cat tracks in the road but I had gotten my hopes up before. I came around the corner and there it was.....Door Down! I walked up and got a sight I had only heard about. Not only was there a bobcat in the cage, but there were 2 bobcats in the cage! I'm kind of glad there was no one out there to watch me dancing around in the woods like an idiot. I'm sure there were some Stellar's Jays and maybe a Raven wondering what the hell was going on when they saw my rendition of the white boy booty shake. I knew this was probably a once in a lifetime occurrence and I wanted to share it with my son. He was at my parent's house so I went to get him. I told everyone I had a once in a lifetime catch but I wouldn't tell them what it was. So, Mom, Dad and my son, Alpha jumped in the truck and headed towards the trap with me as the guide. They were all guessing what I had caught. Dad thought it was a coyote, Mom thought it was a mountain lion and Alpha, being a 5-year-old, thought it was an alien. We walked up the road and I just kept walking past the trap to see if anyone would notice the trap or the cats in it. We got right beside the trap when one of the cats lost its nerve at the sight of the pack of humans and lunged at the back of the cage. Everyone jumped and my mom (easily frightened), screamed loud enough to echo in the canyon. We all settled down and took some pictures with the bobcats. On closer inspection I realized that this was a mother-kitten duo. Originally, I expected it was a mating pair, but when I realized the female was the bigger of the 2 cats, I knew what I had caught. Trapping is a great way to manage an animal population. You can be selective about which animals you want to keep and which ones you want to release. In this case, I had the picture and the family memory so I released both of them. Trappers care more about the animals that they interact with on a daily basis than the animal-rights activists who claim to need to protect them. Wild animals are a sustainable resource that need to be managed. When you fail to manage a resource, it becomes unstable. The food pyramid for predators (in our area) begins with cottontail rabbits. Without taking some of these bobcats from the population, the rabbit population would plummet. An overpopulation of bobcats would kill the

majority of the rabbits. With no rabbits, the bobcats would starve or move toward suburban areas and begin preying on pets and livestock (chickens). At the time of publication online it's the day before elections to vote to continue to manage our wild cat populations or allow it to go unchecked. By voting NO on proposition 127 you can help carry on this tradition of conservation, trapping, and wildlife management. Hopefully prop 127 was voted down at the time of print publication.

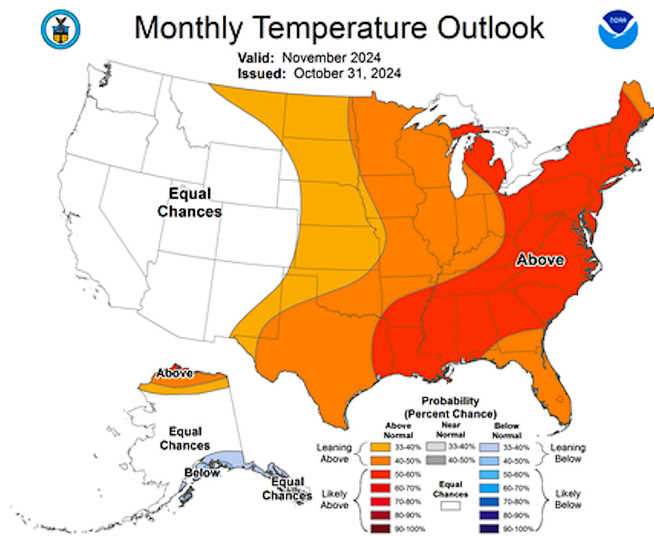

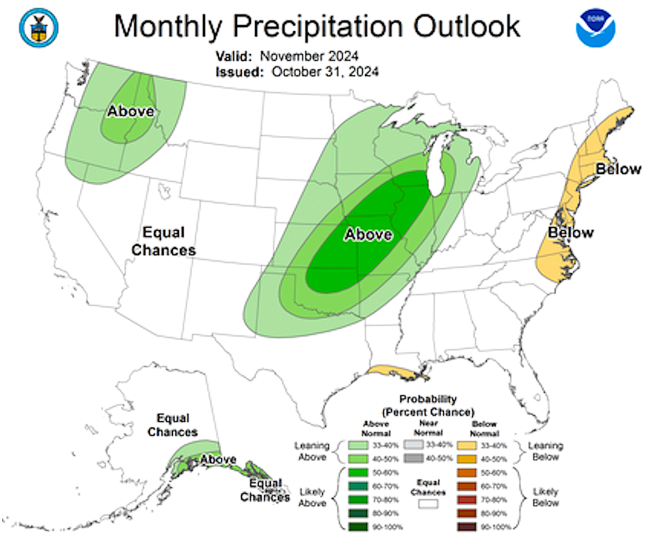
NOVEMBER WEATHER

WHOSE LAND IS IT?

This land is your land, this land is my land, from California to the New York Island.....! Do you remember this song from the 60's and 70's? It was actually written in 1940 by Woody Guthrie, a pro-union Communist sympathizer. The song depicted his distaste for the U.S. Capitalism and perceived social injustice, which was expressed in verses 5&6 in his song, and was written to counter Irving Berlin's "God Bless America". After the U.S. got into WWII and Patriotism grew, the last two verses were removed, and the song became popular for unity with several revisions of some verses and words. The song remains very popular even today, while the basic message of Socialist Government with no private land ownership has remained oblivious, yet acceptable, to most people.

Well that is interesting, so what? LAND, WATER, and AIR is necessary for man's existence on Earth. Everybody is somewhere, on LAND. The desire of most people throughout history, was to have sufficient land that has resources to construct some shelter, water and good ground to till for food as well as to create economy to improve their life while benefitting others. Today there are about 27 major civil wars and territory disputes taking place over LAND and who CONTROLS it. This is typical throughout all of recorded history for all peoples. The Recent released plan for the BLM to cover 22 Million acres of Public grazing, agriculture, mineral and watershed lands in 11 western states with solar panels in the next ten (10) years, to please the UN and others, has raised a LOT of concerns and animosity.

The common concern heard is, "don't lock up OUR Public Lands"! Stop the Government Land Grab! This raises the questions as to "who is the public" and, "what land is the government grabbing?", who benefits from the public land lock up? This whole issue is exposing a very large Elephant that has been wandering around the West for 160 years. In the Colorado Statehood enabling Act of 1875, it stated "Colorado; which state when formed, shall be admitted into the Union upon an equal footing with the original states in all respects whatsoever,.."; it then set the boundaries and stated, "Colorado shall consist of all the territory included within the following boundaries... Then describes what we see on maps as State of Colorado. Then in sect. 4 under requirements; "that the people inhabiting said territory do agree and declare that they forever disclaim all right and title to the unappropriated public lands lying within said territory, and that the same shall be and remain at the sole and entire disposition of the United States;..." The Government has defaulted on the Compact under "equal footing", and "disposition", and the State has

done nothing about it. Leaving the western 1/2 of the State about 68% a "federal State". Whose land is it? Who controls the land? Is the State fully a State if it does not have governance control over the land within the State? Until the public lands issue is resolved via SCOTUS, conflicts over land and resources will continue to worsen. The State of Utah has the same statehood issues and has initiated a challenge in federal court and has just been joined by Idaho, along with ten (10) other States such as AZ, NM IA, SC SD, WY, TX, NEB,AR, ALB as well as County governments and several Land councils and Farm Bureaus. What will Colorado do? Continue down the Socialist government path with little or no private land ownership, while ending the capitalist economy and the Republic? It has been 84 years since Irving Berlin's "God Bless America" with the Constitutional Republic that incited Guthrie's challenge to become a socialist democracy. The election is now over, will the Republic be revived, giving WE the people a place to be, live and create economy? Or will we continue to be Ruled by the Environmental NGO's using the Federal Agencies?

Power, Privilege, and the Protect the Dolores Coalition: How Environmental Groups are putting the lands they seek to protect and its inhabitants at risk.

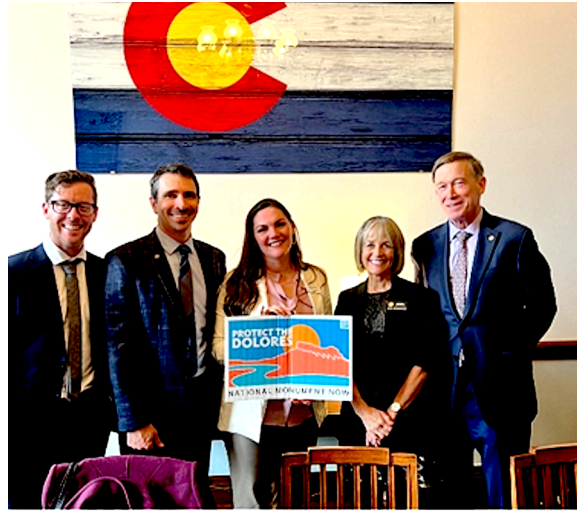


The communities of Western Colorado have been inundated with threats of a 5 County presidential proclamation of a national monument for the entire Dolores River Canyon Country. The coalition created their monument proposal without the knowledge, collaboration or input of impacted counties and communities with the intent of getting President Biden to enact the designation with his mere signature prior to leaving his post.

The proponents have violated every guiding principle of the "America the Beautiful Initiative" and have threatened our Colorado Senators to do their bidding. They have violated good faith negotiations, informed civil discourse, understanding and mutual respect and have provided no scientific evidence to support their "unprotected" claims.

By day the Coalition met with the Lower Dolores River Working Group to negotiate on a 68,000 acre National Conservation Area, but by night went home and simultaneously worked on a presidential proclamation of a national monument proposal for the 5 counties of the entire Dolores River. Does that sound like good faith negotiations? Letters of support for the 5-county national monument are provided by the Grand Junction City Council resolution signed October 4, 2023, Town of Telluride letter signed August 22, 2023, and Grand Valley Outdoor Recreation Coalition letter signed August 16, 2023.

Just in case the 68,000-acre National Conservation Area for Montezuma, Dolores and San Miguel County was approved by Congress, the Coalition simultaneously worked on a 400,000-acre monument proposal for Mesa and Montrose County. (Another great question is why hasn't it been passed by Congress? Or who is not pushing it to be passed by Congress?) The proponents claim that efforts have been made to "protect" the Dolores River for over 50 years? Local input, science and studies over the last 50 years have shown the best way to manage the land and the river; and it is not Wild and Scenic, and it is not a national monument. The poll data that the proponents have provided to support their efforts are small in participation and no locals were called on to participate in the process. 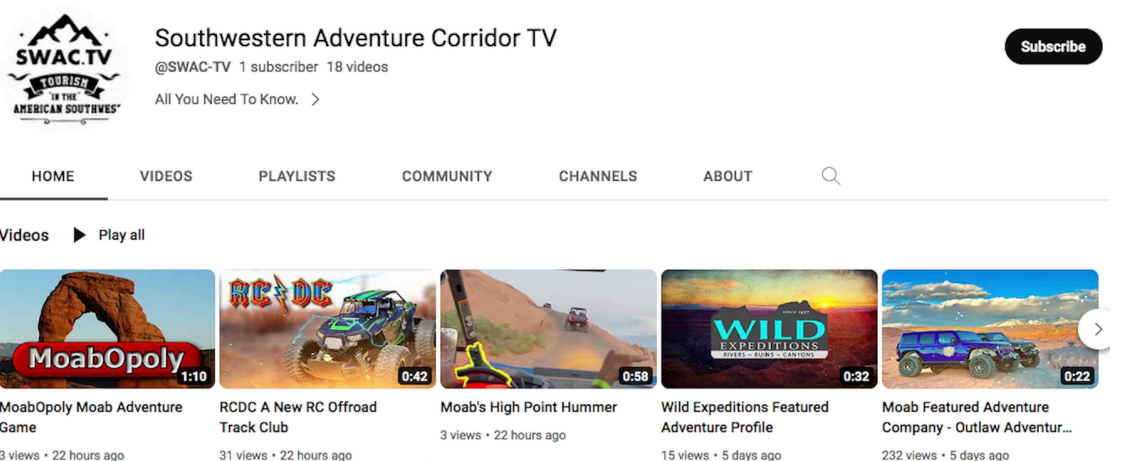

De Dollarization of the West

For world powers to de-dollarize the global economy, they need to create more momentum, and they are. As Crypto takes center stage at the recent BRICS summit (Brazil, Russia, India, China, South Africa) they also officially welcomed new members: Iran, Saudi, the United Arab Emirates, Egypt and Ethiopia. American banks are in trouble with carrying so much debt, the banking crisis is on the brink; First National Bank of Lindsay failure, put FDIC receivership in that Oklahoma institution. The depositors only got 50% of their money they had in the bank. This should be a warning and foreshadowing of what may happen with a big bank failure. The FDIC is under insured, 1.175% actually is covered by the Fed. So they really need to NOT have a bank run. The government won't be bailing out an institution this time, it would be a bail in - where they take the assets of those in the bank i.e. your funds too.

As you start to see this more discussed in the main stream, the warning becomes real that the potential of individuals losing assets in their own banks is not a conspiracy. The money coming for incentives, is all being printed, causing inflation. Banks that have more withdrawals then coming in, could present a tipping point.

Meanwhile, Putin in October added silver as a strategic reserve to the ruble, as has China and India been backing their currencies with hard assets in the form of gold. Hard value assets are a good way to preserve your financial value (wink wink). Putin is also using the power of the nuclear threat deterrence forces, to guarantee sovereignty balance of power for global stability. He's said with regard to external threats, we will support nuclear weapons as sufficiently needed. Let's hope cool heads prevail as money and power are up for grabs. Taking the dollar off of being the reserve, will have enormous ripple effects for the West.

Early in September of 2024 the whistle blew in Monticello UT. There had been a vehicle roll accident on HWY 191 My husband and I were listening to the scanner as the story unfolded. The woman Wendy and her sister were fine, however, her dog had taken off.

A few days later my husband and I were driving on Hickman Road when we noticed a car driving slowly. A man and woman waved us over and explained how she had been in an accident a couple of days ago and lost her dog. She asked us to please keep an eye out for Luke. With Wendy, we went to a home where Luke's collar pinged. They had dogs and Wendy felt that Luke was hanging out with the other dogs. Wendy had asked if she could look on their property but was denied. Then Luke's air collar suddenly stopped working. Wendy had no choice but to go home and get back to work in SLC.

For over a month I continued to keep my eyes open. I would take my dog out to the property on Hickman, hoping to draw Luke to us. I never stopped hoping. Wendy had given her information and posts on Facebook with many prayers and people keeping to look.

Fast forward to October 20, 2024, Wendy texted that Luke's collar was pinging again in the Elk Meadows area north of Monticello! At first day light I began making calls. My daughter and her coworker, Erin helped.

Day One: Sunday Morning, I sent a fwd. text to Erin to go where Luke was now pinging. My husband and I headed out too. By the time we got there the woman had the collar in her hand but Luke had made a slip. He had lost so much weight, the collar was too big. We felt discouraged but we were not about to lose hope. So close and yet so far.

Erin and her husband along with myself, mother-in-law and husband continued the search. I called the Sheriff's department and asked if they could help us, they were very helpful in setting up a trap. Mrs. Haskel allowed us to put the trap on her property.

We watched and waited and as day one came to a close Erin spotted Luke on her way to work, taking a photo as he ran away from her. Discouraged we ended the search for the day.

Day two: Monday October 21, my husband, mother-in-law and myself headed out to Elk Meadows to check the trap. It occurred to me that some people we knew had a drone. Darrin agreed to help and joined the search with his drone. It was a success, we located Luke and monitored his pattern. Wendy and her family made the trip from SLC back to Monticello to join in the search. They hiked the country to

see signs of Luke while the drone got Luke running and making it possible for others to see him many times. Yet no one could catch him. We moved the trap near a pond where Luke was spotted several times. Another slip away, as the sky darkened, we called it a day. Wendy needed to get home for work but wanted to try one more day. Her family had to get back home to SLC, so I told her she could stay with us in our home so that she could join the search one more time, one more day. So many in the community have been praying for Luke and Wendy. We prayed before we retired for the night with unshakeable hope and faith.

Day 3: October 22, we woke up to head to the pond to check the trap. Michelle offered deer legs to put near the trap. As I was becoming desperate and realizing that Darrin could not come back with the drone, we needed a horse. Many people agreed a horse would be perfect. I called my son in law and asked him if his friend Oscar would be willing to bring his horse. Within minutes Oscar agreed and Oscar and my son in law arrived with the horse, Miss Kitty, I showed Oscar the area we were sure that Luke must be in. He saddled up and headed into the trees. While we were waiting at the meeting place another woman of support, Robbie, showed up to see how the search was going. She offered to help by getting food out near her home as we waited to see if Miss Kitty would get Luke moving again.

Within about ten minutes I looked up and there within about ten feet, was Luke walking across the road by us. Miss Kitty had flushed him out of the trees. I tried to stay calm as I whispered, "there he is, there he is." Slowly Wendy tried to get him to come to her. We all quietly called to him.

So much hope and excitement. Then, Luke bolted running up the road. I yelled for my son in law to Call for Oscar to come back. Miss Kitty came galloping with Oscar as we pointed to where Luke was headed. Horse and Oscar took off and so did Wendy disappearing north into the trees toward her

beloved dog. Feeling how close we were, and discouragement, tried to over shadow the hope. But in faith we knew today had to be the day. A month and half later here we were still standing with unshakable hope. Within another 10 minutes Wendy called me happily crying, "We have Luke!"

He was finally caught, Wendy by his side. The horse had pushed Luke to the home of the very first people who had Luke Sunday Morning. He ran

into their shop and Mr. Haskel shut the door on him. I along with everyone who followed this story are so beyond happy that Luke Is reunited with his family. My 92-year-old mother-in-law was a trooper and her keen eyes had spotted Luke on one occasion that he made another slip. She was so happy to go with my husband and I to meet Wendy's family in Wellington to reunite with the rest of the family.

Day 4: Luke arrived in SLC at the Vet hospital around 1:00 AM, his organs and bones were fine. So the Vet gave him a shot of vitamins and deworming medicine, and now he is on his way to recovery after battling the weather, out smarting coyotes, cats, and even a bear seen in the area.

He joined his sister dog, Dora, Wendy, her brother and her son. Wendy had just moved to Utah from Orlando Florida when the accident occurred.

She is so very grateful for everyone who came together to help her.

It's a story of the power of faith, hope, and determination and what can happen when people work together. Everyone was so amazing that took part in the heroism. Wendy is Luke's biggest hero for her love and unfailing determination that she would reunite with him again.

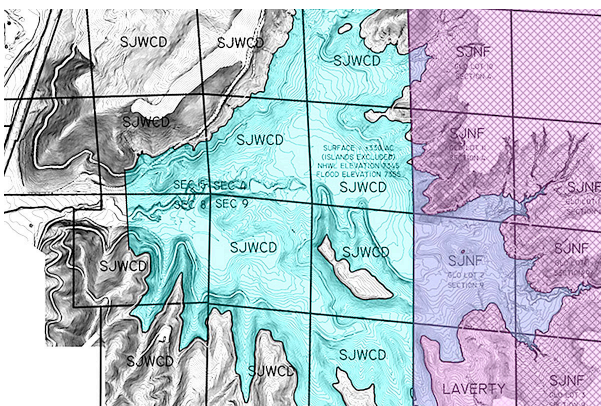

PAGOSA SPRINGS CO

Pagosa Springs is yet another community wrestling with water issues. They had purchased the Running Iron Ranch in 2008, however as it was without a supporting vote, the community has had questions on how a proposed 32,000 acre-foot reservoir named 'Dry Gulch Reservoir' would actually address theoretical water shortages that PAWSD would be seeing due to population growth, they were told. The size of the reservoir started at 4,000 acre-feet and grew to 12,500 acre-feet, then 32,000 acre-feet over the years.

The Colorado Supreme Court rejected PAWSD arguments for a 32,000 acre-foot reservoir, and the project was downsized to about 11,000 acre-feet in a stipulated agreement with sportsmen's organization Trout Unlimited, the Pagosa Daily Post reported. When the Water Supply Community Work Group was organized by PAWSD to examine the proposed reservoir details, they concluded it did not need the reservoir after all. With a year of discussions and a report available online (WSCWG) they found alternatives to meet the needs of additional water supply.

DURANGO CO



Colorado U.S. Senators Michael Bennet and John Hickenlooper released information on their introduction of the Gold King Mine Spill Compensation Act to help communities in Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, and Arizona that were affected by the Gold King Mine disaster of 2015.

"The effects of the Gold King Mine disaster were felt far beyond the banks of the Animas River. The blowout hurt families, farmers, and outdoor recreation companies in Durango and throughout southwest Colorado who depend on the river for their livelihoods," said Bennet. "Almost a decade later, too many Coloradans still feel its effects. Our legislation is a necessary step to help Coloradans finally recover certain remaining costs and damages incurred from the spill and make Southwest Colorado communities whole again."

"Local farmers, homeowners, and outdoor rec outfitters were left high and dry after the Gold King Mine spill in 2015," said Hickenlooper. "Our bill will make sure they get the compensation they need to finally recover and move forward." We will follow this story to see if it actually passes.



MANCOS CO

Mancos will now be requiring the residents to make a "reasonable effort" to contain their trash in bear proof bins, as the interaction of people and animals continues to bring concerns. This will go into effect as of April 1 2025, with a fine possible for not complying. This fall they experienced significant bear interaction with the town, which keeping garbage cans sealed, should help prevent bear interest in residential and commercial locations.

NAVAJO NATION

"A recent analysis of fatal vehicle accidents along the haul route uranium trucks travel between Canyon Mine (renamed Pinyon Plain Mine), a uranium mine near the Grand Canyon, and the White Mesa uranium mill in southeastern Utah shows an elevated risk along long stretches of the more than 300-mile route, especially on the Navajo Nation. This according to analysis brought forth in support of efforts to reduce the risks with the current operations. "We looked at fatal accident data collected by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's Fatality Analysis Reporting System, covering nine years, from 2014 to 2022," explained Grand Canyon Trust Senior GIS Analyst Josh O'Brien. "Then we crosswalked that data with average daily traffic counts collected by the Arizona and Utah state departments of transportation."

Trucking is currently paused while discussions between the Navajo Nation and Energy Fuels continue. Arizona's attorney general continues to call for a new environmental review of the Pinyon Plain Mine, and advocates from the Havasupai Tribe, the Navajo Nation, and their supporters continue to call for the mine to close.

WOLF CREEK CO



Wolf Creek CO was the first Ski area to open for the 24-25 season in October. Wolf Creek, which is celebrating its 85th anniversary this year, has opened during the month of October 15 times since 1984. The earliest opening was Oct. 7 in 2011. It reopened on Oct 22nd this year.

Wolf Creek traditionally gets the most snow of any ski area in Colorado. It is located about 250 miles southwest of Denver, along U.S. Highway 160 between South Fork and Pagosa Springs. Loveland and Arapahoe Basin, two ski areas on opposite sides of Loveland Pass, are usually the first two in Colorado to open for the season. Early season skiers can take advantage of Wolf Creek's "Local Appreciation" rate daily lift tickets, priced at \$68 for adults, \$49 for seniors ages 65-79 and \$34 for children. Lift tickets are free for skiers ages 80 and older. Tickets can be purchased online at WolfCreekSki.com or in person at the ticket office at the base of the mountain.

Tumeric Pineapple Chicken Recipe

You might recognize Tumeric as a spice used in India for foods that turn dishes bright orange. It is most often used in the form of drying the root, and grinding it to powder. In recent years it has grown in popularity as a supplement known for it's anecdotal anti inflammatory properties, good for joint pains allegedly (not a doctor but personally has worked for me). Here's a recipe for Tumeric Pineapple Chicken for a flavorful fall dish. Simmer the juice, vinegar, spices, mustard, honey in a saucepan over medium heat til reduced around 10-15 minutes. Let cool. Transfer half of sauce to small bowl and set aside for serving.

Season the chicken with salt, and grill over direct heat to brown (or brown in a skillet with butter) then baste with half the mixture until cooked thoroughly whichever method you use.

Serve this dish over a grain, a basic rice, couscous or give quinoa (pronounced KEEN -WAH) a try! It's a grain like seed with great nutrition, is available in a variety of colors, start with the mild white one. You'll want to rinse it off, then boil it at a ratio of 1 3/4 c. water to 1 c. quinoa, cover and simmer for 15 minutes, take it off the heat and let stand for 10 min, then remove the lid and fluff with a fork. If you like more flavor, salt and pepper it, or add some fresh herbs to taste.

Use this or rice as your base, slice the chicken and spread on top, then cover the dish with the remaining liquid mixture, top with chopped green onions and chunks of pineapple. Add a side vegetable such as steamed broccoli or try any fresh cooked veg with color to make it a delicious meal.

- INGREDIENTS**
 1/2 pineapple juice from the can (save pineapple chunks for later)
 1/4 cup honey
 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar
 3 Tbls Dijon mustard
 1 tsp red pepper flakes
 1/2 tsp ginger (or 1tsp fresh)
 1/2 tsp turmeric
 1/2 tsp cumin
 Chicken breasts
 Himalayan salt
 Green onions chopped
