The Tribal Council Speaker has prepared an essential services list of services provided by the Legislative branch. In case of budget shortfall, this list will be maintained in priority order.

1. Tribal Council Weekly Meetings
2. Tribal Council Work Sessions
3. Ensure communications to membership via LRBOI Website and tribal digital newsletter "Currents".
4. Annual External Audit of LRBOI financial activities.
5. Ensure Tribal Activities create cultural education and opportunities to membership. Jinngtomak, Round Dance, Feast Fires and Ceremony, etc.

Judicial

Pursuant to the Budget and Appropriations Act of 2013, Ordinance #13-100-04, Section 5.02(d), the Judicial Branch establishes the following list of essential services, in order of priority, in the event of a budget revenue shortfall for 2026.

1. Criminal jurisdiction/court of LR ordinances and laws (this includes traffic violations and civil infractions at the LR Casino/Resort), and CORA violations.
2. Child Welfare cases.
3. Child support foreign judgment enforcement.
4. Civil jurisdiction/court for LR ordinances and laws
5. Personal Protection Order issuance and enforcement. (which can also be obtained at the county court in which the petitioner lives)

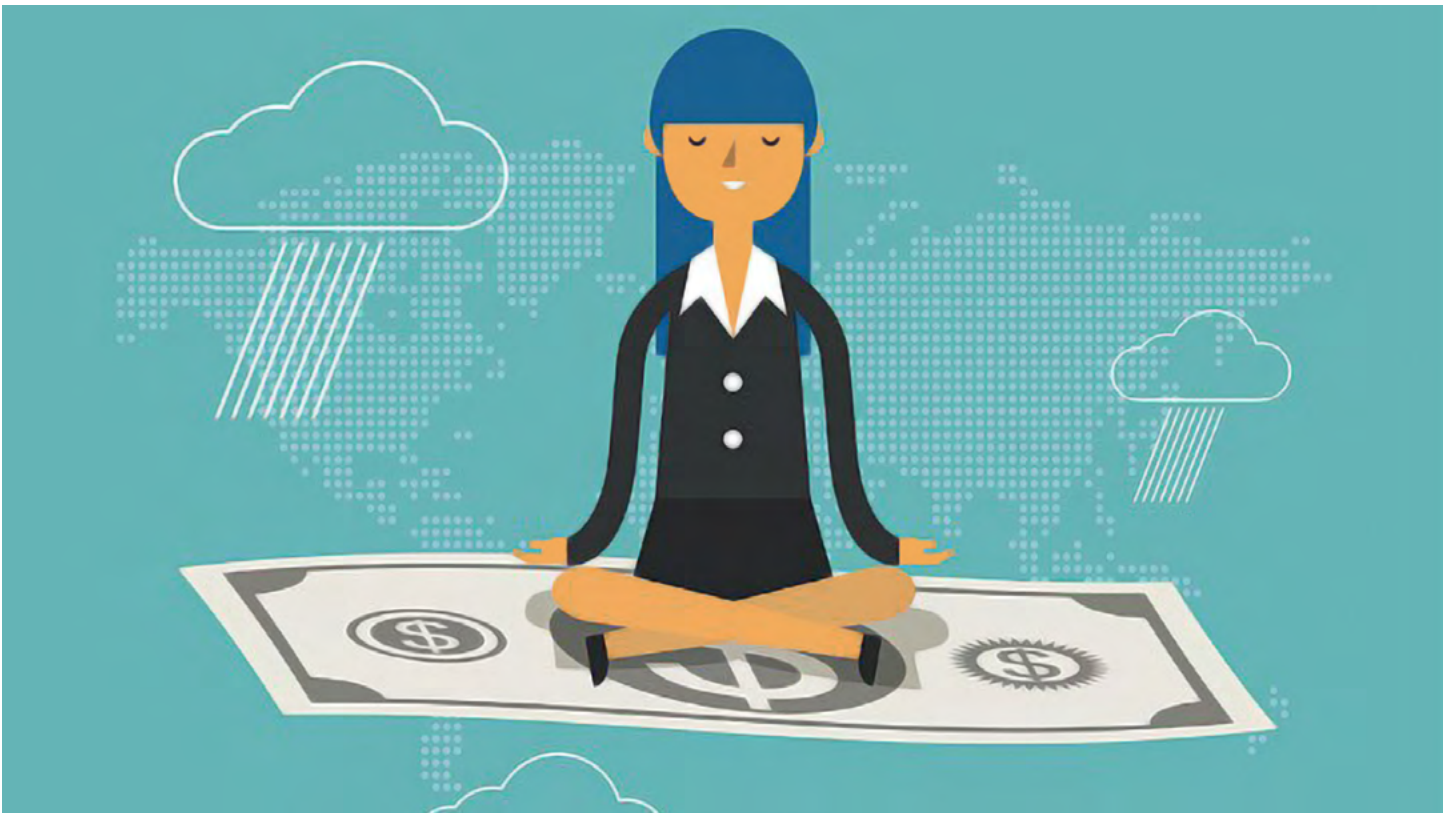

2025 General Welfare Economic Hardship Disbursement

In response to ongoing economic challenges affecting Tribal citizens, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians (LRBOI) Tribal Council has established a 2025 Tribal General Welfare Economic Hardship Disbursement to support Tribal members during a period of heightened financial strain.

The Tribal Council cited multiple factors contributing to the current hardship, including sustained inflation, rising health care costs, the recent federal government shutdown, and uncertainty surrounding federal and state government benefits. These pressures have significantly increased the cost of living for essential needs such as food, housing, utilities, medical care, transportation, and participation in cultural and ceremonial activities.



Tribal leadership reaffirmed that the disbursement reflects the Council's ongoing commitment to supporting the well-being of Tribal citizens and helping families navigate uncertain economic conditions while maintaining cultural, community, and household stability.



Indigenous Films To Screen at 2026 Sundance Film Festival

A long-standing champion of independent cinema, the Sundance Institute was founded in 1981 by Robert Redford, and named after his iconic character in the Academy Award-winning film *Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid*. Redford, who died on Sept. 16, leaves behind a legacy deeply intertwined with the support and elevation of Indigenous filmmakers and stories.

The 2026 Sundance Film Festival, running from Jan. 22 to Feb. 1, 2026, will continue that legacy with a powerful slate of Indigenous-centered films exploring land, memory, spirituality, and survival.

“Aanikoobijigan (ancestor/great-grandparent/great-grandchild)” from directors and producers Adam Khalil and Zack Khalil. Ancestors trapped in museum archives bend time and space to find their way home. History, spirituality, and the law collide in this dramatic feature as tribal repatriation specialists fight governments and institutions to return and rebury Indigenous human remains. The film offers a revealing look at the still-pervasive worldviews that justified collecting them in the first place.

The film follows 11 Indigenous repatriation specialists that make up the Michigan Anishinaabek Cultural Preservation and Repatriation Alliance who are fighting to rebury and return ancestors from settler-colonial libraries, archives, and museums. Through an essay approach, the film lays bare the history of Indigenous collections, the laws passed to ensure return of human remains and funerary objects, and portraits of the courageous individuals doing the hard and emotionally draining work of bringing ancestors back home.

Adam Khalil, director, is an Ojibwe filmmaker and artist who lives and works in Brooklyn. His work attempts to subvert traditional forms of image-making through humor, relation, and transgression. Khalil is a co-founder of Cousin Collective and core contributor to the art performance group New Red Order. Zack Khalil, director, is an Ojibwe filmmaker and artist who lives and works in Brooklyn. His work centers Indigenous narratives in the present – and looks toward the future through the use of innovative nonfiction forms.

A similar theme emerges in the World Cinema Documentary Competition with “Kikuyu Land” from Kenya. While investigating a civil land petition against the British Crown and Kenya’s tea industry, a Nairobi journalist stumbles upon her own family’s buried secrets. Directors Andrew Brown and Bea Wangendu.

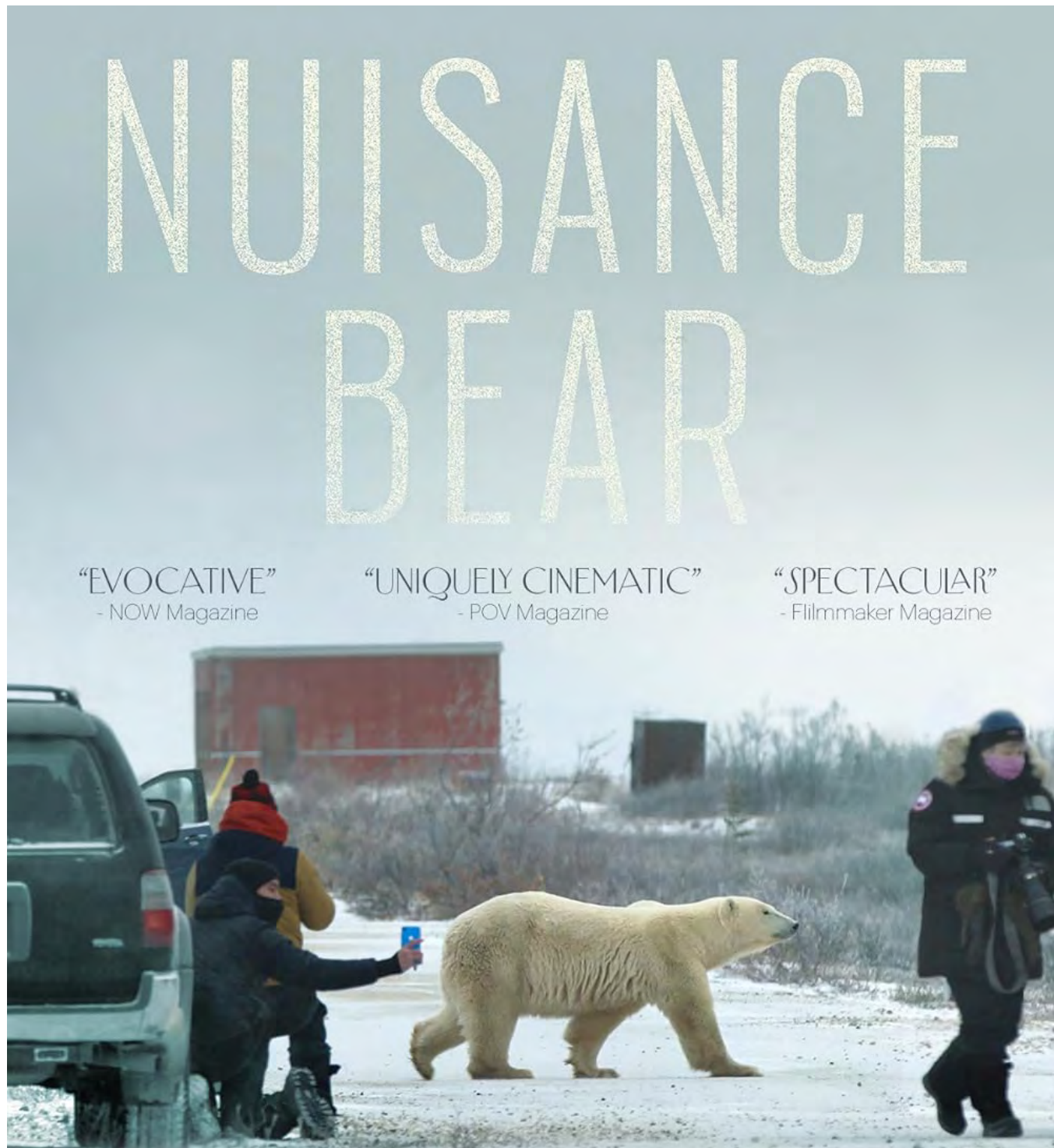
“Levitating” is a film about a town where pleasure means being possessed by spiritual beings.



Bayu aspires to be the shaman of a trance party so he can raise enough money to prevent an impending eviction.

“Nuisance Bear” – A polar bear is forced to navigate a human world of tourists, wildlife officers, and hunters when its ancient migration route collides with modern life. After a sacred predator is branded a nuisance, it becomes unclear who truly belongs in this shared landscape.

Together, these films underscore Sundance’s continued commitment to Indigenous storytelling—stories that confront colonial legacies, reclaim memory, and imagine futures rooted in sovereignty, resilience, and connection to land.



Tribal Members Support Shop with a Hometown Hero Event in Manistee

Thirty local children partnered with first responders from approximately seven public safety agencies during the annual Shop with a Hometown Hero event held at the Manistee Meijer.

The event pairs children with law enforcement officers, firefighters, and other public safety personnel to shop for gifts for their families ahead of the holiday season. The program is organized each year by the Manistee County Sheriff's Office and is designed to support families while building positive connections between youth and first responders.

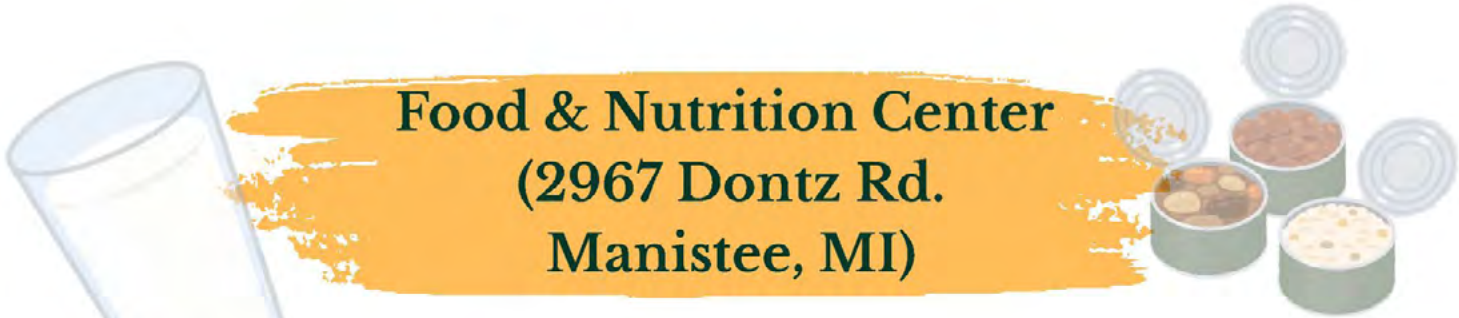

NATIONAL RADON ACTION MONTH



WHAT IS RADON?

Radon is a colorless, odorless, and radioactive gas that naturally comes from the decay of radium and uranium.



RADON IN MICHIGAN

Radon can be found in Michigan homes. In fact, 1/4 homes in Michigan has a radon level that poses a significant health risk.



RADON HEALTH RISKS

Long-term exposure to radon is known to cause serious health concerns. **Radon is the number one cause of lung cancer in non-smokers** and the second leading cause of lung cancer in smokers.

RADON TESTING

The only way to find out if your home has radon is to use a radon test. If your home has previously been tested, another test is recommended if it has been more than 2 years. **If you would like a test kit, please reach out to your local health department.**
