Lent Begins


The church's Lenten season is just about to begin.



Devotional

Philippines 4:8

Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.

I like writing about things I've realized and learned from scripture. I feel like explaining it and writing it out helps me understand it better. So even if this isn't an article you think is amazing, that's okay, perhaps it will touch someone!

After the last article I wrote on John 5, I learned what I wrote above. It felt cool to have the Holy Spirit reveal something to me in scripture. I was hoping to do something similar this month, but I don't have anything crazy amazing to share. So I went on Bible gateway and the passage above was the verse that popped up for today.

One thought I had was, who is more honorable, true, just, pure, commendable, lovely, excellent, and worthy of praise than Jesus?

Jesus is the truth; He even says so in John 14:6 "I am the way, the truth, and the life." He is perfect; He chose to die and sacrifice Himself on the cross so that you and I could have everlasting life by faith in Him. This life we can't obtain by ourselves! The Holy Spirit creates the faith in our hearts. In 1 Corinthians 12:3, the Bible says,"And no one can say that Jesus is Lord except by the Holy Spirit." Is it not amazing that our God not only provides a way for us to be saved but also gives us the very faith to believe and be saved? John 3:16 - For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life.

The verse that leads into this devotional also reminded me of one of my favorite Christian songs *Praise* by Elevation Worship, Brandon Lake, and others. One of the lines in verse 3 talks about praising God when you feel like it and even when you don't. Jesus is always worthy to be praised. On days when we are so filled with the Holy Spirit and **want** to praise God, and even on on the days when we feel crushed in spirit.

Modern Day Heros

You might be wondering why I chose farmers to be the subject of my Modern Day Heroes article this month. Many people have the perspective that farmers are just like anyone else; they are just the common man trying to succeed and do their job, but what most of the world fails to see is how greatly their work is needed by everyone else, and how they have been treated by the media and corrupt governmental powers.

Farmers are the ultimate definition of a hero. They produce so much more than just food on people's tables. Farmers in France, Belgium, and Germany have been blocking roads with tractor columns, hay and anything else they could use to block roads in protest of similar mistreatment in their countries. In the Netherlands a new court ruling of taxing and monitoring nitrogen emissions has created tons of backlash and protests. It went as far as the Netherland farmers electing their own pro farmer party, which swept the floor in elections this past year. A cause for great celebration for those people!

Governments restricting livestock emissions would cause farmers to cut part of their livestock, which in turn would directly impact the food supply we get from those farmers. Why are we biting the hand that's literally feeding us?

As Christians we know that the world is in God's hands, and He will choose when this world comes to an end. It is arrogant for people to declare that if we don't get rid of cows (methane), gas vehicles, tractors, etc. that the world is going to end at a predicted date. The very idea that we are ever going to get to zero carbon emissions is unrealistic, and arguing for it is harming our farmers who supply the world with food and other necessary products.

Farmers for their part just want to be able to do their job without being taxed out of their livelihood. A majority of people in my age demographic do not know what farmers are going through and the news is painting them to be anti- environmentalists when in reality they are just ordinary people who want to perform their job without penalty. Farmers are modern day heroes, and we need to stand with them to protect their work, and so governments around the world stop taxing them until they have nothing left.
