Band, Choir & Handbell Concert Recap

On December 11, Immanuel Lutheran had its Christmas Concert. The concert had a range of grades from fifth grade to twelfth grade and the students all worked hard preparing for the concert. The high school choir, handbells, and chorus are all directed by Mrs. Colleen Kranz. The Varsity and Jr Varsity bands are directed by Mrs. Debbie Schreyer Owens.

The fifth grade band was a small group of three students who played "Jingle Bells" and "Good King Wenceslas." Although they had a small group, their music filled the church and they sounded great! The fifth and sixth grade handbells performed "Low How a Rose E'er Blooming" and "Go Tell it on the Mountain."

The sixth grade band, also with three students, played "We Wish you a Merry Christmas." Again, although they had small numbers, they were very impressive.

The fifth through eighth grade chorus has been a new addition in the last couple of years. The chorus is a group of students who enjoy singing, volunteer to sing in this group, and enjoy performing more complex choral compositions than the grade school normally sings. Chorus had been a part of Immanuel's music program in the past when Mrs. Karla Olmanson had taught music, but it had ceased operating until last year when Mrs. Colleen Kranz brought it back! They have about seventeen students, and they sang "Angels We Have Heard on High."

The seventh and eighth grade handbells played "Good King Wenceslas," and then, the seventh and eighth grade girls who are in handbells also played "What Child is This." It was a very nice arrangement, and they used cool techniques to make the handbells sound very nice, and their sound radiated through the church.

The high school choir sang "Holden Evening Pray: The Annunciation and The Magnificat," "Advent Processional," and with the grade school chorus, they sang "Where Shepherds Lately Knelt." The high school choir has grown in numbers in recent years and as a spectator, I would also report that not only their volume, but also their confidence and skill has grown.

To finish off the concert, the varsity band played "On a Winter's Eve," a jazz version of "Feliz Navidad," and "And Bless Us Everyone." The varsity band has eleven musicians in it, and even with small numbers, they still find a way to play songs made for a full band.

The concert had an amazing turnout, with the church almost full! It is also very nice to see that many of the different groups of music programs have grown in the last few years. I hope to see the music program at Immanuel, as well as the individual musicians, continue to expand and develop their music. Most of all, I hope to see them continue to use their talents to praise the Lord!



What to Expect When Taking Your Drivers Test

Around this time of year, many kids are getting ready to take their driver's test. As someone who's been driving for 11 whole months, I'm going to give you some solid advice. My first piece of advice is to schedule your test as far ahead of time as possible if there is a specific day you want to take your test. Different places have different rules, but scheduling your test at least a month ahead of time is ideal. The next thing you need to do is have all of your documents ready THE DAY BEFORE. It's not helping anyone if you scramble to get all your documents the morning of your test. Most places require you to have your permit, proof of insurance, social security number, payment, and your white card from driving six hours with an instructor. Now, some solid advice from someone who's made this mistake: don't forget your white card (or anything else) the morning of the test. Not only will you be stressed, but imagine the mood of your parent taking you to the test when you realize you forgot your white card and have to go all the way back home. As you can guess, it's not fun. The night before your test, make sure you have ALL of your documents and information in a spot where you will remember to bring them.



Another pre-test tip I have applies to those getting their license in the winter. Put the car you're taking your test in in your garage the night before, so that in the morning the windshield won't be icy. You can also scrape it off in the morning, but, speaking again from experience, it usually just works out that if you don't plan or remember to go out early to scrape it off, it will be covered with the type of ice that's almost impossible to scrape off. I'm not sure why it works that way, but it always seems to! Again, imagine the mood of the parent who's taking you to the test when the car is full of ice that just won't scrape off. Not fun.

Now, once you arrive at the DMV, with ALL your documents, you will most likely be nervous. My biggest trick with nerves is to be confident. At this point in your driving career, you've (hopefully) driven for a total of fifty hours and practiced all the parking skills. If you've truly done all this, you have no reason to be nervous and you should trust yourself.

The first thing you do at the DMV is check in and give them all your documents. For me, once they got everything sorted, they told me to go sit in my car. Eventually, your tester will come out. The first thing that I did for my test was all the stuff to show that I could operate the car. The tester stood outside of the car and told me to do things like use the blinkers, turn on the lights, turn on the high beams, and use the horn. After this, the tester will get in the car. This could be different for different testers, but I started with the parking. First, I backed out of the parking spot and drove over to a different part of the lot where I did the parallel park and the 90 degree back parking. After that, the instructor told me where to go. During my test, I mostly went through roundabouts and residential areas. At the end of the test, I went back into the DMV parking lot and parked in a spot. At this point, I was worried because I had made a couple mistakes, but the tester told me the things that I did wrong or needed to work on and he told me I passed.

Another tip I have is that after your test, on your way to school or wherever you're going after, you should grab something fun to celebrate. For example, I stopped at a coffee shop and got a coffee.

Finally, these are my last pieces of advice as someone who's driving experience spans a whole 11 months: First, trust yourself- you know what you're doing if you've done all the training and hours to complete your permit. Second, don't freak out over one mistake, because we all make mistakes. Instead, learn from your mistakes. Third, if you don't pass, don't be embarrassed, just focus on the things you need to work on and don't be afraid to try again. Last, even if you don't feel confident about driving after passing the test, I can tell you from my own experience that your driving skills keep improving even after getting your license.

This is what you can expect when taking your drivers test, and to those of you taking it soon, good luck!

What is your art background? How long have you been interested in art? 'I've been creating art all my life, it was one of my first real interests as a kid and it's only grown as the years have gone on. Before





Devotional

Reading: John 5:1-8 After this there was a feast of the Jews, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. 2 Now there is in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate a pool, in Aramaic called Bethesda, which has five roofed colonnades. 3 *In these lay a multitude of invalids—blind, lame, and paralyzed. 5 One* man was there who had been an invalid for thirty-eight years. 6 When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had already been there a long time, he said to him, "Do you want to be healed?" 7 The sick man answered him, "Sir, I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up, and while I am going another steps down before me." 8 Jesus said to him, "Get up, take up your bed, and walk." 9 And at once the man was healed, and he took up his bed and walked. This section of scripture takes place sometime during Jesus' ministry after the Wedding of Cana, and he's started to do more "public miracles." Something that struck me was the question Jesus asked the man, "Do you want to be healed?" It hit me how strange of a question it would be to ask a man who was an invalid for thirty-eight years. It seems silly; why would the man not want to be healed? I started thinking about the man's response. He doesn't answer the question. Instead, he tells Jesus why he thinks he can't be healed. He didn't have people to help him get in the pool when the water was "stirred up," and because he was an invalid he couldn't get there fast enough. For context, his pool was thought to be "stirred up" by an angel, and the first person to get to the water would be healed of whatever illness or disease they had. Why would the man answer this way? I think it could be because he was hoping Jesus could help him into the pool. Jesus had such a better way to change this man's life and it made this account so much cooler. Jesus definitely could've healed the man with the pool if he wanted to, I mean he is God he can do anything he wants to. That's not what would've been best for that man. Scripture tells us, 'And we know that for those who love God, all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose' (Romans 8:28) Jesus heals him differently; he just simply says, "Get up, take up your bed, and walk." It's not as "fancy" as some of his other miracles, but it reminds us again how powerful and life -changing God's word is. How crazy is it that Jesus just said, "Get up..and walk," and immediately the man was healed and did what Jesus told him to. How often do we forget how powerful God is? How often do we forget that He can heal us Himself? I don't know about you, or what stuff you are going through right now, but I think that last year I forgot that Jesus heals. I forgot He cares about all the little stuff. 'Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care. 30 And even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. 31 So don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows' (Matthew 10:29-31). I forgot to cast all my cares on Him and was looking for healing in the wrong places. Just like the man at the pool. But just like how Jesus didn't give up on this man, He doesn't give up on us. Just like Jesus showed the man where he really could get help, and where his trust really should be, He shows us too. So this year, let's look to Jesus who heals, and not forget what He can do. Let's cast all our cares on Him, and find peace and rest in Him during this new year.
